To guard a promiscuous set of colonies and possessions scattered over all parts of the world, England claims the dominion of the seas. No expectation surely could be less reasonable or less likely to be fulfilled. England may feel maternal pride in her colonies and be required by affection. But to suppose that the other nations will concur in making her securely empress of the ocean is absurd. She will remain as she is, assailable in her dependencies, which do not seem likely ever to contribute much to Imperial defence. Meantime her own people will be subjected to a severe strain, and the community of nations will never be free from the danger of war.—Goldwin Smith.

SIR W. WHITEWAY DEAD.

Newfoundland Loses One of its Most Distinguished Men.

ST. A GREAT EMPIRE BUILDER.

The Right Honourable Sir William Whiteway, K.C.M.G., K.C., D.C.L. (Oxon), a member of the Imperial Privy Council, was a man who through his life work for the colony of Newfoundland deserved to be ranked among the men known as Empire Builders. He was one of that chosen band who have contributed, each in its own sphere, to make the British Empire the magnificent structure it stands today.

Born at Buckton, Devonshire, April 1st, 1828, he was of good old Devon stock, and throughout his life showed his determination and courage under all circumstances, just as the Devon man are always expected to do.

As a young man he went to Newfoundland, and was admitted a member of the Bar in that Colony in 1852 and appointed a Queen's Counsel ten years later. On June 1st of that year he married Mary, daughter of Rev. J. Lighthorne, who died in 1868 and in 1872 he married Catherine Anne, daughter of W. H. Davies, who survives him.

He soon took a prominent part in the politics of the Colony, and from the day he entered the House he left his mark upon the legislation of the country, and a broad beneficent mark it was. In the Newfoundland House of Assembly he was Speaker from 1865 to 1869. He became Solicitor General in 1873 and held that office until 1878, when on assuming the Premiership, he chose the office of Attorney-General. Defeated in 1885, he resumed office in 1889 and held the reins of office until 1897.

A PRONOUNCED IMPERIALIST. He died without seeing one of his fondest dreams realized, for as he was an Imperialist of the most pronounced type so was he a Confederationist, and he waited only the favorable occasion to bring about the union of the ancient colony with Canada, to round out the Dominion. He played, however, a great part in the history of the island, having originated and carried through the great enterprise now known as the Reid Rail way, five hundred miles from St. John's to Port-au-Pas.

This is recognized now as the greatest factor ever introduced for the progress and advancement of Newfoundland. The

His home, "Riverview" commanding a splendid view from a height near the entrance of St. John's harbor, was a centre of social life in Newfoundland. A devoted member of the church of England, Sir William was always ready to help the interests of that body in any way possible, and was regarded as one of the pillars of his church on the island.
