



VOLUNTEER BOUNTY ACT 1908 WARNING TO PURCHASERS

EVERY assignment of the right of a South African Volunteer entitled to a land grant must be by way of appointment of a substitute and must be in the form provided by the Act. Special attention is called to Sub-section 3 of Section 5 of the Volunteer Bounty Act, 1908, which provides that no assignment of the right of a volunteer by the appointment of a substitute shall be accepted or recognized by the Department of the Interior which is not executed and dated after the date of the warrant for the land grant issued by the Minister of Militia and Defence in favor of the Volunteer.

BOY MISSING.

Believed St. John Lad has been
Drowned.

St. John Telegraph—John Parks, the nine-year-old son of George Parks of 66 Kennedy street, has been missing since Saturday morning and it is feared he has been drowned in Marble Cove. A cap was found yesterday in the water near Rowan's Point and was later identified by Mrs. Parks as having been worn by her son. Three boats with grappling irons worked all yesterday afternoon and in the evening two of the boats kept up a vigilant search till nine o'clock. The men will again grapple this morning.

The last man who saw the little fellow on Saturday was William A. Close, of 58 Kennedy Street. He was out gathering logs in a row boat and towing them into the cove. About 11.45 he was coming in with some He had to pass the yacht Dream which was lying at one of the wharves. He says he saw the boy standing on the bow of the yacht and spoke to him. There was a dog with the lad at the time.

Mr. Close had to row around to the other side of the wharf in order to secure his logs. It took some time to do this and when he again came in sight with the yacht the dog was still there but the boy was gone.

The lad's father had gone up river on the tug Champion Saturday morning and did not reach home till yesterday morning. It was nearly midnight Saturday when Mrs. Parks, alarmed by her son's non-appearance gave the alarm at the house of Mr. Parks' father, 75 Kennedy Street. Late as it was a search was instituted but without avail. Then yesterday someone brought the cap which had been found in the water.

In the meantime the lad's father had arrived and boat crews were organized with grappling irons. Mr. Parks himself went into one boat and in the other two were Lewis Logan, D. Higgins, William Parks, Arthur Estey and Scott Estey.

The friends of the bereaved parents will sympathize deeply with them in their anxiety. The boy was very bright and a great favorite with all who knew him. Besides his parents there are three sisters, and a brother, all small.

SERIOUSLY INJURED.

St. John Motorman pinned between
two Steel Cars and badly hurt.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 24.—(Special)—A misplaced switch on the tracks of the street railway caused a collision between two cars this morning, which resulted in Frank H. McFarlane, a motorman, being very seriously injured, although it is hoped not fatally.

A car going north was standing opposite the end of Douglas avenue, and Motorman McFarlane was in the doorway when the accident took place. A switch to connect the two tracks had in some way opened. Another car coming from Indiantown, was just slowing up when it struck the open switch and was thrown head on into the other car.

A cry of horror went up from the bystanders when it was seen that Motorman McFarlane was pinned between the two cars.

The cars were backed away, and tender hands carefully lowered McFarlane to the ground. He was badly cut up around the face, and showed signs of severe injuries. In an unconscious condition he was carried into Dr. Roberts' office, and was given immediate attention.

It was found that in addition to the wounds in his head he had several ribs broken, and was badly bruised.

Although his injuries are painful and serious, and will necessitate his remaining in bed for some time, it is hoped that the result will not be fatal.

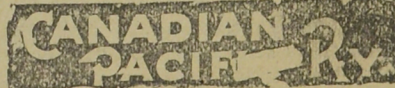

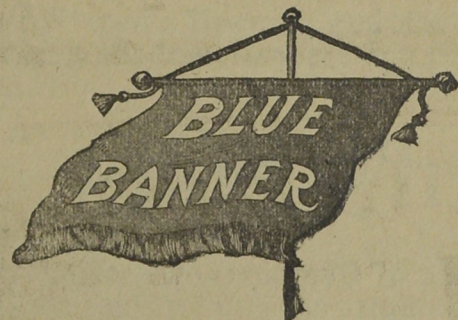
