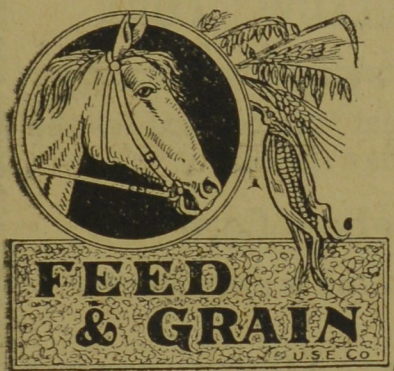

BRITISH BATTLESHIPS.

To Engage in Manoeuvres in July—Gigantic Fleet Will Assemble in North Sea.

LONDON, June 2—Orders for the manoeuvres and exercises of the British fleets in home waters have been issued and indicate that a very important and interesting series of naval drills will be carried out in the North Sea in July.

The number of ships engaged will be considerably over a hundred, including many battle ships and cruisers, and the flags of nearly a dozen admirals will be flying.

An instructive comparison may be drawn between the grand display of naval might in the vessels of the United States fleet, which were reviewed by Secretary Metcalf, on May 8, and the fleets which Britain and Germany, respectively, are putting out for their manoeuvres during the next few weeks.

At San Francisco there were present forty-four vessels, including eighteen battleships, eight armored cruisers, and 22,876 officers and men and 592 guns. These forty-four vessels carried of and above the size of a 4 inch, the heaviest gun being that of 12 inch calibre, of which there are forty-eight.

104 BRITISH VESSELS.

The British fleet which under Lord Charles Beresford will assemble in the North Sea will consist of 104 vessels, including twenty-two battleships, fourteen armoured cruisers, as well as protected cruisers, destroyers

and auxiliary vessels. These 104 vessels carry 25,592 officers and men, and 631 guns of and above the size of a 4 inch, the heaviest gun being of a 13 inch calibre, of which there are eighty-six.

The German High Sea fleet will consist of forty-four vessels, of which eighteen are battleships, four are armored cruisers and protected cruisers and destroyers. These forty-four vessels will carry 17,413 officers and men and 480 guns of and above the size of a 4 inch the heaviest gun being of eleven inch calibre, of which there are thirty-two.

PART OF FLEET TO CANADA.

Such a comparison is, however, incomplete unless it is also pointed out that the United States has in Pacific waters in addition to the fleet reviewed at San Francisco, a number of useful vessels including a small squadron of cruisers and a second flotilla of destroyers. In regard also to the British fleet, the strength of this will be diminished by the despatch of a greater portion of the Atlantic fleet and some fine armoured cruisers to Canada with the Prince of Wales. Nor have the reserves of the home fleet been taken into consideration.

On the other hand, Germany has some fifty additional torpedo craft in reserve, but very little else in the shape of heavier vessels which would be of value outside her defended ports until a decisive action had taken place between the main fleets.

JAILED FOR BIGAMY.

School Principal With Wife and Nine Children Married Renfrew, Ont Girl

RENFREW, June 2—A more than ordinary commotion seized Renfrew Saturday, when it became known that John Elliot Anderson, B. A., late principle of Renfrew public school and since engaged as inspector of public works, Brockville, has been arrested by Chief Demott at the instance of Inspector Rodgers and the Attorney General's Department, Toronto upon a charge of bigamy.

Anderson was married here to Miss Flo Jamieson, youngest daughter of Rev. W. F. Jamieson, Methodist minister, on the 20th April last, while it is charged that he has a wife and nine children, five daughters and four sons living in Toronto. His second wife has been visiting her parents here for the last two or three days and Detective Rodgers finding no trace of Anderson in Brockville came on to Renfrew, where he was located in the rectory and immediately put under arrest and taken before Magistrate Rady, before whom he pleaded guilty and elected to be summarily tried.

At the solicitation of Detective Rodgers, who desired to communicate with the Attorney General's Department, he was sent to Pembroke jail for one week, to be brought back to Renfrew next Saturday to appear before Magistrate Eady at 10 a. m. and receive sentence.

It transpired that Anderson was married to Miss Eliza Jane Walker, of Wingham, Ont., on the 24th May, 1877, and that her first knowledge of his recent marriage was an account of it in the newspapers.

POSED AS A WIDOWER.

BROCKVILLE, June 1—Jas. E. Anderson, the Toronto man arrested at Renfrew Saturday on a charge of bigamy, to which he pleaded guilty, has been public school inspector here since last September. Prior to his marriage he posed as a widower, though little was known of his past life. A few weeks ago, however, the education department notified the school board that Anderson did not have the qualifications, but in order to retain his position, promised to secure them this month, and when he left here last Thursday it was presumably for Toronto to undergo the proper examinations.
