OUTLOOK IN ST. JOHN

Government has Fine Prospects of carrying every Seat
---Mr. Maxwell a great Failure

(Special to The Herald.)
St. John, Feb. 7: The opposition have not the slightest hope of carrying the County of St. John, which returns two members to the legislature.

Indeed it is morally certain that the two government candidates, the Hon. H. A. McKeown and Mr. Lowell, will have a majority of between five and six hundred in the County of St. John.

However, they pretend to have greater hopes in the City, although why they should, is very difficult to understand, unless the calculations of the government are very far astray, and we do not believe that they are.

The City of St. John will be carried by the government with a majority of about 500.

No constituency in New Brunswick has been better treated by the Provincial Government than the City of St. John.

In addition to the amount that has been given to it to assist in the creation of terminal facilities including an elevator at that port, the government has recently assisted in the building of a very extensive cold storage plant which will be of the utmost value both to the city and province by enabling the products of the province to be kept until such time as the market is suitable for their sale or export.

The four candidates that have been put up by the opposition in St. John certainly do not commend themselves to the people of that city as likely to further their interests.

Mr. Hatheway, who sometime ago was claiming to be running in the interests of the working man, is very unpopular in St. John by reason of his attempt to obtain from the city \$40,000 in the shade of compensation for an unexpired lease when the city of St. John very cunningly obtained wharves on the West Side.

Mr. Hatheway who always pretended to be very much interested in the future of St. John, very cunningly obtained a lease of certain water lots on the West Side were likely to be built. This lease ran for 15 years and half the term had expired when the city wanted these lots for deep water wharves. The only building that Mr. Hatheway had put on the lots, was a small shed which may have cost \$200 at the outside, yet he demanded \$40,000 for the surrender of these lots and attempted to enforce his claim. The arbitrators gave him 55,800, or just one eighth of the amount he asked and most people thought that they gave him just ten times too much. It was very natural under these circumstances, that Mr. Hatheway should be at the foot

of the poll at the general election of 1903.

Mr. Maxwell who was elected in the by-election in 1904, after the resignation of the Hon. H. A. McKeown, is never likely to sit in the legislative halls of New Brunswick again.

At the time of his election, the Liberal candidate for the House of Commons in the city had been beaten by a majority of 1211 and the Liberals were naturally discouraged after such a defeat. Yet at the by-election held about six weeks afterwards, Mr. Maxwell had only a majority of 107 votes against Mr. Pinder. Mr. Skinner had a majority of upwards of 200 in the south end of the city so that Mr. Maxwell obtained his majority on the West Side and in the North End. A little more effort on the part of the Liberals and Mr. Maxwell never would have sat in the legislature of New Brunswick.

It is quite impossible that he ever should be elected again, for he has clearly proved that he is not the kind of a man that the city of St. John requires as a representative.

Dr. McInerney, who is a new man and has taken the place of his brother who sat for some years in the House of Commons, but was defeated at the last general election for the legislature, appears to be utterly ignorant of the political conditions in New Brunswick, as was shown by his speech on the night he received the nomination of the party. On that evening he proceeded to attack the government on account of the succession duty, a duty which every civilized country now uses for the purpose of raising revenue, and which in New Brunswick does not bear hardly on any person, because it does not touch any estate under \$50,000 where the property goes to the widow, children, or other direct heir. He also attacked the government for imposing a tax on dogs, although it is well known that no such tax has ever been imposed by any New Brunswick government, that being a matter which is left to the municipalities.

Dr. McInerney is a son of a gentleman formerly sat in the legislative council of this province and who was usually known as "Hannibal McInerney" because at the time of Confederation he said "that like Hannibal, he would swear his sons upon the altar always to oppose the union of the British North American Colonies and to vote for its repeal."

We do not know whether Dr. McInerney holds the same view as his estimable sire, but it is not likely that he will have an opportunity of airing his opinions in the legislative assembly whatever they may be.

The City of St. John will return the whole government ticket as will the county of St. John.
