

TOILS TIGHTENING.

Laporte Authorities Confident of Proving Ray Lamphere a Guilty Party with Mrs Guinness

LAPORTE, Ind., May 14.—Unless the sitting and sticing of the powdered debris taken from the cellar of the ruined Guinness farmhouse results in startling discoveries, the production of further tangible evidence in the big tragedy is not likely.

Prosecutor Smith has notified his previous determination to rush the case against Ray Lamphere into court, finding that the state's side may be strengthened.

Coroner Mack has made public the results of his investigation on all the known bodies except that supposed to have been Ole O. Buddsburg, of Iowa, Wis.

It is believed the mystery surrounding the bodies yet unidentified will never be fully solved. The decomposed state of the remains makes identification virtually impossible.

MISSING MEN TRACED.

What developments are to come probably will be in the direction of establishing the identity of more of the mysterious men seen to enter the farmhouse, but never to leave it. Yesterday three such persons were connected with the Guinness woman, the evidence regarding John Moe, of Elbow Lake, Minn., and Henry Gerholt, of Scandinavia, Wis., being almost conclusive. The fate of George Brady, of Tuscola, Ill., is less certain.

Moe was traced to the farm by means of the banking actions which preceded his visit. The facts shown were startlingly similar to those brought to light in the cases of Buddsburg and Heiglein. Each of the men cashed a check draft or note

for a considerable amount at one or the other of the local banks, and at the desks of the cashiers all the calls ended.

It is considered probable that an inspection of the books of the bank would reveal further evidence of a similar nature.

Lamphere today denied that he had made any confession to Rev. E. A. Schell or to any one else.

BOUGHT MUCH CHLORAL. That Mrs. Guinness purchased quantities of chloral from druggists in Laporte and surrounding cities has been established. Witnesses will be produced to give testimony to this fact.

Lamphere related today a dramatic story of a plot between Mrs. Guinness and Andrew Heiglein to slay him. Lamphere, jealous of Heiglein, overheard the woman and her dupe in conversation one night early in January.

"We must get rid of Lamphere," I heard Mrs. Guinness say. "I tell you what I'll do, I'll give some chloral."

Lamphere says that on the night Heiglein was murdered he bored a hole in the sitting room door in order that he might listen to Mrs. Guinness and Heiglein from the cellar.

All of the authorities are now satisfied that the body of the woman burned in the fire was that of Mrs. Guinness.

The fact that the bunches of hair found clutched in the dead hands of Heiglein are not from the head of Lamphere leads to the belief that the woman had another accomplice when she put Heiglein to death.

INCREASING POPULARITY OF THE DRESSING SACK.

THE negligee is no longer regarded as a costume to be apologized for if one be discovered wearing it outside the boudoir. On the contrary, so fascinating is its every detail and withal so becoming that the wonder is that more women do not substitute it for the short skirt and shirt waist so frequently adopted for unceremonious house wear.

Since the advent among us of the various soft eastern silks, such as the tussah weaves, which adjust themselves so readily to the flowing lines of the Japanese kimono, silk as a negligee fabric has been steadily gaining in favor, especially as these garments are made in all the delicate colors common to the western hemisphere, as well as the dull ones of the far east.

The oriental woman never worries her head about gores and frillings and ruchings, so far as her negligee goes; her occidental sister wisely copies her and makes up her loose, long, soft silk robe as simply as possible. Sometimes she copies the gorgeously figured kimono even to the square sleeve that is bordered deeply with plain satin.

On the house-skirts worn with these negligees the use of hems or heavier material is as notable as ever, but the hems have grown wider and in many instances come to the knee or even higher up on the skirt. As their edges are usually made irregular where they are applied on the gown material and ornamented with embroidery or some other form of trimming, the double skirt effect that results is most pronounced.

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THE FIRST INDUSTRY.

Problems of the Farm Curiously Ignored by the Ancients.

Why agriculture, the first industry to be learned and so obviously the most fundamental, was the last to be developed is one of the most baffling mysteries of history. The records and relics of other nations down through history show the same strange incongruity. For thousands of years the wise men of the world absolutely ignored the problems of the farm. A farmer remained either a serf or a tenant. He was a stolid drudge—"brother to the ox." Even the masterful old pilgrim fathers had no plows at all—nothing but hoes and sharp sticks—for the first twelve years of their pioneering.

A Fence of 2,036 Miles.

After five years' work Australia's great transcontinental rabbit-proof fence has been completed. Its length is 2,036 miles, and the cost of its erection has been nearly £250,000. It is furnished at intervals of five miles with system of traps, in which hundreds of rabbits are captured and destroyed daily. Inside the barrier there appears as yet no trace of their presence.
