WARNING TO PURCHASERS

EVERY assignment of the right of a South African Volunteer entitled to a land grant must be by way of appointment of a substitute and must be in the form provided by the Act. Special attention is called to Sub-section 3 of Section 5 of the Volunteer Bounty Act, 1908, which provides that no assignment of the right of a substitute shall be accepted or recognized by the Department of the Interior which is not executed and dated after the date of the warrant for the land grant issued by the Minister of Militia and Defence in favor of the Volunteer.

PLAYED TO A TIE.

Hot Football Match between U. N. B.
and St. John Algonquins.

The U. N. B. football team in the first game of their tour, played the St. John Algonquins to a tie, 3 to 3, at St. John on Saturday.

About 4:15 U. N. B. kicked off, the St. John boys having won the toss for choice of field, thus having wind and sun in their favor.

The ball went to the Algonquins' end of the field almost immediately, owing to Deedes' strong kick not being returned. A good run by Willis was stopped by Covey and a series of scrims which followed on the Algonquin five-yard line failed to give U. N. B. a score, though the St. John line was crossed several times. On one of these occasions Kinghorn scored what the College boys and some of the spectators thought was a try, but a ten-yard scrim was awarded.

Soon after this, a dribble was started by Covey and Jones, the U. N. B. fullback was beaten out by the speedy St. John man in the race for the ball. A try was scored which Covey was unable to convert. The drop-out from the 25-yard line gave a scrim near the U. N. B. line owing to an offside, and though St. John had several opportunities for further scoring their opponents seemed to play rather too strong a defensive game; half time score: Algonquins, 3; U. N. B., 0.

SECOND HALF.

U. N. B. had the wind in the second half and started well, but the Algonquins soon forced the play into U. N. B. territory. After much scrimmaging, a dribble started by Deedes, carried the ball to the Algonquins' end of the field, where a free kick was awarded on an interference by St. John. The kick was a very difficult one—the wind of course, making it more so—but "Cap." Deedes put the ball over the bar almost squarely between the posts. Algonquins, 3; U. N. B., 3.

From this out the play was more even, play going from one end of the field to the other. The chief feature of the second half seemed to be the frequent injuries to the players. Willis and Jones, of U. N. B., were laid out for short periods, the former being in a state of coma for the rest of the game. Of the Algonquins, Fleming, Finley and Covey, received more or less serious injuries. Toward the end of the game Dever lost a fine chance to score through his going into touch when he could easily have passed inside. After this there was nothing but scrims—U. N. B. heeled out well, but the connection with the halves not being very rapid, the St. John halves were generally able to hold their opponents to small gains or actual losses. The play ended with a scrim in the centre of the field.

MR. WILMOT IS SORE

Tory Candidate in Sunbury-Queens
Feel His Defeat Very Keenly.

The declaration proceedings for the election in Sunbury-Queens took place at the court house at Gagetown on Saturday afternoon in the presence of a good sized crowd of spectators. The returning officer, Sheriff Holden, went carefully over the returns from the several polls, and declared Col. McLean only elected by a majority of fifty-two.

Col. McLean in a brief but happy address heartily thanked the electors of Queens-Sunbury for returning him as their representative in the House of Commons. Having reposed their confidence in him he would be untiring in his efforts to advance the interests of the united counties at Ottawa. He thanked those who had voted and worked for him, and intimated that he had none but kindly feelings for those who had opposed him.

Mr. Wilmot, who followed Col. McLean while practically admitting that

money had been expended on his behalf, went on to accuse his opponent of adopting unfair means to win the election. He intimated that a full investigation would be held.

Col. McLean in reply stated that information of wrong doing on the part of Conservative workers was in his possession, and he challenged his opponent to go ahead with the investigation just as soon as he wished. He went on to say that the Liberals had been badly beaten in Sunbury and Queens in last March but had swallowed their medicine like men. It was now up to the Conservatives to show that they knew how to take defeat as well as victory.

The Colonel's remarks were very heartily applauded by the spectators.

Michaud's majority is the largest ever obtained by a candidate in Victoria, Madawaska and the largest secured by any candidate in the Maritime Provinces in the recent election. 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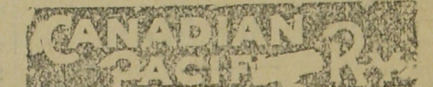
