TUPPER PULLS OUT.

It is stated on what is regarded as authentic authority that Sir Hibbert Tupper has notified the Conservatives of Pictou that he will not accept their nomination for Parliament.

Various reasons are given for this decision but the principal one is said to be that Sir Hibbert resents his throw down in Vancouver where he resought nomination and that he blames Borden and Foster for operating to that end through Premier McBride.

The New Glasgow Chronicle however suggests Sir Hibbert was afraid of a licking at the hands of Mr. E. M. MacDonald, in Pictou hence his decision to keep out of the game.

Tupper was badly treated by his party when they chose Borden for leader and he has been in the sulks ever since. He is a much abler man than Borden, but it is said to be objectionable to the ultra Protestant element in Ontario and the west because of the strong stand he took for the coercion of Manitoba on the school question.

STINGING REPROOF.

Sir Wilfred Laurier seldom says severe things of a political opponent but he seems to have lost patience with Mr. Foster the other day.

"I do not know," said the Premier, "any man in this House who has so loose a tongue and so thin a skin as the honourable member for North Toronto himself."

Mr. Foster is certainly establishing for himself a reputation as a great blatherskite, a public nuisance in parliament. New Brunswick got rid of him long ago, and there is a prospect that he will be turned down at the next election in North Toronto.

Mr. Foster wasted nearly all Tuesday in obstruction putting the country to further expense and delay in the public business.

Mr. Foster should see that his prestige in the country has vanished and it would be more discreet for him to disappear from the public view at least until the sediment stirred up by the Insurance commission in his case had settled a bit.

NO FAITH IN FOSTER.

The Montreal Star which gives what assistance it can to the Tory party, and whose proprietor has admitted to having subscribed more than \$100,000 to various Tory campaign funds, draws the line at Mr. Foster in whom it has no confidence.

The Star has published many reflections on the ex-prohibition apostle but few more severe than was contained in one of its issues last week after that gentleman had attacked Sir Frederick Borden on the cold storage business.

We subjoin a few extracts from the Star's article and commend them to the consideration of those of our Conservative friends who still believe in Mr. Foster and are willing to follow his leadership.

The Star says:

"Mr. Foster charged Sir Frederick with having used his position as Cabinet Minister to secure a Government bonus for a company in which his son-in-law was interested, although a prior applicant seemed to have had superior claims. That is, Sir Frederick was accused of having accepted a position of trust in which he was bound in honor not to employ the powers entrusted to him to reap a profit for his own household. This public trust he was to administer for the public welfare only; and in order to keep himself above suspicion, he was expected to observe the good old rule of not accepting a personal advantage for the exercise of these powers, even if it might be defended as legitimate. In the case in question, Mr. Foster insisted that the advantage was not legitimate.

Now, it was surely the irony of fate that George E. Foster was chosen to make such a charge on behalf of the Opposition. In every tone of his voice he must have reminded Sir Frederick of the obvious retort which the

Minister did make when he arose. Mr. Foster, too, was appointed not so long ago to a position of trust. He was indeed, made the manager of a Trust Company. Furthermore, the greater part of the money which this Trust Company had in trust was the "trust fund of the widow and the orphan"—that is, the funds of an insurance society. Yet Mr. Foster used his powers in this position of trust to make a profit for himself out of the use of these trust funds.

Here we had Satan rebuking sin. Mr. Foster arraigns Sir Frederick Borden for doing in the spirit of the thing very much what he had done himself—and Sir Frederick retorted upon Mr. Foster by a reference to this patent fact, and much of the force of the Fosterian charge was thereby lost. This illustrates the unfortunate position of the Opposition with regard to several of their most forward spokesmen. Their own records mine the ground from beneath their feet when they arise to assail the mischievous practices of the government."

CURRENT COMMENT.

It is authoritatively denied that Premier Whitney has promised free school books in Ontario.

Mr. George W. Fowler's newspaper affects to be shocked at Mr. Emmerson's nomination in Westmorland. Mr. Fowler as is well known is a gentleman of high moral ideals and practices, and the country looks to him for moral example and guidance. Oh pshaw!

It is to be hoped there is no truth in the rumor that the local government will appoint one of the Supreme Court judges on the Central Railway commission. The judges should not be mixed up in partisan enquiries. They are well paid for their regular duties and should stick to them.

It is due to Mr. W. W. Hubbard to say that he discharged his duties as official reporter of the legislature in a very capable manner, that his reports were full and satisfactory, and that his courtesy and consideration for newspaper men, opponents and friends alike, were unvarying and much appreciated.

Mr. Bourassa always draws a crowd at his meetings for his hearers are sure of something sensational, but he does not always draw sufficient votes on polling day, as witness his overwhelming defeat in Bellechasse. Mr. Bourassa is at present haranguing the electors of St. James division of Montreal in his campaign against Premier Gouin.

The Solicitor General is off on a faint up river instead of attending to the Crown business in the York County Court, and another lawyer, partner of an M. P., supporting the government has charge of the case. Here is a chance for Mr. Pinder to reprove the government for permitting such a condition of things. Mr. Pinder has expressed the belief that all the Crown business should be attended to by the Attorney-General and Solicitor General.

The death is announced of General Redvers Buller the noted British soldier whose last service to the Empire was the relief of Ladysmith in the South African war. General Buller who was 69 years old had a distinguished career which however closed somewhat under a cloud on account of the generally accepted belief that he displayed poor tactics in sacrificing so many men in his alleged mistaken campaign against Ladysmith. But he was a brave and intrepid soldier and popular with the masses.

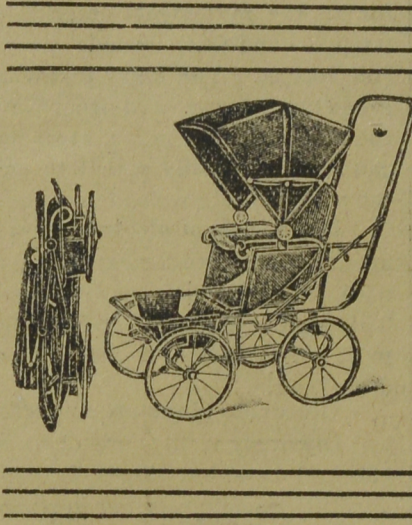
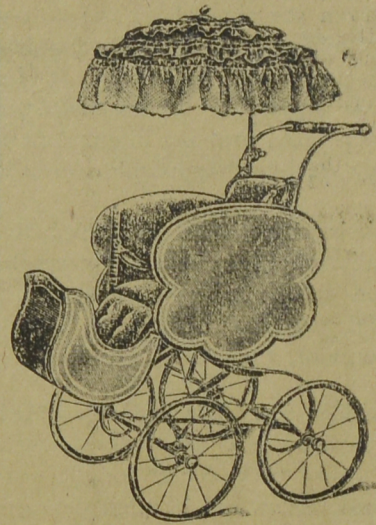
