THE HAZEN GAN

Will be Judged at the Bar of Public Opinion Today

"These men, (Hazen and his colleagues in the local government) who of late have been slandering me, are now themselves before the bar of public opinion and the verdict against them will be given at the polls. They charge me with robbing the public treasury."

A HISTORIC REGIMENT.

Sixth Fusiliers of London Have Long Record of Service.

The last parade of the City of London Militia (the 6th Royal Fusiliers) took place at Brompton Camp, Dorset, a short time ago. They had always been employed on the side of law and order from the days of Queen Elizabeth, and, indeed, far earlier though under different designations. They are now going to join the Regular Forces and will ever be mindful that they bore a name which would never fade into forgetfulness. The record of the 6th Royal Fusiliers, who have been transferred as a complete unit from the old Militia to the new Special Reserve, dates back to A.D. 886, when King Alfred the Great was assisted by the troops sent by the City of London in defeating the Danish invaders. The regiment and its various predecessors have gone through stirring scenes, having been employed in the earliest Scottish wars, the Wars of the Barons, and every insurrection in the south of England since 1300. It was in 1559 that Queen Elizabeth mustered a regular City Militia, and thenceforward the regiment has a continuous record. At that time the Queen ordered the Lord Mayor of London to find and pay for 10,000 men, which he did. Queen Elizabeth constantly called on the City for troops, and it is on record that on one Sunday evening the Lord Mayor received the royal command to parade 1,000 men; this he accomplished by closing the church doors in the City during service and finding the required number of men among the congregations. In 1640 the City Trained Bands, the forebears of the 6th Royal Fusiliers, fought against the Scots, and at the commencement of the Civil War protected King Charles I. In a few days, however, the same men were used for guarding the members of the House of Commons on their way to and from Whitehall. Thenceforth they fought under Oliver Cromwell and greatly distinguished themselves in every action. In 1662 the Trained Bands were especially exempted from the control of the crown, and came under the orders of a newly-appointed Court Lieutenant of the City of London, which still exists, makes grants for the upkeep of the regiment, and is owner of the barracks. In 1795 the City Trained Bands were organized in two regiments, the east and the west, and were allowed privileges which are still strictly guarded. One of these is to march through the City with colors flying, bands playing, and bayonets fixed. In 1820 the two regiments were united in one, called the Royal London Militia, the present title of the 6th Battalion. The strength of the regiment is 656.

To Preserve Eggs.

An Australian chemist has invented a process of preserving eggs by desiccation. The eggs, freed from the shells, are dried at the relatively low temperature of 130 degrees. They can be rapidly executed in containers kept at this temperature, from which the air has been exhausted, and from which the moist vapor has been withdrawn as fast as it is given off by evaporation from the eggs. There is no alteration in the chemical composition of the eggs—only a loss of the greater part of the water. When thoroughly desiccated and pulverized into a coarse powder, the egg material can be preserved for an indefinite period in ordinary packages, if kept dry. The eggs are "reconstituted" by the simple addition of water to the dry powder, the resultant mass being quite indistinguishable from newly-beaten eggs.

DR. WATSON TAKES A HAND

Former Cit'zen of Fredericton makes a Stir in Unit d States Politics.

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 19.—The religious issue of this campaign is no mirage to be seen only from the next county. It may be more than offset by other forces which it sets into motion; such a possibility is another matter. But that Mr. Taft will lose a great many votes of life-long Republicans because of his defective religious status is indisputable. The minister of the Presbyterian church of which Charles P. Taft is a trustee, and Mrs. Charles P. Taft a member, and to which she pays \$600 pew tax, has publicly announced that he will vote for Bryan although never having before supported a Democrat. Before the nominations were made, when it seemed inevitable that Taft and Bryan were to be the candidates, this minister, whose name is Robert Watson, declared from his pulpit on Sunday morning that he did not see how Christian people could do otherwise than vote for Bryan, in preference to a man who rejected the divinity of the Lord Jesus Christ, and whose public life was not, according to Mr. Watson, in harmony with Christian principles. This was striking very close at home. Everybody knows that Charles P. Taft, a half-brother of the candidate, has been an exceedingly important factor in recent political events. His resources, which are very ample, went far to finance the Taft campaign for the nomination campaign for the nomination. His position as proprietor of a leading Republican newspaper had much to do with the political preference, which began to come to Brother William about as soon as he left the Law School.

Although Charles P. Taft does not often attend its services, to have the minister of this fashionable church, who is also an instructor in the Lane Theological Seminary, come out for Bryan, was naturally a distinct disappointment. Moreover, Dr. Watson, like all such people, thinks himself extraordinarily liberal about it all. He resents the idea that he is doing this in any narrow-minded, sectarian spirit.

Mr. Watson says that he admits to his church people who do not even believe the Apostles' Creed, and that in clear, sheer liberality he has few equals. He would vote for a Jew for President, provided his life measured up to the requisite standard. His objection to Taft is that, after making the famous Akron speech in denunciation of Boss Cox, it was Charles P. Taft who arose in connection with and put in nomination as first delegate to Chicago, in glowing eulogy, this same George B. Cox, and that the Taft people instead of admitting the Cox gang to their camp, which would have been bad enough, actually went over to the Cox camp themselves. Reference is made to the Foraker reconciliation at Toledo, only to be followed a few days later by dropping Foraker over the side of the ship, when Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Taft must have known all the time what kind of a man Foraker was. The Presbyterian divine wants to know if they object to Foraker's assistance only because Foraker "got caught." This theory could be punctured, but this is not the place to do it.

TERRIBLE HARDSHIPS.

Adrift in an open Canoe for thirteen Days.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 24.—A despatch from Uclulet says the two Indians lost from the sealing schooner Thomas F. Bayard, brought by the schooner Markland, Billy and his klotchman, Louise of Kyquoot, had an awful experience, being adrift in an open canoe for thirteen days with only three sea biscuits as food for ten days. They had seven biscuits, four of which were washed overboard soon after they were lost from their schooner. No water was in the canoe. The Indians allotted themselves one inch of biscuit a day, and subsisted on this for nine days. Then rain came and water was caught in a swwwww and water was caught in a sail. On the tenth day, when hope was almost gone, they killed a fur seal and cooked the carcass by making a fire in the bottom of the boat. The spear-pole was broken up and burned. The Indians snatched at the cooking meat and ate it partially cooked. They were famished, almost exhausted. On the fourteenth day after they left the schooner they landed at Bristol Bay inside False Pass, Unimak Island. While searching for water they came upon some bears and were frightened away. The canoe was overturned by the surf, the woman being caught underneath by her clothing. She was extricated with difficulty, and both were washed ashore with the canoe, which was split. It was patched with Billy's shirt and for two days was kept afloat by constant bailing until a landing was made at an abandoned hut, where two quarts of flour were found. Here they lived for eight days. They went on after the supply was exhausted, living on partially eaten fish, left on the beach by animals, and ultimately reached an Indian village. They finally boarded the steamer Dora at Belkofski and were landed at Oumalaska, from where they were brought by the Markland. Both were in a pitiable condition. Their hands and feet were swollen badly from exposure.

FOREST FIRES.
A Woman who met Death under Peculiar Circumstances.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Oct. 24.—The terrible forest fires in this vicinity have been responsible for at least one death, though it occurred under somewhat remarkable circumstances.
