### SUCCESSFUL MISSION

The same tactics that Sir Wilfrid Laurier pursued to so successfully settle the Manitoba school question, which under Tory rule threatened to dismember the country, are proving the right thing for adjustment of the Japanese immigration matter.

Diplomacy and not bluff and bluster is the agency Sir Wilfrid employed in both cases to reach the condition satisfactory to Canada.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux's mission to Japan, of which he told Parliament Tuesday, seems to have been an undoubted success. He approached the Japanese government in a calm judicial way, and Canada has the promise of the former's administrators that the immigration evil will be checked in accordance with this country's desires.

Mr. Borden, who in his British Columbia speeches sought to create prejudice against the government on the question, should feel heartily ashamed of the fact that to gain a temporary political advantage he uttered words, which if they had been seriously heeded would have aroused ill-feeling between Japan and Canada, and might have even endangered the amicable relations existing between Japan and Great Britain.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has shown his great gifts of statesmanship on very many occasions when delicate situations arose, but seldom to a greater degree than in this Japanese immigration business.

### THE SENATE

The senate will resume business today—that is if it has any business to do—and the members of that august body will continue to draw their sessional indemnity and other perquisites just as if the House of Commons had not seriously debated the radical reform of the Upper House.

Senate reform may be in the air, but it is likely to stay there for some time, as no two men appear to agree upon any well conceived practical plan for the betterment of the red chamber.

There is one thing certain, the senators will never vote their House out of existence as the legislative council of New Brunswick did some years ago and indeed the abolition sentiment in the country is not strong.

The method of appointment, the decrease in membership and the retirement of members when they have reached a certain age, are, however, five questions with which one party or the other will have to deal at no distant day.

The Senate, as at present constituted, does not give good value for the large amount of money it costs, it does little practical work and a good many of its members have reached such advanced ages, that as legislators they are practically useless.

Reform the senate, but do not abolish it, seems to be a popular cry.

### GOLD IN WESTMORLAND

"Is there gold in Westmorland county?" asks a contemporary. Well yes, there is, or rather was. Dr. Pugsley told us about \$25,000 that was sent into that constituency in 1904 by the Tory corruption committee of Montreal to elect Mr. Powell to parliament, and some of this gold may be there yet. It is true it did not accomplish the business for which it was intended. There was not enough of it, for Mr. Powell's friends are said to have wired the Montreal men to "repeat the dose," but they were busy sending big hunks of the stuff to York, St. John and other New Brunswick constituencies, and may have neglected to notice Westmorland Tories' repeat order.

There is undoubtedly gold in Westmorland, our Tory friends think they know where some of it is stored, and expect to call it out in the next local election. That is why they have nominated wealthy candidates like Mr. Sumner, Mr. Black, Mr. McLauson and Mr. Mahoney.

### CURRENT COMMENT

The Stanstead and South Huron federal bye-elections took place today, and there is considerable interest in the result. There are many well informed Liberals who have strong hope that both seats will be taken by the government, constituting a gain of one.

The Halifax Board of Trade has endorsed the French treaty, and thereby show their dissent from the criticism which Mr. Borden and Mr. Foster made against it.

Rev. Dr. Paisley of Mount Allison college, whose death occurred Monday, was a native of Fredericton, who had a distinguished career as a preacher and educationalist, and was very highly regarded, not only in his own communion, but among all classes of the people.

Sincere sympathy will be extended to Mr. J. J. McCauley, in the double bereavement with which he has been visited, the death of his mother and father within five days of each other. The deceased were highly esteemed citizens of St. John, and their very sudden call was a great shock to a large circle of relatives and friends.

The Herald's advice from Sunbury confirms the general impression that Mr. Hazen will find some difficulty in securing re-election to the legislature in that constituency. The electors of Sunbury cannot see that he has rendered them any substantial service and they point to Mr. Hazen's failure as a party leader and useful legislator as additional reasons why they should give the opposition leader his walking ticket from the constituency.

Mr. Hazen and Mr. Fleming are to speak on political issues at Moncton next week, and it is hoped that they will have some regard for the facts in that constituency. The electors of the province and thereby attempted to injure its credit by their wild tales of debt increase, but the public is pretty well on to their game, and will be ready to discount their statements.

### TO DAM THE TOBIQUE

Company will Apply for Charter at the Next Session of Legislature

A syndicate composed of Mr. John E. Stewart, Dr. Earle and others, of Andover, have given notice that they will apply to the legislature at the next session for a charter to enable them to dam the Tobique river at the Narrows, near its mouth, and erect a large mill for the purpose of manufacturing pulp and paper. The proposal has awakened a great deal of interest, and it is certain to meet with stiff opposition, not only from lumber operators on the Tobique, but from the Tobique Salmon Club as well. The lumbermen will oppose the scheme on the ground that it will interfere with the passage of lumber down the river, and the Salmon Club people declare that a dam at the Narrows would be ruinous to the salmon fishing industry on the St. John river and Bay of Fundy. The Tobique is now the only tributary of the St. John which salmon ascend for spawning purposes and with it closed against them the fish would no longer infest the St. John river. It is held that even if a proper fishway were provided the refuse from a pulp mill thrown into the river would soon drive away the salmon. The question is one calling for very careful consideration on the part of the legislature.

### THE FINANCIAL SIDE

To the Editor of The Herald:

Sir,—I have noted with interest the letters of your correspondents, "A B" and "Truth" in regard to the question of adopting the License System for the city of Fredericton. There is one aspect of the matter on which they have not touched and which I think is worthy of consideration. I refer to the financial question involved. There is no doubt that the City of Fredericton could obtain from a license system a revenue of at least \$2,000 a year. This money would be got in a satisfactory manner and not by a species of blackmail as is now the case. Fredericton would be entitled to at least twelve Tavern Licenses, and they would not to the city at least \$2,000 a year. As our town is already very highly taxed and needs all the revenue it can obtain, it certainly would be to the interests of our citizens to substitute a License System for the present unsatisfactory "Canada Temperance Act."

The liquor license law provides that no person shall sell liquor unless licensed.

An inspector shall be appointed by the Lieutenant governor who shall inspect all premises seeking a license (Sec. 5 & 6.) And unless said inspector reports that the premises are satisfactory, and that he knows the applicant to be of good character and repute, a license shall not be granted to him (Sec. 11).

Liquor shall be sold on licensed premises from 10 at night until 6 each morning, and from 7 on Saturday night until 6 Monday morning. (Sec. 48) under a penalty of \$50 for first offence, \$100 for second offence and \$200 and forfeiture of license for third offence. If the sale is on Sunday between 6 in the morning and 12 at night the license is immediately forfeited upon any conviction. If a light is seen burning on the premises during prohibited hours, this shall be sufficient proof of a sale to warrant a conviction. If any person licensed to sell liquor permits drunkenness or disorderly conduct to take place on his premises, or supplies liquor to any drunken person or suffers persons of bad character to meet upon his premises, he is liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$50.

Any person holding a license who sells liquor to a person under 21 years of age, is liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$20.

Any person interested may apply to the police magistrate for an order forbidding the sale of liquor to any person who wastes his means or endangers the happiness of his family by drinking liquor, and any person thus supplying to or procuring liquor for such drunkard shall be liable to a fine of from \$25 to \$50. (Sec. 109)

Any person may inform a policeman to investigate and prosecute. (Sec. 113).
