GREAT LIBERAL VICTORY

Corrected election returns indicate that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will have a larger majority in the new parliament than he had in the one dissolved a few weeks ago, and that he has carried all the provinces except Ontario and Manitoba.

Next to the great Liberal triumph in New Brunswick, the outstanding feature of the result is the gain Laurier made in Ontario.

At the opening of the campaign, Mr. Hanna, the boastful provincial secretary of that province, declared at the Opera house in this city that the Tories would have 65 of the 86 seats in Ontario, and as late as Saturday night last, the local graft organ gave the Liberals only 10 seats. The actual results show that Ontario is pretty nearly evenly divided, the Tories having the small lead of six.

Quebec, as usual, stood by her favorite son, and the only Liberal losses were in Manitoba, British Columbia, and Nova Scotia. However, the Liberal representation is more equally distributed over Canada than in the last parliament, and Liberals have nothing to complain of from Monday's contest.

Here in New Brunswick the Liberal party was never so strong, and Dr. Pugsley has received a telegram from Sir Wilfrid Laurier acknowledging this province as the banner Liberal one.

It is no wonder that the Liberals are elated. They have won out against one of the dirtiest campaigns ever put up by a political party in this country, and they have saved Canada the disgrace of returning to office, men who, when in power, previous to 1896, brought shame and confusion on the Dominion.

MR. CARVELL'S VICTORY.

News of Mr. Carvell's great victory in Carleton in one of the hottest fights of the campaign, was received with the greatest possible enthusiasm all over the country.

There is no brighter, more energetic or more promising Liberal politician in all Canada than Mr. Carvell.

In his first term in parliament he quickly jumped into the front rank as a skilled debater and energetic worker, he was accorded the fullest confidence by the Liberal leader, and because of his prominence and his great influence, he was marked by the Tories for decapitation.

A clear, fearless fighter, a gentleman of splendid personal reputation, standing well in his profession, and a keen forceful politician. Mr. Carvell was one of the Liberal leaders who must be got rid of at any cost, and so the Tories entered upon a campaign of abuse and vilification to secure his defeat in Carleton. Mr. Carvell had to fight the Tory party in his constituency only a few months after they had achieved a notable victory in the local elections. He had arrayed against him all the forces of the local government, headed by Prov. Secy. Fleming, he was misrepresented and maligned from one end of the constituency to the other, but even with their 500 majority in March last, and the whole campaign of slander, they were unable to down him, and he has the intense satisfaction of having won one of the greatest victories of the whole contest.

Mr. Carvell not only won his own constituency, but he did good service in assisting Liberals in other counties. He spoke in Sunbury for Col. McLean, and in Kings, where he met and defeated Geo. W. Fowler in debate, and both constituencies were redeemed.

Mr. Carvell is one of the chief hopes of the Liberal party, not only in New Brunswick but in Canada, and every Liberal from Laurier down, is glad that Carleton's popular representative has been sent back to parliament.

SMITH AND MORRISON.

It is perhaps unkind and ungenerous to exult over a fallen foe, but the Liberals of New Brunswick cannot help feeling a great deal of satisfaction at the defeat of Mr. Frank Smith and Mr. Donald Morrison, respectively the Tory candidates in Carleton and Northumberland.

These men, puffed up with an enormous sense of their own importance, were sent to the legislature a few years ago, but concluded that the local arena was too cramped for them to display the great statesman-like qualities with which nature and experience had endowed them, and so nothing short of parliament would suit them.

Well, something has happened, and they are neither members of the legislature nor yet entitled to sit in parliament, and the country loses nothing by their exclusion from those bodies.

It was boasted on their behalf that they did great work as scavengers in the legislative accounts committee, that they were the men who uncovered Liberal graft, and laid the wires which were to destroy Dr. Pugsley, but the other thing has happened. The bombs that were intended to wreck the Minister of Pub-

lic Works, exploded prematurely, and the muckrakers at the other end of the wire have been politically mangled and killed.

Smith and Morrison were two of the chief conspirators against Dr. Pugsley and other Liberals. There was nothing too nasty for them to say in private or public against the Minister. They fairly lived and thrived in muckraking, and today where are they. Down and out, politically jeered at by even their own friends, as little men who thought they could mount to positions of honor by means of slander and calumny against political opponents—little contemptible men, scarcely worthy a parting kick from the gentlemen whom they sought to destroy.

CURRENT COMMENT.

All the Liberal Ministers except Hon. Mr. Templeman in Victoria, B. C., were triumphantly re-elected.

"The Last Hours of Laurism," as the Daily Glimmer put it in scare headlines on Saturday, will be drawn out into years.

May we suggest that Hon. Dr. Pugsley is the proudest man in New Brunswick, and that Premier Hazen is the most depressed.

"New Brunswick holds the palm," says Laurier, in referring to Monday's great Liberal victory. The declaration will make Mr. Hazen wince.

The Tories sneered at Col. McLean's peanut and lemonade campaign, but the Colonel is a member of parliament and Mr. Wilmot is left at home.

The Foresters of Canada are very much pleased over the defeat of Fowler, Pope, Bennett and Lefebvre. If Foster had gone down their joy would have been complete.

Every Canadian Liberal will rejoice exceedingly at the glorious victory of Frank Carvell in Carleton. A dead set was made to defeat him, but he wins out by a handsome majority. Mr. Kidd Fleming must feel like—well he'll not be issuing any more challenges.

The meddling parsons of King's county, N. S., failed to down Sir Frederick Borden. It is a pity that even ministers of the Gospel sometimes listen to and believe the lowest kind of Tory tittle-tattle and scandal. Sir Frederick has the very comfortable majority of 600 or 700, and Kings is reputed to be one of the most moral constituencies in Canada.

Funny, nobody has heard from Premier Hazen since the great Liberal triumph. An interview with that gentleman on the results of New Brunswick would be of absorbing interest, especially as to what happened to Pugsley, and as to the Sunbury-Queens returns. Come Mr. Hazen, let us hear from you. It needn't be in the shape of an affidavit with a wrong date, but a simple statement of fact of how it feels to get a solar plexus blow.

AID FOR DROWNING.

Approved Method of Applying Artificial Respiration.

The most approved method of resuscitation in cases of drowning and asphyxiation was described by Professor Edward A. Schafer of Edinburgh, Scotland, in a paper on artificial respiration, read to the section on surgery and anatomy of the American Medical Association. Professor Schafer was chairman of a special committee of the Royal Medical and Chirurgical Society of London appointed to investigate the subject, and his paper was the result of that body's inquiry.

The method is one which can be used by one person without fatigue and make possible resuscitation in a case either of drowning or asphyxiation.

"Lay the patient flat on his face," said Professor Schafer. "This throws the tongue forward out of the mouth, leaving the air passages unobstructed, and does away with the necessity for holding the tongue. It also permits the water to run from the mouth."

"Kneel beside the patient and place the hands one on each side of the backbone in the small of the back, about the line of the lowest ribs."

"Then by throwing weight forward on the hands a vertical pressure is effected with little fatigue to the operator."

"The downward pressure should last three seconds. This empties the lungs. The pressure should then be stopped for two seconds, and the lungs will naturally refill. This process should be repeated twelve times a minute."

"Careful tests by a spirometer show that this method gives more than the normal amount of air to the patient, while other methods give much less than the amount ordinarily breathed."

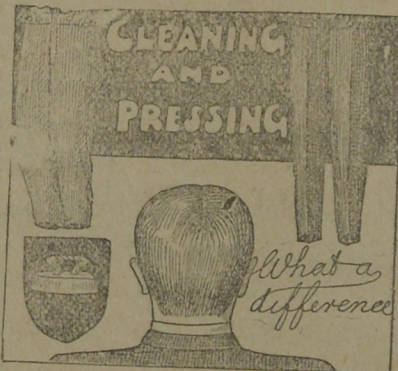
