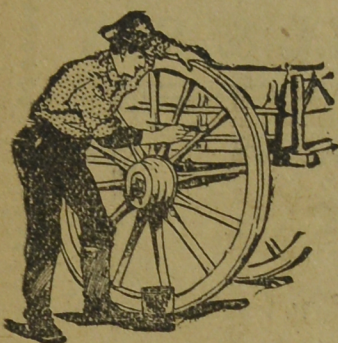

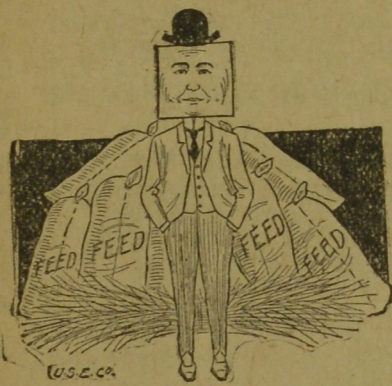

## SHOCK FOR TEETOTALERS.

Analysis Showed as Much as Eight  
Per Cent. Alcohol in Soft Drinks.

LONDON, March 24.—Teetotalers  
have been roughly shocked by the  
publication of the government analy-  
ses of so-called temperance drinks,  
which show an astonishing percent-  
age of alcohol in certain favorite tem-  
perance beverages. The liquor laws  
make drinks containing more than 2  
per cent. of alcohol taxable as intox-  
icants, but of 4,147 samples of tem-  
perance drinks tested in the last four  
years no fewer than 3,098 exceeded  
the limit.

In a majority of cases the excess  
was slight, but in several of the sam-  
ples as much as 8 per cent. of alco-  
hol was found, while in a few 9 and  
10 per cent was revealed. One sam-  
ple of a mysterious decoction called  
dandelion stout contained 12.3 per  
cent.

The chief offending drinks were gin-  
ger beer and herb beer. Many sam-  
ples of these were found to be as in-  
toxicating as claret or hock, while  
others contained as much alcohol as

beer. The temperance advocates were  
startled to learn that a child drinking  
a pint of some of the teetotal bever-  
ages consumes more alcohol than is  
contained in half a pint of champagne.  
It is admitted that the high percent-  
age is accidental, and that it is due  
to fermentation in bottling.

## BRITISH PREMIER DYING.

Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman's Condition has Taken  
a Serious Turn.

NEW YORK, March 24.—The Her-  
ald has received the following cable  
despatch from London: Members of  
all shades of politics are becoming  
more and more concerned every day  
over the declining strength of the  
Prime Minister.

The Prince of Wales is a constant  
visitor to Downing street, going  
there every day. But no messages  
of sympathy or anxious inquiry are  
more welcome to the suffering pre-  
mier than those personally sent up-  
stairs by his great political oppon-  
ent, Mr. Balfour, who, though in  
common with all visitors is ex-  
cluded from the sick room, calls every day  
and sometimes twice a day at the  
premier's residence.

It is recognized in the lobby of the  
House of Commons that Sir Henry's  
health is rapidly declining. Sir  
Thomas Barlow spends considerable  
time with his patient, but very lit-  
tle encouragement is to be derived  
from the bulletins. The chances of  
his being able to resume the active  
duties of the premiership, indeed, are  
absolutely nil.

The serious condition of the Premier  
Minister has led to the considerate  
and respectful act on the part of the  
headquarters staff of the Conserva-  
tive and Unionist Party, who have  
ordered the withdrawal from circula-  
tion of whatever cartoons, pictorial  
posters, leaflets or the like they  
may have in use for the purpose of  
electioneering, which may caricature  
the Prime Minister after the fashion  
which is perfectly legitimate in ordi-  
ary circumstances in the warfare of  
party politics.

Within the Liberal party wire-pull-  
ers are hard at work arranging for  
a reshuffle in the Liberal cabinet. Mr.  
John Morley would like to go to the  
Exchequer, but it is not believed he  
has the knowledge of financial affairs  
requisite in the position. It is now  
suggested that Mr. Haldane would  
make an admirable chancellor of the

exchequer, and his friends declare that  
he is the only member of the minis-  
try who understands the Asquith  
budget and scheme for old-age pen-  
sion. Mr. Haldane is also keen on  
getting his promotion, for the chan-  
cellorship is a more important post  
than his present one. But who is to  
fill Mr. Haldane's shoes? It is diffi-  
cult to think of anyone who could  
carry through his army scheme, for,  
truth to tell, hardly any other min-  
ister understands it.

Unpleasant allegations have been  
made against Mr. Lloyd-George and  
Mr. Winston Churchill, both exceed-  
ingly clever young members of the  
Liberal ministry. It is hinted that  
they have both been intriguing with  
a view to the formation of a new  
party. It is well known that all is  
not harmony within the Liberal  
ranks. Mr. Winston Churchill wants  
to get into the cabinet, but he does  
not know the way. If he takes cab-  
inet rank, he will, according to con-  
stitutional rules, have to face the  
storm and stress of re-election. To  
judge from the results of the recent  
bye-elections his re-election as the  
member for Manchester is doubtful.  
It is understood that he is in favor  
of an early dissolution, so that he  
can choose a safer seat and demand  
a higher position in the new min-  
istry.

The young politician is gifted with  
a good-humored, self-complacency  
which never fails, and a belief in his  
own genius as a statesman which so  
far has never wavered. He thinks  
himself a man born to set the world  
right through an entire generation,  
and he has a superb contempt for  
the prosaic steps by which ordinary  
people arrive at a conclusion. He  
was of great use to Campbell-Ban-  
nerman, but it is doubtful whether  
he would get on so well with the  
astute lawyer, Mr. Asquith, if that  
gentleman were called upon to take  
the reins of office as premier.

MISS ANGLIN WOULD NOT PER-  
MIT PLAY.

Performance of Materlinck's Drama  
by Russian Company Infringes  
on Her Rights.

NEW YORK, March 24.—Madame  
Komisarzhewsky was last night to  
have produced for the first time in  
this country in Daly's theatre Mater-  
linck's "Sister Beatrice," but it was  
announced that the management had  
learned late in the afternoon that it  
would be impossible to produce this  
play and so would present Ibsen's  
"Master Builder" in its stead.

Arkady Orloff, representative of  
Madame Komisarzhewsky, said: "The  
past of 'Sister Beatrice' in Mater-  
linck's drama is one of the greatest  
in Madame Komisarzhewsky's rep-  
ertoire. She was the first to act it on  
any stage. The character, that of  
a nun who breaks her vows, and af-  
ter a disastrous career in the world,  
returns to die within the convent  
walls, she has made her own. She has  
won great applause in it. "When,  
therefore, this American tour was  
planned it was arranged to make  
"Sister Beatrice" one of the import-  
ant productions.

"We brought from Russia special  
costumes and scenery. Three days  
ago we were amazed at receiving  
from Louis Steckler, attorney, a  
letter forbidding the production of  
"Sister Beatrice." He is acting for  
Miss Margaret Anglin, who owns the  
American rights to play.

"Steckler declined to allow the pro-  
duction upon any terms and threat-  
ened an injunction if we persisted in  
giving it. We do not know why Miss  
Anglin should object to the produc-  
tion of "Sister Beatrice" in Russian,  
but we suppose she wishes to have  
the honor of making the first Ameri-  
can production herself. As we are  
not inviting trouble we changed the  
bill."
