THE PEOPLE'S VERDICT.

Electors Today Passing Upon the Record of the Laurier Government.

This was polling day in the Dominion election and unless all the signs fail the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, which has been administering the affairs of Canada so wisely for the past twelve years, will be given another lease of power. The Tories are basing all their claims for victory upon Ontario, and in the last bulletin issued from their headquarters, they are generous enough to give the Liberals ten seats in that province out of eighty-six. This bulletin was issued as a tracer to flagging Tory hopes, and is most ridiculous in the extreme. Even by practically obliterating the Liberals in Ontario the Tory statisticians awards them a total of eighty-six seats, which is more than the Tories have in the present parliament, and probably more than they will have in the next.

The polls in this city opened at nine o'clock, and closed at five. There was a big rush of people from the start, and looks as if the total vote polled would be the largest ever cast at any election in this city. Both sides have good organization, and the workers at the different polls have kept things moving pretty lively during the day. Good feeling has prevailed and there has been an absence of squabbling and loud talk around the polls.

At the court house poll the Liberals have been cleaning things up pretty well during the day, and it would not be surprising if the ballot boxes should show a two to one vote in favor of Brown. At the city hall poll both sides have put up a stiff fight, and both claim to have secured a majority of the votes. It would be a great surprise indeed if the Liberals should carry this poll, but it is not improbable.

So far as the parishes of the county are concerned it is useless at this late stage to make predictions, when the result will be known in a few hours. All reports from the country districts during the past week, have been most favorable to the Liberal candidate, and although the job he tackled a month ago was a tough one it is freely conceded to-day by men on both sides that he has more than a fighting chance to win.

Mr. J. H. Crockett, brother of the Tory candidate, went about yesterday boasting that he had five hundred dollars to wager that Oz would have 800 majority in York, and fifty to stake that the Laurier government will be defeated. A syndicate of Liberals got wind of the chance to make easy money, and promptly went on Mr. Crockett's trail. This morning they succeeded in landing him, and the bet was promptly taken. Mr. Crockett has been busy during the day telephoning to the different polls that he has money wagered on Oz and Borden, his object being to endeavor to influence the vote. No doubt when he made the offer at first he imagined that he would frighten the Liberals, but in this he came in for a very bad sell. His chances of winning the bets do not look very bright at this moment.

THE U. N. B. WON OUT.

Secured an Easy Victory over the Algonquins on Saturday.

The Algonquin football team of St. John was taken into camp by the University boys on Saturday to the tune of ten to nothing. It was a good game in many respects, but the college boys appeared to have things pretty much their own way. They played in much better form than in the game with Chatham earlier in the week, and there is no denying that they have the makings of a first class team.

The Algonquins were kept on the defensive nearly all the way through and were several times compelled to touch for safety. Mr. W. E. Jardine of the Bank of N. B., who played with St. John, made the first safety touch after play been in progress ten minutes. A little later Archie Babbitt of the Varsity made a touching goal. At the end of fifteen minutes play Kinghorn got hold of the ball and scored the first try for his team, but it was not converted into a goal. With three minutes to play Spicer got the ball from a scrum and scored the second try. The first half ended with the score standing 6 to 0 in favor of the U. N. B.

In the second half after eight minutes play Dolan of the U. N. B. dropped a goal from the thirty yard line, he being the only one to score during this half. The play was continued at a lively pace and before the close the Algonquins were compelled to touch for safety three times. Mr. Richard Bingham officiated as referee in a very satisfactory manner. The Algonquins returned home on Saturday evening.

The Acadia football team, which is considered one of the best in the province, will play the U. N. B. here on Thursday next, when a great game may be expected. In the evening a dance will be given at the college in honor of the visitors.
