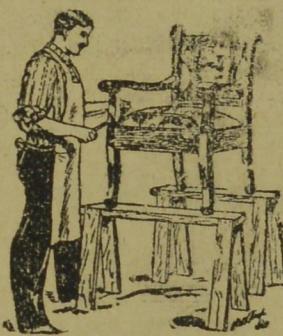

MAY BE DISSOLUTION.

If Tory Obstruction Continues at Ottawa Laurier Likely to Appeal to the Country

OTTAWA, May 15.—"Right or wrong, no surrender," was the decision of the Conservatives in caucus this morning.

Yesterday afternoon the government gave them an opportunity to reflect on what they are doing by dropping the debate on the elections bill for a day and presenting some calm and contented measures.

Today the Liberals will have a caucus to talk over the situation, and in the afternoon the Conservatives will be given another opportunity to be reasonable or to show themselves determined to block the business of the country, to tie up the postal machinery and to embarrass the collection of customs, the lighthouse service, the harbor and river service, by continuing the obstruction which they have been carrying on so long.

If the opposition continues to block business the attention of the country will soon be focused upon the situation in a manner which will compel the country to decide who is in the right and who is in the wrong in this dispute.

GOVERNMENT HAS NO FEAR

The government has no fear of the decision of the people. They know what will be discovered. They know it will be driven home to the people that as the provincial constituencies do not correspond with the federal constituencies some one will have to make the provincial lists fit the federal constituencies. The leading Conservative member from Manitoba, Dr. Roche, objected to the original proposal of the bill to have this done by Dominion officials and said it should be done by judges of the country courts. The people will find that Sir Wilfrid offered to accept this and amend the bill so that the work of revision would be turned over to the Manitoba County

Court judges, seven in number, five of them Conservatives. When he made that announcement the Conservatives cheered to a man, and Mr. Foster said the proposal was fair, and the Conservative press the next morning declared that Sir Wilfrid had agreed to the terms of the opposition. Sir Wilfrid's proposal was practically endorsed as fair and all but accepted.

Then the day afterward the Conservatives declined the offer. It was what they had asked for. When it was offered to them they refused it.

Hon. Mr. Foster moved the adjournment of the house for the purpose of discussing the condition of the marine and fisheries department and especially the slow operation of the commission.

THE PREMIER'S REPLY

Sir Wilfrid Laurier expressed the opinion that Mr. Foster was out of order in discussing what went on before a commission until the commission had reported.

Respecting opposition obstruction of the supply bill he said. The first thing we have to do is to provide appropriations in order to carry on the ordinary business of the country to pay for the civil service for the carrying on of the mails for mounted police and the elementary business of the country. We tried to get that from the House day after day, we have moved the House into committee of supply and day after day we have been met by deliberate obstruction. (Liberals cheer.) We did not know what was the matter until some candid members on the other side said, "You will not get any supply until you bring down your legislation." We brought down the election bill and the first thing we were told was, "You will not get supply until you withdraw it."

GRAND TRUNK AT THE FRANCO-BRITISH EXHIBITION, LONDON, ENG

It is a well known fact that at all the World's Fairs and International Exhibitions, held in the past decade, the Grand Trunk has been most prominently represented with attractive displays, and in each case gold medals and diplomas have been their award. At the Franco-British Exhibition which is to be held at Shepherd's Bush, London, May to October, this year, the Grand Trunk are not behind in their progressiveness and have erected a beautiful pavilion covering about 2000 square feet of space in a picturesque spot known as the French Court.

This structure follows in design the Renaissance style of architecture with an artistic pillared entrance. Over the entrance rises a group of statues representing the Grand Trunk Railway System as "speed" with an electric star surmounting the head of the central figure emblematic of the "Star of Empire," and on each side of this figure is represented in smaller figures the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, the central figure joining their hands, representing the spanning of the continent by the new National Transcontinental Railway. This allegorical group is a very imposing one and the idea is appropriate.

The interior of the building is arranged in a combination of color harmony of olive green and red. The scenic views of the Grand Trunk Railway, as well as views of the summer tourists districts and fishing and hunting resorts in Canada are beautifully portrayed by a series of bromide enlargements finished in a sepia tint and framed in a dull quartered oak. The photographic work has been executed by Mr. J. W. Swan, the well known landscape photographer, who has excelled himself, if possible, in this collection. These pictures cover the walls to a distance of two feet from the ceiling, and the entire interior has been set off by beautiful frieze made up of grains and grasses from Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and the West. In this frieze are embedded specimens of Canadian fish and game mounted in an attractive way, the whole forming a unique and pleasing effect.

In the centre of the room a pyramid has been erected, on which is shown samples of the cereals of the Province of Ontario, as well as natural samples of fruit from the "Garden of Canada."

Animated moving picture machines projecting fishing, hunting and railroad scenes, are other features of the floor space. Interesting

and instructive literature has been specially prepared for distribution, and it is estimated that from fifteen to twenty million people will visit this exhibition during its lifetime. Canada and the Grand Trunk Railway System will secure a tremendous amount of publicity through this medium.

Among the special features on display in this building will be two exceptionally fine moose heads, one the record head taken from the Province of Ontario, and the other a freak head that will attract a great deal of attention. Mr. S. W. Cummings, who until recently was General Passenger Agent of the Central Vermont Railway, has been appointed to the position of Director of this exhibit.

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House: Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D. 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$ 35 00

The same for each successive evening performance .. 30 00

The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) .. 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery .. 30 00

The same as above without scenery .. 25 00

The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night .. 27 00

The same without scenery per night .. 23 00

For one week stand with scenery .. 135 00

For the same without scenery .. 120 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) .. 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery .. 15 00

For the same without scenery .. 10 00

For each matinee, local talent only .. 7.50

For each political meeting .. 15 00

On the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting .. 10 00

For two meetings same person, same day .. 15 00

For rehearsals for afternoon .. 3 00

For rehearsals for evening .. 5 00

For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night .. 20 00

The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night .. 18 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) .. 10 00

Passed and enacted the Seventh day of April, A.D., 1908.
