HOCKEY AND CURLING

Marysville Team Defeated at Moncton
Fredericton Curlers Beaten by
St. Andrew's

MONCTON 5; MARYSVILLE 1.

MONCTON, N. B., January 22.—In a clean game, marked throughout by defense play on the part of the visitors, the Moncton Victorias last night defeated the Crescents of Marysville, score 5 to 1, in the New Brunswick League series.

At half time the score was 1 to 0 in favor of the Victorias who scored four times in the second half.

The Marysville team scored in the last half-minute of play, Coleman breaking away from the mix-up near the Marysville net, and with a clear field, beat out Wortman on a straight shot. The game was clean at all times, the players being kept well in hand by George Blizzard, of St. John, who refereed very efficiently.

There were several delays due to slight accidents, Cushing was struck with the puck and sustained a bad cut under the eye. Coleman was struck on the nose in the same way and Brogan was injured by a fall. After Brogan was hurt he retired and Cushing also left to even up. The remainder of the second half was played with six men on a side. There was no roughness and the Marysville boys were delighted. "The Moncton players are certainly a gentlemanly lot of fellows on the ice and off it," said Manager Fred Gibson after the game. "And it was the cleanest game in which we have played this year."

Captain Hovey expressed the same sentiments. Crockett was the star of the Moncton team, shooting all five goals. His work was marked with dash and brilliancy as time after time he carried the puck through the Marysville ranks. Gregory also did splendid work. For the visitors Burns did good work on the forward line, and the whole defence performed excellently to play a defence game, putting all three defense men in goal in the first half, so that it was almost impossible for the Victorias to score, and it was not until after twenty-three minutes of play that Crockett notched the first goal. The same tactics were repeated in the second half, Marysville working hard to keep the score down, while there were occasional rushes by Brogan and Burns.

Fullerton in goal did excellent work in both halves and much credit is due him and Brogan for the low score. In the first half the Vics had no less than 49 shots on the Marysville goal which were stopped. The shots were poured in all through the play being exclusively in the Marysville end. The Victorias played a strong individual game, but did not go in for combination play. The lineup was:

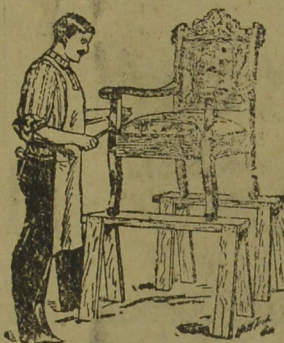
