THE ST. PAUL'S VACANCY

Congregation Takes Action with View to Securing New Pastor.

A well attended meeting of St. Paul's church, called to take steps to fill the pastoral vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. Willard MacDonald, was held in the Auld Kirk last evening. Rev. Gordon Dickie of St. John, acting moderator, presided and Mr. S. H. MacFarlane acted as secretary.

A report from the committee which conveyed to the Presbytery the congregation's action on the pastor's resignation, was read and adopted.

A resolution passed by the Presbytery, expressing regret at Rev. MacDonald's resignation, was also read to the meeting.

The committee on interim supply was authorized to continue the arrangement with Rev. Mr. Annand and endeavor to have him remain until the vacancy is filled.

It was decided to refer the matter of filling the vacancy to a committee of nine, which will include three from the congregation, three from the trustee board, and three from the session. They will submit the names of candidates to a future meeting of the congregation. Messrs. Willard Kitchen, Dr. W. C. Crockett, L. W. Johnston were accordingly appointed to represent the congregation.

At a committee of the session held immediately after the congregational meeting, Messrs. Walter MacFarlane, S. H. MacFarlane and W. M. Clarke were appointed members of the committee.

The trustee board has not yet selected its quota.
