THE BUDGET SPEECH.

Government Propose Adding Large Amount
to Bonded Debt of the Province.

Game Protection and Other Services to be
Starved.

In resuming his budget speech in the legislature Friday afternoon, Provincial Secretary Fleming referred to the assets of the province. The aggregate, he said, as set down in the auditor general's report, taken from the liabilities as stated on the other side of the account, left a balance to the debit of the province of \$3,590,897.72. He had shown yesterday that this balance would be very much larger if all the liabilities of the province had been charged. In connection with these liabilities, he had, he said, a statement prepared by a chartered accountant. The schedules would be laid upon the table of the House for investigation. When the total amount of all the floating indebtedness was known, the government proposed to ask for authority to issue bonds to cover it.

Hon. gentlemen opposite would not doubt criticize the government because its members when in opposition had been opposed to issuing bonds for ordinary expenditures. In this, however, the government had the precedent of the government, which came into power in 1883. In the past he had taken the position that all the ordinary expenditures should come out of ordinary revenue, and the policy of the government would be to strictly carry out this idea. He did not mean to say, however, that all large public works such as the proposed bridge over the falls at St. John should be taken out of the revenue, but that all the usual services should be maintained without adding to the debt of the province. The policy of this government would be that when the ordinary expenditures had reached the limit of the revenue, the expenditure must stop, or if it could not then be stopped, the revenue of the succeeding year must even up the account.

ESTIMATED EXPENDITURE.

Taking up the estimated expenditures he said the cost for jury fees this year would be \$7,000 instead of \$5,000. Agriculture was allowed a total of \$35,465, \$5,000 of which was allowed for the expenses of the department.

Delegations had come from St. John, Chatham, Sackville, Woodstock and Centreville, all putting up arguments for exhibition grants. Before next year it was the intention of the government to consider the whole of question of exhibitions, and they hoped to announce a fixed policy regarding it.

The estimate for the agent general in London was placed at \$1,000, because that amount had already been paid. It was not the intention of the government to ask the legislature to continue this vote. Contingencies which cost last year \$19,582 were estimated at \$17,000. This was a controllable item and the government was determined to effect savings. Already some savings had been made. In the stationery item alone, beginning with the first of May, exactly the same quality of supplies were obtained by a contract 35 per cent lower than the prices paid by the late government. For a full year this would mean a saving of about \$1,000 in this item alone. The Royal Gazette under the new contract was produced for \$1200 against \$1800 under the late government.

The estimate for education was about \$30,000 larger than last year, due to greater aid to the University, and the increased salaries to teachers.

\$10,000 was asked for forest protection, more than this was paid last year. The government recognized the urgent need of full protection to the forests, and were sorry they could not be more generous.

Game protection at \$18,000, was less than last year. The policy of this government would be with many less men to do much more work. It had been found that men receiving from \$35 to \$45 per year gave very little value for their salary. In a county of average size he believed five or six good men with fair remuneration would do far better work than fifty political game wardens.

The expenditure on public health would be much larger this year than usual on account of the large bills for smallpox in different sections.

The item of interest was not a pleasing subject to discuss, the increase to this item over last year was over \$50,000.

Less money was asked on account of mining this year.

\$12,000 was asked for public printing against \$13,600 spent last year. In future it was expected to effect a saving in printing of at least 20 per cent.

The estimate for public works was one which would perhaps be of more interest than any other. The bridge service of the country needed much attention, and the highways, due to bad weather, were in such a condition that calls for assistance were coming from everywhere. The government recognized that the needs of the people must be attended to, and were asking for \$20,000 more for public works than last year.

He was not sure whether the \$12,000 estimated for stampage collection would cover that service or not.

It was proposed that when the new audit act came in force, to make some changes in this connection, with a view to more satisfactory results.

This might mean some additional expenses. The unforseen expenses of \$5,000 would be drawn on some extent to cover the auditing of the provincial accounts. In addition to the work already done, a gentleman had been engaged to make a thorough audit of the Crown Land department for some years back. This made a total estimated expenditure of \$1,038,951.89, leaving, when compared with the income, a sum unappropriated, of over \$20,000. The government hoped to have a surplus of this amount, but if this was not possible, they hoped at least to keep the expenditure well within the revenue.

Mr. Dunlap, an expert accountant of high standing, had prepared the schedules previously referred to, and in his report had pointed out the unsatisfactory system of accounts followed in the Crown Land and Public Works departments.

No reflection was intended upon anyone in the civil service, but they were working under a system hopelessly bad. To continue a system whereby tens of thousands of dollars were collected and deposited to the private accounts of officials and where large lump sums were placed to the credit of departments, and paid out on the cheque of officials without any supervision from an auditor was surely an injustice to the people and to the officials. In this connection he did not blame the late premier, whose occupancy of office had been so brief.

It was no dark picture that was before the people of the province. The outlook was full of hope. We had great and varied resources, and we had a people with the intelligence and enterprise to develop them. The government would be lacking in courage when it was necessary to incur expenses to help open up our latent resources.

Hon. Mr. Robinson moved the adjournment of the debate, and has the floor for Monday afternoon.
