RHINOCEROS TAKES DRUGS BY POUND.

Seven Ounces of Anaesthetics During Operation on eyes.

NEW YORK, JUNE 2.—Fifteen New York veterinarians made the discovery yesterday that the dose of anaesthetic required to put a rhinoceros to sleep is a pound and three-quarters of chloroform and half a pound of ether.

This accession to veterinarian science was made during an operation to remove cataracts on the eyes of Mogul, the Indian rhinoceros in the Bronx Zoo. Mogul after succumbing to more than half a gallon of anaesthetic, remained under its influence for an hour and at the end of that time began to crunch hay as though nothing had happened.

Through a blow on the head in his native jungle Mogul nearly lost the sight of both eyes, and the operation was agreed upon after careful examination. Dr. George G. Van Mater, professor of ophthalmology in the New York American Veterinary College, operated. Assisting him were Drs. W. Reid Blair, John E. Ryder, J. T. Grawley, Robert W. Ellis, and Robert J. When arrested and taken to the police station, Mrs. Felipia admitted that she had killed Maro, and told of a most outrageous plot of which she said she and her family had been made the victims. She declared that Maro, while living on the bounty of herself and her family, had conspired with two other men to ruin their two daughters, and through the shame of the children to extort money from the parents.

METROPOLIS OF FAR NORTH.

New Trade Outlet for Western Canada to be Established There.

Ottawa, Ont., June 2.—The first move in the direction of establishing a new outlet for western exports to the seaboard via the proposed Hudson's Bay route is now being made by the Government. A survey party, under the direction of Mr. Marrier, is being sent out by the Interior Department to lay out the townsite of Fort Churchill, the future metropolis of Hudson's Bay and the terminus of the proposed Hudson's Bay railway. The future city will be located on the eastern side of the river, opposite the ruins of old Fort Prince of Wales, and across the river from the Hudson's Bay Company's trading post. Plans and drawings of the harbor are also being prepared under the direction of the department. The present population of Fort Churchill consists of four half-breed families, a mounted policeman and one settler named William Beech.

It is expected that the Government measure providing for the construction of a railway to Hudson's Bay will be brought down in the Commons shortly.
