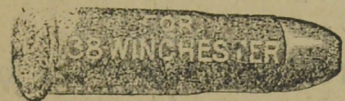

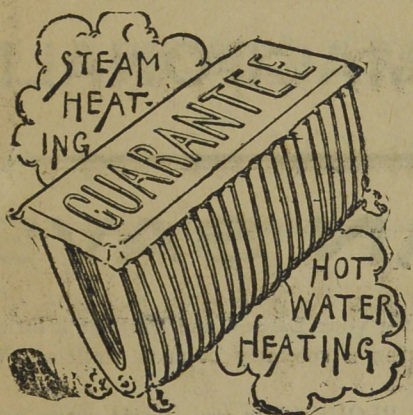

Queen's Chinese Chow Dog.

Not the least important passenger by the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Ireland, which arrived at Liverpool from Canada recently, was a fine specimen of the Chinese chow dog, a gift from King Edward's equerry, Col. Sir Henry Knollys, to Queen Alexandra. In order to acquire the dog Capt. M. H. Hamer of the 128th Baluchis, Indian army, undertook, on behalf of the donor, a journey of 12,000 miles. Connected with the Indian frontier forces, Capt. Hamer went from the Afghanistan hill station with which he was associated into the Chinese empire, and was there successful in obtaining a beautiful specimen of the chow dog, which in build and style of coat, excepting the color, which is a light brown, somewhat resembles the popular Pomeranian. Having acquired the dog, Capt. Hamer continued his journey to Vancouver and thence to Montreal, where he embarked on the Empress of Ireland.

Water Gate Restored.

Inigo Jones' famous water-gate on the Thames (Eng.) Embankment, built in 1626, for the use of the Duke of Buckingham, has been restored to use after a century and a half of neglect. It is a fine, historic structure, but it gradually became half-buried during the nineteenth century, as the arch of Severus was slowly immersed by the rising ground of the Roman Forum. Workmen have been clearing away the accumulated earth, with a view to the use of the steps and gate by the King.

BRITONS DRINK MORE.

Unemployed in Britain and in America Compared.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—John Burns, Labor leader and president of the local government board, drew down upon his head the anathemas of the Laborites when in the House of Commons this afternoon, he intimated that the main disadvantage under which the British unemployed labored as compared to the unemployed in America was that the Britons drank more than their transatlantic counterparts.

Mr. Burns repudiated the suggestion that the difference lay in the fact that the American unemployed had money in their pockets.

"I have been in America three times," he said, "and the only difference I saw between the unemployed in America and those of this country was that the former for a short time after losing work were better dressed. Many of them do not drink so much as so many British unemployed workmen, but British workmen have an advantage in the number of days they are idle."

Loud cries of "It is true; it is a shameful comparison," greeted Mr. Burns' statement.

DISTINGUISHED OFFICER.

Son of Col. McLean promoted to Captaincy in British Army—A fine Record

Hard on the heels of his victory in Queens-Sunbury, Col. H. H. McLean, M. P., elect, yesterday received good news from his son, C. Weldon McLean, who must now be styled Captain. He has been Lieutenant in the Royal Horse Artillery of the British Army, and has just been promoted to a captaincy in this, the crack corps of the Imperial forces.

At the age of twenty-seven, Capt. McLean holds rank which usually is not attained in that corps until years beyond those which have passed over his head. He has had a remarkable successful military career, and the latest good news from him will be received with great pleasure by admiring friends in St. John and elsewhere throughout Canada, while Col. McLean has an added reason for the hearty congratulations of his friends at this time.

HAS FORCED RAPIDLY AHEAD.

Captain McLean, as will be well remembered, was lieutenant in G. company of the first Canadian contingent from Canada to the South African war, and was then only eighteen years of age. He received flattering notice of his conduct during the war, and correspondents sent excellent reports about him, among them being the following reference in the Halifax Herald, to Lieut. McLean at Paardeburg: "The boy McLean of G. company never ceased to smile even under the hottest fire, and if ever there was a lad who won his spurs it was this strapping in his teens, who, given the opportunity, showed what sort of stuff he was made of."

Frederick Hanneton, war correspondent, also wrote highly of him.

Lieut. McLean drew the favorable attention of Lord Methuen by his clever maps of the country where the forces were operating, and Lord Methuen had him appointed to a command in the Royal Field Artillery home on furlough soon.

MAIL ORDER WIVES.

Not Satisfactory Says Joseph Sturgis.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—A despatch to the Herald from Marshall, Mich., says: That the "mail order wife" as an investment does not fill the bill and rarely comes up to the description and specifications in the advertisement is the testimony given in court today by Joseph Sturgis, a Lee farmer.

Mr. Sturgis, qualifying as an expert, swore he had thrice married what he called "mail order women," and found them unsatisfactory.

After successfully escaping from two of them through the courts, he corresponded with one in New York city. On the stand he said he had sent the woman \$300 before he ever saw her. Then she urged him to come to New York city and see her, sending her \$500 more in advance to assure her of his coming.

He forwarded the required sum, and when he got there found her an invalid in a wheel chair. She said she was awfully sorry to have deceived him so regarding her beauty, but that she had wealthy relatives in England whom she expected to die very soon, and just as soon as they did she would pay him \$10 for every dollar he had let her have. So Joseph gave up another \$500 and she sent him on an errand to a dressmaker. When Joseph got to the dressmak-

er's she rushed to him, threw her arms about his neck and wanted him to marry her straightway. Joseph agreed, and they were soon married. They came to Marshall and then went to live on the farm.

The latest Mrs. Sturgis told "Joe" that the "corned lobsters" around this country "didn't look very good to her," and after she had spent her husband's money she returned to New York and Joseph applied for a divorce.
