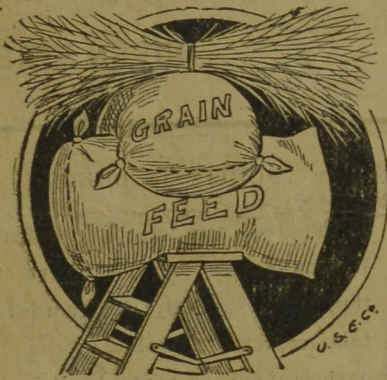

PREACHER DEFENDS PAINTING THE FACE.

No more Harm in Rouge Than in Pretty Dresses Asserts Vancouver Clergyman.

Vancouver, March 6.—That there is no sin in a woman painting her face was the opinion delivered at the First Baptist Church by Rev. P. Clifton Parker. He took for his text the story of Jezabel and Jehu, and remarked that the system of painting the face was as old as the hills. Ancient ladies were fond of it and modern ladies also observed the custom. In this instance Jezabel painted her face and attired her hair and sat in a window with the object of impressing Jehu with her royalty, and not with any other purpose.

NOT FOUNDED ON FACT.

Story That Ross Rifle is Made Outside of Canada.

Ottawa, March 6.—The story sent out from Boston and published under a flashing headline in The Montreal Star last night to the effect that practically one-half of the Ross rifle, as adopted by the government for the militia of Canada, is not made in Canada is entirely without foundation in fact, and is regarded by those who know the facts of the case here as another unjustifiable attempt to make party capital for the opposition out of whole cloth. As a matter of fact, a few of the details of the rifle are not actually made at the factory in Quebec, as was announced in the investigation before the Public Accounts committee. These parts are hand-made in large quantities in the States, and could easily be made at Quebec if desired. The rifle to all intents and purposes is a strictly Canadian arm, and the statement sent out from Boston is on a par with other misleading and inaccurate statements published editorially in the opposition papers and designed to discredit the action of the government in its dealings with the Ross Rifle company.

GEN. VIDAL'S FUNERAL.

Imposing Military Ceremony at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, March 6.—With military honors befitting his high rank, the remains of the late Brigadier-General of Militia of Canada, were laid at rest yesterday in Notre Dame cemetery, after a service in St. Joseph's church. It was perhaps the most imposing military funeral ever seen in Ottawa. All branches of the service were represented in the cortege.

The coffin, wrapped in the folds of the Union Jack, rested on a gun carriage, and was surmounted by the sword and plumed hat of the dead field officer. Behind were the mourners, and following them walked Colonel Hanbury Williams and Captain Pickering, representing the Governor-General. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Prime Minister, and Sir Frederick Borden, the Minister of Militia. The honorary pall-bearers were Brigadier-Generals Lake, Otter, Cotton and Macdonald, and Lieut.-Cols. Buchan, Lessard, Fiset, D. S. O., and Gwatkin.

A TORY CONSPIRACY

Is it that Another Nest of Traitors is Likely to be Hatched

The Ottawa Free Press says: Another "nest of traitors," with Mr. R. L. Borden figuring as the victim instead of Sir MacKenzie Bowell, is being uncovered on Parliament hill. While the personnel of the conspirators has changed materially since 1896, there is the same leader animated by the same personal vindictiveness, George Eulas Foster.

Dissatisfied with a subordinate position on the opposition benches Mr. Foster has persuaded a few of the noisiest members of the Conservative side to join in a mutiny against the nominal leader of the party.

Mr. Borden has had no control of the actions of his supposed followers during the past few days, he has openly disapproved of their attitude, a deliberate attempt to oust him has been made, and there is a bad split in the party. One French-Canadian Conservative member threatens to go over to the government side and it is rumored in Toronto that Mr. E. B. Osler contemplates retiring because of the ascendancy of the Foster clique.

Some sensational developments are looked for within a short time.

The very abstention of Mr. Borden from the whole of last week's struggle leads to the natural assumption that he was disgusted with the affairs. He came back to the House on Saturday afternoon, sat in his place for a little while, did his best to arrange a truce and then went out again. He came back just before the vote upon the appeal from the Chairman's ruling at 4.30, but did not vote and again left the chamber, not to re-enter it again. This was noticeable in itself.

Still more noticeable was the fact that what might be called the Borden wing of the party took no prominent part in the obstruction. It is true that Mr. Bergeron got up just before six o'clock Saturday evening and offered a compromise—which by the way, was the very same offer which had been made by Mr. Feilding at midnight on Thursday but the recalcitrants would not hear of it.

Thus once more Mr. Foster had his way and the Borden wing of the party was "turned down."

These two incidents, taken in conjunction with others which marked the long debate, have produced the impression in certain political circles that Mr. Foster has been once more engaged at the familiar task of hatching a "nest of traitors." Mr. Monk, who is quite apparently angered over the prominence which was given to Mr. Bergeron in the leader's transcontinental tour last summer, sided with Mr. Foster in the policy of bringing the leadership of Mr. Borden into contempt.

Messrs. Osler, Macdonell, Ames, Tisdale, Haggart, W. F. MacLean and Kemp deliberately kept themselves out of the mess; and only those members of the party who obey the party whip right or wrong took any active part in the Fosterian obstruction.

One French Conservative member from Quebec, Dr. Paquet of L'Islet, is so openly disgusted with the obstructive tactics of the Tories that it would not be surprising if he were to take the first opportunity of asserting his independence and his determination to treat public matters from an independent standpoint.

NADA'S BOUYANT REVENUE

OTTAWA, March 7.—The financial statement of the Dominion for the eleven months, of the current fiscal year, as entered on the books of the finance department on February 29, shows a total revenue of \$87,607,299, an increase of \$8,629,749, as compared with the corresponding eleven months of 1906-07.

The total expenditure on consolidated fund account for the eleven months was \$60,720,353, an increase of \$10,735,686.

The capital expenditure for the period was \$25,758,488, of which \$20,

183,830 was for public works, railways and canals, including construction of the National Transcontinental railway. The surplus of the total revenue over the total expenditure for eleven months is \$1,118,458.

For the month of February the total revenue was \$6,577,027, a decrease of \$740,793 as compared with February last year.

For the eleven months the total post office revenue has been \$6,357,320, an increase of \$652,097. Customs revenue has increased by \$7,040,878, and excise by \$545,364.
