Mr. William Lemont has taken out an auctioneer's license.

Ald. Burchill has been appointed chairman of the water commission.

Rev. Mr. Mowatt presided at the meeting of the St. John Presbytery on Tuesday.

John Woodward has been re-appointed city marshal, at a salary of \$60 per annum.

The city council, with a false idea of economy, have voted down a resolution to appoint a fire inspector.

Messrs. J. & J. McBean, Nashua, have sent down from Cross Creek 15,000 cedar sleepers for Mr. D. F. George.

Messrs. D. F. George and L. W. Sherman have loaded several schooners with sleepers and hemlock bark for the American markets.

It is pretty generally understood that Mr. W. D. Perley will be the Liberal Conservative candidate for the Commons in Sunbury county.

The "old cricketers" met last night, and with much enthusiasm resolved to challenge the best eleven of the Fredericton club for a match on the 24th.

Miss L. Wilson has removed her hair dressing establishment to Carleton street, adjoining Ald. Wilson's law office.

Dow Vandine was sworn in Tuesday night as day policeman, vice Woodward, resigned, and entered upon his duties yesterday.

Mr. T. Biden, baker, St. Mary's, has provided himself with a handsome bread cart, manufactured by Messrs. Edgecombe & Sons.

Mr. Justice Wetmore is holding Circuit court at Woodstock this week, and Mr. Justice Weldon is doing similar duty in St. John.

Charles Hawthorn, youngest son of Wm. Hawthorn, leaves for Winnipeg on Monday.

Mr. John Gregory, eldest son of the late Dr. Gregory, has successfully passed the first year's examinations in the Ontario Agricultural college at Guelph.

Mayflowers are quite plentiful, although late appearing this season. Mr. E. W. Vavasour of the P. O. department, has our thanks for a handsome bunch laid on our table.

The meeting of St. Paul's congregation for the consideration of the plans for the proposed new church, was postponed till next Monday evening. Mr. Price is making good progress with the removal of the old church.

The members of the Fredericton Brass band propose uniforming themselves in blue serge with gold stripes and buttons. The public will treat liberally any appeal the band may make for assistance toward this object.

St. Ann's church has elected Chief Justice Allen and Wm. Carman delegates to the Synod, with Geo. J. Bliss and John Richards, substitutes.

Ald. Geo. F. Atherton has resigned his seat in the city council, and a new election is ordered in Wellington ward, to fill the vacancy, on Saturday, the 20th inst. On the 28th of last month there died at her residence, Queensbury, Deborah H., wife of Mr. R. B. Clift. The deceased lady was born May 1st, 1781. She had twelve children, six boys and six girls. Of these seven are living. She left surviving her forty-six grand children and thirty-eight great grand children. Her descendants number altogether 118, of whom 91 are living.

Inspector Thos. Dowling of the Northwest Mounted Police, left Fredericton lately for Toronto, where the newly raised batch of recruits, for the force, numbering 200, have been for some time in barracks. He will take charge of the contingent, and will soon be if he is not already, on his way to Fort McLeod.

Mr. Leverett Estabrooks has been making a persistent canvas in the parishes of North Lake, Canterbury, Dunfries, Prince William, Manners, Sutton and Southampton for the legislature. He has addressed thirteen public meetings, besides making personal calls upon a large number of the electors.

The local government has been in session since Tuesday. All the members of that body, except Mr. Crawford, are in the city. It is under-

stood that the fixing of the date for the elections, and the matter of appointments, have been deferred till next Wednesday, when the executive meet again.

The country market is not well supplied with produce this week, so prices are good. Spring lamb brings from 8 to 10 cents per lb.; veal 4 to 6 cents; butter was as high as 28 cents, and eggs from 15 to 17 cents. Hay brings \$10 per ton and less according to quality, and oats 50 cents per bushel.

Mr. W. G. Dykeman, Lower Queensbury, has purchased Mr. Joseph N. Sloat's farm, adjoining his. It contains a valuable sugary, and will otherwise be a valuable addition to Mr. Dykeman's property. He manufactured 800 lbs. of maple sugar this season, for which he realized from 12 to 15 cents per pound.

The York and Carleton Steamboat company at its annual meeting Tuesday, elected the following directors: Freeman H. Berry, Richard Bellamy, John Fisher, James W. Boyer, Dr. J. R. Hagerman, Whitman Haines, Capt. Duncan. At a meeting of the directors held yesterday, F. H. Berry was chosen president and treasurer, and J. A. Vanwart secretary.

The annual meeting of the York County Rifle Association was held last evening in the Maritime Farmer once, at which the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Major Staples, president; Capt. Loggie, treasurer; Sgt. Perkins, secretary; Capt. Barker, Lieut. Pinder and Quarter Master Lipsett, Committee of Management; Capt. Loggie, range officer. A match will take place on the range on the morning of the 24th.

The committee in charge of the erection of the proposed new Baptist church, have been authorized by the congregation to procure specifications from Mr. D. E. Dunham of St. John, whose plans have been accepted, and also to ask for tenders for the construction of the work. The committee consists of the following gentlemen: D. F. George, Joseph Sherwood, Judge Steadman, Dr. T. H. Rand, A. F. Randolph, Wm. Wheeler, George Kitchen, H. Crouse, James G. McNally.

Color-Sergt. E. A. Smith has received instructions that the Wilmblende team, of which he is the only maritime member, will sail for England from Quebec on June 24th, by the Allan steamship "Polynesian." The Newcastle Advocate copies a paragraph from the Bay Pilot regarding Sergt. Smith's good fortune, and adds, "the young gentleman referred to is draughtsman in the Crown Land office. IT WROTE ITSELF.

The Author's Story of the Origin of "My Maryland."

Brander Matthews wrote an account of the circumstances under which "My Maryland, My Maryland," was written, and the poem's author, James Ryder Randall, approved Professor Matthews' account. In April, 1861, Colonel Randall read in the New Orleans Delta news of the attack on the Massachusetts troops as they passed through Baltimore.

"This account greatly excited me," Mr. Randall wrote in answer to a letter from Professor Matthews. "I had long been absent from my native city, and the startling event there influenced my mind. That night I could not dismiss from my mind what I had read in the paper. About midnight I arose, lit a candle and went to my desk. Some powerful influence seemed to possess me, and almost involuntarily I proceeded to write the song of 'My Maryland.'"

"I remember that this idea seemed to take shape as music in my brain—some wild air that I cannot now recall. The whole poem was dashed off rapidly when once begun. It was not composed in cold blood, but under what may be called a conflagration of the senses if not an inspiration of the intellect. No one was more surprised than I was at the widespread and instantaneous popularity I had been so strangely stimulated to write."

Colonel Randall always told his friends that the poem "wrote itself."
