MR. PEARSON TO TRANSFORM THE TIMES.

Mr. C. Arthur Pearson plans for the transformation of the Times, according to a cable dispatch to the New York Herald, include leaving the price, size and general appearance of the Times unchanged, but making the paper worth the six cents asked for it.

The news will be classified and there will be headings to the articles which will give an idea of what the article is about. A column or so of cable news about a terrible theatre disaster won't be headed simply "United States." Paragraphs a foot long will be abolished, and articles won't be allowed to run over into the next column for only two or three lines. Also the present custom of printing an article two or three columns long on some great public question and waiting six or eight weeks before the second article on the subject is published will be discontinued. This custom, it is presumed, the result of a belief that all Times readers keep a file of the paper constantly at hand and summary of the contents in their head. Mr. Pearson believes that this is asking too much of the reader.

It hasn't yet been settled whether the new proprietor will take charge. Mr. Pearson is said to be holding off, to allow a certain feeling of resentment on the part of the Times management and staff to subside. His advent is an innovation not exactly to their liking, and they are in a sort of defensive attitude. As he didn't buy the paper to acquire a fight he is going to sit quietly until they get used to him and the business can be carried on in an amicable way.

The circulation of the Times now is 55,000 copies daily, at six cents each. Every copy is bought outright—there are no returns. The circulation is about twice as large as Mr. Pearson supposed it was when he began negotiations to acquire the property.

EXPECT LIBERAL TO WIN.

South Huron will Probably be Redeemed by M. Y. McLean.

SEAFORTH, Jan. 19.—The proverbial difficulty of forecasting an election, as a horse race, is no less felt in South Huron than elsewhere, but the general impression appears to favor the likelihood of a Liberal win. Of course there are workers on each side who are confident of obtaining a big majority, but the safer estimates leave room for no very large balance of votes either way. When it is remembered that in the last general election the Conservative candidate scored only a few more than a hundred votes above his competitor in a total of some five thousand, it will be seen that the parties are pretty evenly matched.

Still the expectation of careful observers is that Mr. McLean, the Liberal candidate, will be elected by a small working majority. He is safe, they say if the Liberal vote is all got out.

The Conservative workers, on the other hand, say that after allowing to the Liberals all doubtful votes, they reckon up in the various townships and municipalities a small majority for their candidate.

Both candidates are stumping the riding and travelling the concessions and side lines incessantly. Personal canvassing is no doubt telling in many places, and each candidate is assisted by an energetic band of helpers in the members of parliament who speak at public meetings nightly and the committee men who work in a less public way.

Last night, a Liberal meeting was held at Leadbury, and Conservative meetings at Zurich, Grand Bend, and Winthrop, where Messrs. Wright, Blain, Clements, Leonard and Armstrong spoke.

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals, Ottawa, marked "Tender for leasing car and work shops," will be received until 10 o'clock of the FIFTEENTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1908, for the acquiring under lease of the car and work shops, with railway sidings, (at Moncton, N. B.) as designated on plans to be seen at the office of the Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals, Ottawa, and at the office of the General manager of the Intercolonial Railway, Moncton; the lease to be granted to cover together with the general terms and conditions in such cases, the following:—

1.—Term 21 years at rental named, with right of renewal for second term at such rental and upon such conditions as the Governor in Council may then determine.

2.—Occupation and use to be bona fide for an industry that will yield a reasonably steady traffic for the railway, the character and prospective outlook of which industry, to be designated in tender and the operation of which to be commenced within one year from date of Lessee acquiring property.

3.—That yearly operation shall be of such an extent as to continuously employ not less than 300 employees.

Each tender must be accompanied by a certified bank cheque for \$10,000.00, payable to the order of the Minister of Railways and Canals to be held by the Department, in case of the successful tenderer, until such time as the then lessee had duly installed on the premises for the operation of the work to be carried on under lease, machinery in value to the sum covered by said cheque, of which value the Minister aforesaid shall be the sole judge and at which time to be duly returned to the Lessee by the Department.
