

# OLD TIMES RECALLED

## A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, JULY 18, 1882.)

Rev. Joseph McLeod has been granted six weeks of absence, and Rev. Mr. Reid, of Keswick, will fill his place.

Lieut. Col. Maunsell, D. A. G., Ottawa, and Mrs. Maunsell, have been visiting their friends in this city, and were warmly welcomed.

The twelfth annual convention of Sabbath School workers, of which Mr. Wm. Lemont of this city is president, will meet at Dartmouth, N. S., on Friday, August 4th.

Preparatory work—can-making, etc., has been resumed at Hoegg's Canning factory, George street, five persons being employed. Canning will commence the first of August.

Rev. J. C. McDevitt solemnized the nuptials of Miss Kate Williams of this city, and Mr. J. E. O'Malley of Chatham, at an early hour Monday morning, in St. Dunstan's church.

Rev. Dr. Sprague, who assumes the pastoral charge of the Methodist church here, has been granted six weeks vacation, and during his absence the pulpit will be supplied by Rev. Mr. McCully.

Parties in the market today were asking \$1.50 per peck for new potatoes. At that price a barrel would cost \$15 per bbl., and each individual potato five cents, rather an expensive luxury.

The body of the young lad, known as "Nobody's Johnny," who mysteriously disappeared from Douglas last fall, was recovered on Friday from among the logs in the Douglas boom.

Mr. John Richards, Grand Master of the Odd Fellows association in the Maritime Provinces, has returned from an official visit to Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. While absent he was the recipient of many kindnesses from the brethren, especially at Halifax.

Henry Macdoald, who is in jail pending his trial for alleged perjury, in Scott Act cases, attempted suicide on Monday by fastening a belt around his throat. He was found in an exhausted condition by the jailor's wife and relieved from his dangerous position.

Mr. R. Napier, manager of the B. N. A. Bank, has returned from his holiday trip to Grand Manan, looking much invigorated. Mr. Deacon, of the St. John Branch, who attended to Mr. Napier's duties during the latter's absence, and who made many friends during his brief stay in this city, returned to St. John yesterday.

Bears are reported as very plentiful in the country this season, and are causing much destruction to the farmers' sheep. In six successive days recently, in the Miramichi district, Harry Braithwaite shot six of these animals, and most remarkable, he killed two with a single discharge of a double barreled gun, loaded with ordinary shot.

There was much excitement in Marysville Monday afternoon over a report that a little child, Henry Morrill's had been devoured by bears while picking berries. The mills were closed down and all the hands started off to the woods in search of the child, who however, was safe, and was innocently returning home by one road while the searchers went another.

The contract for the erection of the new Presbyterian church has been awarded to Mr. William Lawlor, of Chatham, who will commence work in less than a month. The contract price is \$18,450, and the building will be of limestone, faced with freestone. It is to be completed by November, 1883. The next tender below Mr. Lawlor's was that of Mr. Miles of St. John, the difference being only \$10.

The Provincial Teachers' Institute closed its session on Thursday, and was thoroughly interesting and instructive. We regret, however, to observe that there is an apparent falling off in attendance, there being this session as against one hundred only eighty-four teachers enrolled

and seventeen in 1880. (There were nearly 500 enrolled at the institute this year, 1908.)

Interest in the Scott Act election is increasing, and when the time for voting comes, which will be about the middle of September, excitement will be at fever heat. The temperance party are organizing and have all ready held a public meeting in the city hall, which was addressed by Mrs. Hunt of Boston, Rev. Mr. Phillips of Ontario, and Rev. Jos. McLeod. There will be lively work on both sides before polling day.

The Cricketers held a meeting Monday evening, at Mr. Hazen's law office, and talked over matters generally. A code of bye-laws for the club was adopted, a local match for tomorrow afternoon, was arranged, and a decision arrived at to challenge the Moncton club for a match in St. John some time in August. A committee was appointed to arrange with one of the city bands for an excursion on the occasion. Mr. E. H. Allen was appointed field captain, vice Collector Street resigned.

The banking facilities of Fredericton are being extended by the addition of two new agencies here—the Maritime Bank of St. John, and the Bank of Nova Scotia. The former occupies the lower store in Dever's building, opposite the stone barracks, and the vacant shop in Sharkey's block is being fitted up for the latter. Mr. Blair, who is to have charge of the Maritime Bank agency, has arrived and is ready for business. The other will open as soon as the arrangements in the building can be perfected.

Coun. Murch of Queensbury, we understand, will not again seek municipal honors, having served his parish faithfully for six years at the board. It is said that Mr. A. J. Brown, commonly known as "Deacon" Brown, will be Mr. Murch's successor. Mr. Brown has a good knowledge of municipal matters, and, no doubt, would fill the position well. Mr. Hoyt of Prince William, also announces his intention of retiring from the council. He has been a very useful member for eight years, and we shall regret both his and Mr. Murch's absence.

The fishing season in lake and river, is now at its height, and parties are organizing daily. We have heard of many good catches, but none more successful than that of Messrs. Robert Orr, Harry Beckwith and Chris. Robinson, on the South-west Miramichi, last week. They landed twenty-eight fine salmon and four grise in a short time, one of the former, which is the largest ever caught with a fly in the South-west, weighing twenty-five and a quarter pounds. He was landed by Mr. Orr without a gaff.

Mrs. Fleming, alms house keeper, on Monday morning received by a telegram from Mr. Henry A. Perley, Dewinton, Northwest Territory, the sad intelligence of the death of her son, James Fleming, who went west two months ago, and was employed in Mr. Perley's store. No particulars have yet been received. The remains were interred at Dewinton. Young Fleming served in Mr. Wiley's drug store for several years and later had charge of Mr. Wiley's branch store at Grand Falls. He was very popular in a large circle of comrades and friends here, and his early demise causes extreme regret. ### KILLED BY BASEBALL.

TWO PERSONS LOSE THEIR LIVES IN TWO DAYS.

New York, July 17.—John Foley, sixteen years old, of Binghamton, N. Y., died at his home in this city this evening as a result of being struck on the head by a batted ball while playing baseball with other boys this afternoon.

Peter Joseph Jensen, twenty nine years old, of North Hackensack, N. J., died yesterday at his home as the result of a blow on the left temple from a baseball. Jensen and a few friends enjoyed a game before supper last night. He was struck by a pitched ball and rendered unconscious for a few minutes.

Jensen went home, had some water rubbed on the bruised spot and a supper. He started out for the local hall to attend a club meeting, but dropped unconscious on the street. He died without regaining his senses. He leaves a widow and young son. The autopsy revealed that the skull was fractured.

### MILE A MINUTE SPEED.

Saved Life of Young Girl in Ottawa.

Probably the fastest run on record in Canada was made by the Canadian Pacific Railway Sunday when a special train with Dr. Bell, who was summoned to attend a child in Ottawa, was taken by special train from Windsor station, Montreal, to the capital, accomplishing the 114 miles in 42 minutes.

The train was ordered at 11.07 a. m., was ready at 11.52, and was moving out of the station at 11.53. The child was suffering from a serious illness, and through the speed at which the special travelled its life was saved. Here are the times:

The Prime Minister said the association named had made strong representation on it and had been officially informed that the change would be made.

### SMASHED WOMAN'S NOSE.

THE ONLY WAY TO SAVE HER FROM DROWNING.

Montreal, July 17.—A sailor by the name of James McMananey on board the S. S. Niagara of the Elder-Dempster Line, saved the life of a woman this morning who had fallen off the wharf. She was walking along the wharf in an intoxicated condition and fell into the river. McMananey jumped in after her and brought her to the edge. As soon as she was safe the woman started to scream and call for help, saying that her rescuer was trying to murder her. Then she grasped the sailor's hair and commenced to pull it out in handfuls. This caused McMananey to release his hold on the woman, and she fell back into the water again, pulling her rescuer with her by the hair. Then started a battle under the water, for when the woman came up a few seconds afterwards it was seen that her nose was bleeding badly. By this time a boat had been sent out from the shore and the parties rescued.

When McMananey was seen afterwards he was suffering from a sore head where the woman had pulled at his hair. When asked if he had struck the woman he replied that he had, as this was the only way in which he could save her. She had a death grip on him.
