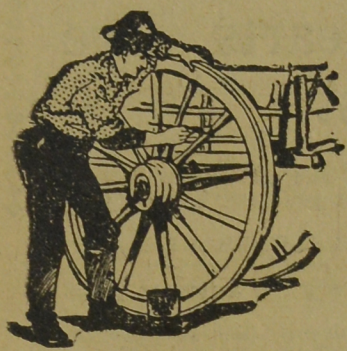

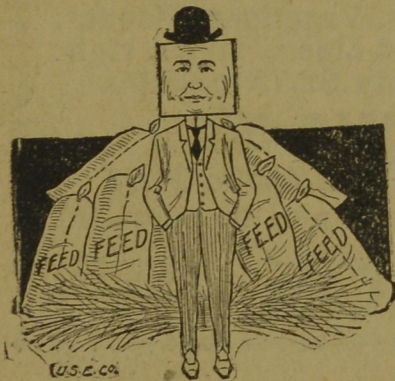

GIRL SOMNAMBULIST.

Writes, Reads and Crochets While
Asleep.

A remarkable case of a somnambu-
list who can work and write in the
darkness is told in this week's "Bri-
tish Medical Journal" by Dr. James
Russell, M. A., assistant physician to
the Birmingham General hospital.

The case came under his notice in
July, 1907, when a girl, aged twenty-
one years, was sent to the hospital
complaining of sleep-walking. She
was a typist, a teacher, and a stud-
ent of music.

The girl first commenced to walk
in her sleep after her father commit-
ted suicide by shooting himself.

When she is sleep-walking she does
many things. She gets out of bed at
about 1 o'clock in the morning. "She
does not seem to be asleep, but she
has no sense of her surroundings, nor
does she recognize anyone."

In this condition she writes let-
ters and postcards in German, does
crochet work, reads a book and stu-
dies harmony. She does all this in
absolute darkness. If there is a
faint glimmer from the gas she takes
her work away to the darkest corner
of the room.

On August 17, 1907, says Dr.
Hincks, the house physician in the
Birmingham hospital, she sat up in
bed and did crochet work. She did
not talk. The ward was dark, except
for two single lights far away from
the bed. Then she got out of bed
and wrote a postcard, addressing it
to a relation in Canada. The next
night she did more crochet work, and
wrote a letter in German, put it in
an envelope, and enclosed a sover-
eign.

When she awoke the letter was
shown her. She did not remember
writing it, but recognized the ad-
dress as correct. Dr. Hincks asked
her while she was awake to write
the same address under the same con-
ditions of light. This she could not
do properly. The lines all ran into
each other.

A few days later when in a som-
nambulist state she wrote a short
letter to her music teacher, and a
short essay on "The Sonata Form,"
which was perfectly accurate and in-
telligent.

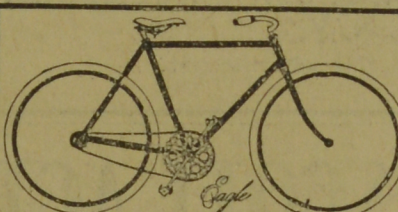
She has now left the hospital and
earns her living as a typist, but she
still has occasional night wander-
ings. Her eyes have been examined,
but the doctors have been unable to
find out why she can read and write
in the darkness, when in her normal
condition it is impossible for her to
do so.

GIRLS PUNCH BOLD YOUNG HUGGER HARD.

Avenge Insults While Crowd Cheers Them—Police Rescued Him.

NEW YORK, March 30.—Nicholas Piclone, twenty years old, No. 117, Throop avenue, Williamsburg, was well whipped yesterday by two young women, whom he tried to kiss and hug at Throop avenue and Ellery street, Miss Annie Gambel, twenty years old, No. 97 Classon avenue, was one of the girls who resented Piclone's act. The other girl would not tell her name.

For an hour or more Piclone had been annoying women, when Miss Gambel came along. She passed the corner where Piclone grabbed her around the waist. With a scream Miss Gambel attacked him with both fists. One well-directed blow made him stagger. Before he could recover, Miss Gambel, followed up her advantage, landing several blows. She was aided by the other young woman, who said Piclone attempted to hug her and for five minutes the two pumelled the youth. He tried to flee, but the crowd which collected prevented his escape and urged the girls to hit him harder.

Piclone was finally rescued by Policeman Finley, of the Vernon avenue station, who took him before Magistrate Higginbotham in the Lee Avenue Police court. The magistrate complimented Miss Gambel on her pluck, and held Piclone in \$500 bail.

SEVENTY MINERS MET DEATH

Party Fighting Fire in Mine When Explosion Took Place.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 29.—Between sixty-five and seventy persons lost their lives in explosions late Saturday night in coal mine No. 1, of the Union Pacific Coal company at Hanna. The explosions were caused by gases and coal dust, and were followed by fire. The first explosion occurred at three o'clock in the afternoon, killing eighteen miners, including a superintendent and three bosses. The second explosion occurred at 10.20 o'clock at night, mauling out the lives of from forty to fifty rescuers, including State Mine Inspector D. M. Ellis.

When the second explosion occurred additional appeals were telegraphed to all surrounding towns for assistance.

The bodies of four of the eighteen men who lost their lives in the first explosion were found, but owing to increasing volume of gas, which threatened to explode at any moment no effort was made to remove them to the surface.

Fire started in the colliery last Sunday. Since that time attempts at regular intervals were made to extinguish the blaze. Yesterday it was deemed unsafe to send miners down, and they were told not to report for duty. Superintendent Briggs, with the best and most experienced hands in the camp, went into the mine to fight the fire, but at 3 o'clock the fire reached the gas and a terrific explosion followed. In a few minutes many men volunteered to enter the mine to rescue any survivor. The fire hindered the rescuers, but they made some progress. After a long struggle the volunteers got well into the mine. Those on the surface had been gun to expect results, but at 10.30 o'clock the camp was startled by a second explosion that partly shut off the shaft of the mine, and most likely killed the volunteers. The victims are below the tenth level, and it is probable the flames have consumed their bodies.

HARVEY STATION.

March 31.—The services in the Presbyterian church on Sunday were conducted by Rev. James Ross of St. John. He gave a very interesting and instructive address on "The Home Mission work of the church. At the Station in the evening he also spoke on temperance at the Sunday school in the afternoon.

A meeting of the congregation is announced to be held on April 9th, for the purpose of moderating in a call to a minister.

John C. Thompson, an old and highly respected resident of Maguindy, died at his home there last week, after a short illness. He was a blacksmith, and has carried on the trade there for many years.

Six cars of superphosphate and other fertilizers have been received here this season, for the use of the farmers, who find that it is profitable to use.

James Swan & Sons of Tweed-side have fitted up their grist mill for the manufacture of cattle feed, which they are making from buckwheat, oats and corn. They have recently secured a car of corn from the United States.

NATURE AND ADVERTISING.

What Publicity Did For Mammoth Cave Half a Century Ago.

What happens when advertising stops is well shown in an article recently printed in the Philistine. The writer takes up the Mammoth cave of Kentucky as an example of what publicity does for even a wonder of nature.

Up to about 1870 the cave was well advertised. As the Philistine remarks, a visit to it was considered a sort of finishing touch to one's education, and a person who could not talk intelligently about it had no standing in polite society.

Records kept at the Mammoth Cave hotel from the time it was opened in 1837 show that while the place was being advertised in various ways the number of visitors was many times what it is now. When the publicity promoter knows it not. In 1844, for instance, when the population was less than 20,000,000 instead of the eighty odd millions of today, those who came to see the natural curiosity numbered on an average ninety-three a day. They traveled hundreds and thousands of miles, for many crossed the Atlantic to behold it. Sixty-one years later, in 1905, the average was less than a dozen a day.

The public simply has been permitted to forget that Kentucky's Mammoth cave exists. The man who owned it died in 1869, and his thirteen heirs, scattered all over the country, simply devoted themselves to spending the income that they derived from the \$2 a head admission fee. They thought the financial stream would keep on running without any expenditure on their part for advertising. They have been disappointed, of course.

As soon as the advertising was abandoned the people became indifferent about the cave, and finally it figured no longer as one of the great show places of the world.

In the language of the Philistine, caves are not necessary to human happiness until some man by astute advertising fills men and women with a desire to see them, and when the advertising ceases the desire ceases also.

Liberal advertising is essential to success. The story of the Mammoth cave of Kentucky is only one of thousands that prove the truth of this.

And do not forget also that when there is a let-up in business the man who advertises his wares more than his competitor is going to get the orders and make money.

The Famous Claridge's.

The name of Claridge's is well known to every visitor to London. The famous hotel in which princes and millionaires are, so to speak, "three a penny," is about to celebrate its centenary. When it was opened, early in 1808, it was known as Mivart's, after the name of its founder, M. Mivart, a celebrated chef of the period. Mivart has one great claim to fame which no visitor to London should deny. He was the first hotel proprietor to provide his patrons with a bathroom, a fact which he advertised extensively. In 1850 Mivart sold the business to Mr. and Mrs. Claridge, a butler and housekeeper in a dual family. It is now run by a company.—Argonaut.

Light From Darkness.

"I learned a new trick the other day," admitted the man who thinks he knows about all the tricks there are to be known. "I was making a call on a friend whose apartment is fitted with gas mantle lights. The light in the reception room was poor because the mantle had turned black. But my friend's wife knew the secret of turning it back to its original color, and I stood amazed to see her throw salt into the chimney all over the mantle. The salt caused the flame to blaze up all around the mantle, and gradually the char disappeared, and the light was as bright and clear as when the mantle was new. That's a thing worth knowing."—New York Globe.

Drink In Scotland.

Drunkennes in Scotland appears to be on the increase, according to the judicial statistics for 1906, just issued. In some instances the drunkennes reached absolutely appalling degrees. In the little town of Blairgowrie, in Perthshire, with a population of well under 5,000, the proportion of cases of drunkennes reached 1,042 per 10,000 of the population, or one case for every ten men, women and children of the inhabitants.

Lucky Thirteen.

Few people will have had the courage to sit down thirteen at table for the greeting of a new year. But fifty-five years ago Lord Roberts was one of thirteen who sat down to dinner on New Year's day at Peshawar. Eleven years later—though most of them had been through the Indian mutiny and half of them had been wounded—they were all alive. And Lord Roberts is still very much alive.—London Chronicle.

The Spanish Stiletto.

The classic "navaja," without which no romance of Spanish life is conceivable and which, according to tradition, all the fair sisters of Carmen carry as well as their brethren, is doomed to disappear. The Spanish minister of the Interior, Senor Lacierva, has just issued a decree forbidding the sale or the use of any pointed knife, dagger or stiletto having a blade longer than six inches.
