NO COMPROMISE.

If every Liberal in New Brunswick takes the same stand towards the Hazen government as that occupied by Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P. that miserably apology for an administration will soon be a thing of the past—a mere melodorous memory.

The Tories in Carleton tried to make terms with Mr. Carvell in the local bye-election, they first held out the olive branch to him, and when that did not work they used threats. Mr. Carvell could have named the Carleton man to fill the legislative vacancy in that constituency so far as the Tories were concerned, but he said "no compromise with the enemy stand up and we'll fight it out with you," and this sentiment Mr. Carvell emphasized at the Liberal convention that nominated Mr. Upham.

"I don't care who the Tories bring out, I am in this fight until the last minute," said Mr. Carvell. "They came to me to make a deal whereby in return for their agreeing not to protest my election, I would see that no Liberal opposition would be given their nominee for the legislature. I wouldn't consider their offer a single minute. I told them to go ahead and protest me just as fast as they wanted to. In the late campaign I knew I was going to be elected, so I made it my business to keep my hands clean, and land the other fellow, and I did it. Let them bring on their protest. We'll make no trades, no deals, no saw-offs. I don't care what man they bring out, we'll try to trim him."

That's the spirit that keeps a party up to the fighting point and that wins victories.

The more Frank Carvells we have in the Liberal party in New Brunswick, the more victories we shall win.

It was that spirit, that unflinching courage that sent Mr. Carvell into Kings where he put the last nail in the coffin of George W. Fowler, it was the same spirit and pluck that put Mr. Fred Hale out of political business in Carleton, and added the finishing touches to Mr. Frank Smith and to Mr. Carvell is due all the praise.

The same spirit will defeat the Hazen candidates in Carleton and Northumberland and there is ample evidence that it is aroused and active in the good cause.

No concession—no compromise with Hazen and his associates is the watchword of Liberals. They were deceived once, they were led to the slaughter last March by deceit and chicanery but that can never be repeated.

THE CARLETON CONTEST.

One of the misfortunes of Mr. W. J. Owens the Tory candidate in Carleton is that he is very little known outside of his immediate neighborhood while his opponent, Mr. Upham has been over the course, has large business interests and enjoys much popularity in the constituency.

Besides it is well known that Mr. Owens is merely a stop-gap candidate. He was the not the first or second of his party which wanted at least three other men who could not be induced to enter the field.

Mr. Owens thus enters the contest badly handicapped while Mr. Upham was the first and unanimous choice of the Liberals who are enthusiastic in his support.

But back of all that is the unpopularity of the Hazen government and the prestige of Mr. Carvell's victory which will strongly tell in Mr. Upham's favor.

The Liberals are going into the fight with the intention of winning and the campaign, although short will be exceedingly vigorous.

The official nominations will be made on Tuesday next and that evening the Liberal campaign will be formally opened with a rally in the Woodstock Opera House at which the speakers will include: Mr. Upham, Hon. C. W. Robinson leader of the opposition, Organizer Copp, Hon. F. J. Sweeney, Hon. H. A. McKeown, Hon. W. P. Jones, F. B. Carvell and others.

CURRENT COMMENT.

There are already two senatorial vacancies in Nova Scotia and a third is imminent. The veteran Senator Miller is dangerously ill at Annapolis, Cape Breton.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, the Canadian Postmaster General had the honor of an audience with the King today and was dined by the Prince of Wales. It is to be hoped that such distinguished honors will not drive rural mail delivery out of his head.

Saskatchewan may lay first claim to being the banner Liberal province and New Brunswick is a good second. The former province sends ten members to the House of Commons, nine of them are Liberals and only thirty-five votes stood against a clean sweep—that being Conservative Lakes majority in one of the constituencies.

The Tory press comments—where there are any—on the Northumberland mix-up are certainly amusing. The local craft organ seems to be pursuing the wisest course by absolutely ignoring the things that happened in Northumberland and are making Mr. Hazen absolutely sick. There really isn't much to be said when a fellow receives such a knock out blow as has been administered to Mr. Hazen over north.

The city council made a good bargain in settling with the company that furnished the new pumps at the Water Works and thus avoided costly litigation. The result is that the city secures at a reduction of several hundred dollars from the original contract. The present council is giving the city excellent service and is entitled to the gratitude and support of the ratepayers.

The Liberal nomination of Hon. J. P. Burchill in Northumberland has been received with great enthusiasm throughout the constituency and all over the province and there seems no reasonable doubt of his election by a large majority. Mr. Swin's candidature is not taken seriously by even his own party friends, and the manner in which it was brought about is regarded as a studied insult to Mr. Morrissey, whose son was among the men that nominated Mr. Burchill.

Mr. Hazen has lost prestige not only in the province but all over Canada. With a great show of boasting he promised the Tory party at least ten seats in New Brunswick and got just two and Mr. Hazen's political associates in the other provinces have concluded that he knew nothing about the public sentiment in his own province for they know now that he was unable to deliver the goods. When they learn what a mess he has made of local politics, when they learn his government is threatened with extinction before the close of the present term, they cannot help concluding that Mr. Hazen is a massive failure as a politician and statesman. Poor Hazen, his present plight is pitiable.

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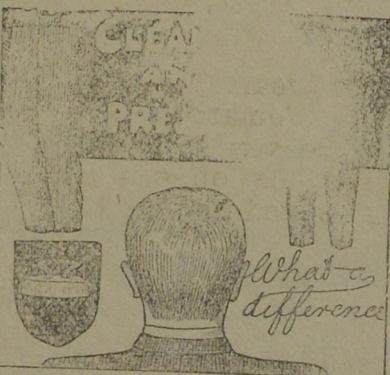
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
