THE INSTITUTE.

solidated school. He went into the matter very fully, and endorsed the principal points of Inspector Steeves' address. He pointed out that the teachers and students of the country schools were in a majority, and were deserving of every encouragement if the country is to be endowed with a noble peasantry. Mr. Peacock showed himself to be a close student of economic questions, as well as a thinker, and his contribution to the address was much enjoyed. A spirit of patriotism should be instilled into our children and their attention should be called to the great resources of the province. For instance they should be taught the great water power in the Bay of Fundy and Grand Falls that is going to waste year after year, and they should be told what a great benefit this power would be to the province if utilized. He regarded the work of the teacher in the country schools as of the greatest importance to the province. He expressed himself as being strongly in favor of consolidation in the country schools.

HIGH SCHOOL TRAINING.

Mr. W. J. Myles, principal of the St. John High school, read an exceedingly able paper on "A Course of Training for High Schools." He dwelt upon the important position filled by the object of High schools, and they occupied in our educational system. He pointed out that it is during his high school course that a pupil begins to plan for the future, and decides upon his profession or calling.

Discussing the course of instruction for High schools, he suggested that the course be extended to four years, and that there be two courses of study to select from. The time has come when English work should be extended either by lengthening its course or eliminating other less useful subjects. More poetry and dramatic prose should be studied and analyzed during the term. The memory of the student should be well stored with literary gems, which would be carried throughout life.

He regretted the withdrawal of so many High school pupils at the end of the first year's course. He thought to improve matters there might be a general course for High schools, and a college preparatory course, the first to be for pupils who did not intend to pursue their studies beyond the High school. He suggested that stenography, typewriting and book-keeping might be included in the latter. Criticism of our High school course is undoubtedly youthful in many respects. In the United States High school subjects are optional, which in our schools are obligatory. In many respects our High schools are not any further advanced than they were twenty years ago.

Principal B. C. Foster of the Fredericton High School, opened the discussion on Mr. Myles' paper. In opening he made a plan on behalf of the "dreamer" and pointed out that before one could do great things they must first dream of them. He agreed with Mr. Myles that there was room for improvement in the English course at the High School. He thought the High School work could be more satisfactorily performed if there were a four years' course. The question as to whether or not students could be induced to remain four years would have to be reckoned with as the tendency today seemed to be for shorter courses and less expense. He was supposed to introduce technical subjects such as typewriting with High Schools as there were other

subjects of more importance to students seeking an education. He thought technical subjects should be relegated to technical schools.

Mr. A. B. Maggs of Sussex and Inspector Brown contributed able addresses to the debate. The latter was in good voice and though his remarks were brief gave expression to some good sound ideas. He paid a glowing tribute to the worth of Inspector Steeves, under whom he had labored as a teacher for many years and dwelt upon the great importance of the work in the public schools.

Principal G. J. Oulton, of Moncton Inspector Carter, H. P. Dole, Dr. Bridges and others discussed the matter.

Dr. Inch complimented the members of the institute on the large attendance and success of the meeting. He also referred to the great pleasure he had experienced in listening to the addresses of Prof. Locke.

On motion of Chancellor Jones, a hearty vote of thanks was presented to Prof. Locke and gracefully acknowledged.

On motion of Inspector Carter, seconded by Dr. Creed, a vote of thanks was tendered the chairman.

At 12.30 the meeting adjourned to reconvene at the University at three o'clock p.m.

A TRURO FAILURE

Big Wholesale Dry Goods House Goes to the Wall

TRURO, June 27.—The wholesale dry goods firm of William Cummings & Sons, Truro, has assigned.

The liabilities are \$87,000 and the assets \$38,000. Judgments in Truro have been recorded amounting to \$17,000 chiefly for accommodation and cash loans. Hon. B. F. Pearson has a judgment for \$9,000 and Frank Stanfield has bill of sale on stock for a similar amount.

Some time ago the firm made an offer of twenty cents on the dollar, but his was not accepted and the assignment subsequently followed. Most of the creditors are in Montreal and Toronto.

A GOOD MARKET.

Country produce was fairly plentiful in the country market this morning and brought good prices from the producers' standpoint. Eggs were plentiful at 18 and 19 cents, butter sold at 20 cents, potatoes at \$1, veal at 6 and 7 cents, and mutton at 7 and 8 cents.

STRAWBERRIES HERE.

There has been excellent strawberry weather during the month of June, and the crop promises to be a heavy one. The first wild berries of the season were brought into the market this morning and sold readily at \$1 per half bushel.

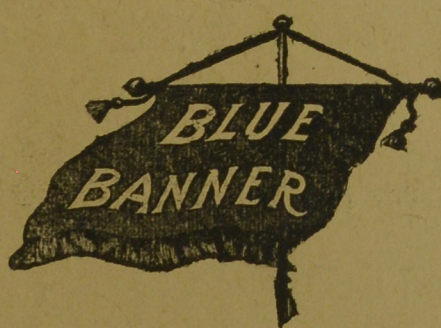
