TO TAX CIVIL SERVANTS.

The decision of the Supreme court on the taxation of Dominion officials has created quite a lot of talk about the city, and it is quite probable that as a result of that decision all civil servants and government officials living in Fredericton will be invited to pay an income tax this year. St. John tried the experiment this year, and it is said to have worked well, although some officials clubbed together and carried a test case to the Supreme court. 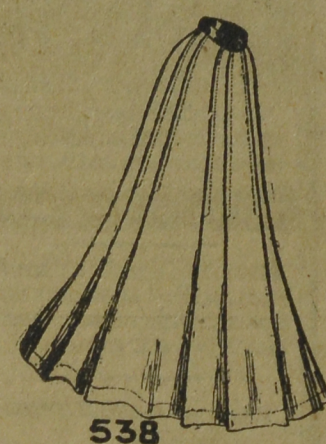
