POOR LITTLE "OSSIE."

Final Fishing Expedition in Public Accounts Yields Barren Results

OTTAWA, July 18—The public accounts committee wound up the work for the session with a vote of thanks to the chairman, Clarke, proposed by Mr. Northrup, who declared that the opposition members had been treated with the greatest fairness and impartiality throughout. The committee had no less than eighty meetings during the session, breaking all previous records.

The only witness examined yesterday was Willard Kitchen, a railway contractor of Fredericton, who gave evidence as to the contract to do some excavation work for the extension of the I. C. R. yards at Halifax. Messrs. Crockett and Northrup, who conducted the examination, seemed to be absolutely at sea as to why they had called Mr. Kitchen and after a little fishing about among figures of his tender they allowed witness to be discharged, without getting any evidence of any irregularities.

Mr. Crockett before the committee adjourned proposed a resolution condemning the system of purchase of government supplies through middlemen and declaring that evidence submitted to commission during the session showed a waste of public money in the department of marine, railways, public works and militia. Mr. Carvell declined to submit that evidence had shown any such waste. There had been, he admitted, irregularities in the marine department. "But the only fault I have to find," he added, "is that the department did not fire years ago the old Tories responsible for these irregularities."

There being only some half dozen members present Chairman Clarke declined to put Mr. Crockett's resolution on the ground that there was no quorum of committee.

KOLOPORE CUP

British Team Win With Canada a Close Second

Brisley, July 18—Canada would have won the Kolopore cup yesterday but for the poor showing of Private Rowe in the 300 yard range and a poorer one at 600 yards.

The Canadian team led at the first range, but dropped a point behind Guernsey at 600 yards.

The Mother Country's team was in third place at this stage. This team came strong at the longest range and nosed their way to victory, beating Canada by four points. Guernsey went badly to pieces at this stage, and Canada finished in second place, there by winning the Colonial prize of £30, awarded the Colonial team making the highest aggregate in this match. The weather conditions were none too favorable, a strong wind blowing, while rain fell during the latter part of the last range.

A DELATED PARDON.

ARRIVED AT PENITENTIARY EIGHTEEN YEARS TOO LATE.

Eighteen years after George Swanson, of Columbus, Ohio, completed his one-year sentence in the penitentiary for violating the United States pension laws, having been sent up from Youngstown, a full and complete pardon arrived at the institution, signed by Benjamin Harrison, then President of the United States, and William F. Harton, his Acting Secretary of State.

The original letter containing the pardon was received from St. Louis. It is dated at Washington, September 3, 1890. It was stamped at Columbus, September 4. It is probable that the letter has been lying in some postoffice for years.
