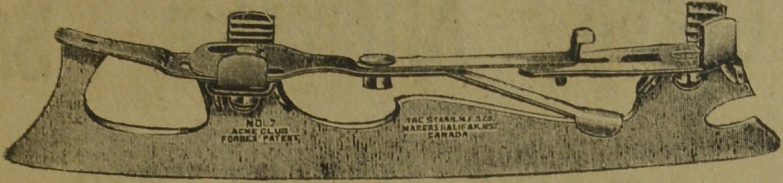

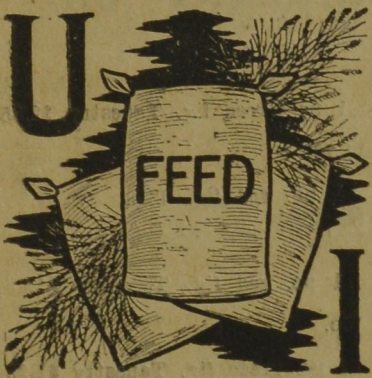

BURGLARS IN SILK HATS AND FURS

New York Police Discover a Pair of Raffles in Real Life—Appeared to be Well-Dressed Clubmen and Feigned Great Indignation when Arrested

NEW YORK, January 9.—What is regarded as an important "catch" was made when the police arrested two well-dressed young men at the New Rochelle station of the New Haven Railroad, on a charge of burglary.

There have been numerous robberies in the neighborhood of late, and in each instance the work seemed to have been done by two men, and invariably the description of them was similar.

Mrs. George Atwood telephoned to police headquarters that two men had just robbed her house of jewelry and one of them had threatened to shoot her if she cried for help. Then he jumped from a window through which his companion had disappeared as she entered the room. She described the man as being about twenty years of age, quite good looking, of medium build and smooth shaven.

A few minutes before midnight two policemen at the railroad station saw two young men, one of whom answered the description of the man they were looking for, come hastily along the platform and go into the waiting room.

Each was dressed in a shining silk hat, fur lined overcoat and patent leather shoes, and carried a cane and dress suit case. At first the policemen were chatty about arresting them, for they seemed so respectable but at length decided to put them under arrest.

The elder of the two men pretended to be very indignant and demanded an apology. He and his friend said they were members of a yacht club, and they were returning to New York to their home after spending the day at the club house. One of the suit cases was opened and found to be filled with silverware, engraved with crests and monograms. It also contained two loaded revolvers.

As soon as the suit case was opened the men made a break for liberty and one of them succeeded in slipping away from his captor, but before he could get out of the waiting room the other policeman grabbed him, and there was a scuffle. The policeman, after repeatedly knocking the burglar on the head with his billy, subdued him, and the two prisoners were handcuffed and marched to the station house.

The captives gave their names as James Taylor and William Harland, of New York City.

Mrs. George A. Lyons, whose home was entered by two burglars and looted of about \$1,000 worth of silverware, visited police headquarters today and identified some of the jewelry found on the men as her property. It is also said that she identified the men as those who entered her house and took away everything of value they could find. She had been out shopping, entered her home with her latch-key, and met two men about to leave it. They leveled revolvers at her and threatened to kill her if she made an outcry. One of them grabbed her and choked her, leaving her unconscious on the veranda.

MONK ATTACKS "INDEPENDENTS."

Disgraceful That Men Should Hide Behind That Name While Accepting Support of Con. Party.

Montreal, Jan. 9.—The whole policy of the Conservative party in Quebec for the last two years in the matter of procuring and supporting "independent" candidates rather than standing firmly and frankly on the old party platform was repudiated and condemned last night by Mr. F. D. Monk, former Conservative leader for Quebec in the Commons.

The member for Jacques Cartier, who is about to leave for Stanstead to aid the campaign of Mr. Moore said that he could find no language too strong for criticizing candidates who hid themselves behind the name of independent and declared that a man who was aided by the Conservative party had no right to be ashamed of the title of Conservative.

It will be remembered that Mr. Monk abstained from participating in the campaign of Mr. Bourassa and his followers in the provincial by-elections of recent date, although these campaigns were in some cases financed by the Conservative organization under Sir Alexandre Lacoste, and in most cases had the support of the small fighting element of Montreal Conservatives.

MAYOR WAS HISSED.

A Turbulent Meeting of Winnipeg City Council.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 8.—The closing session of the city council of 1907 last night was one of the stormiest for years, when the Mayor was hissed by the spectators in the galleries and recriminations among members of the council were frequent. When Ald. Manning moved for an enquiry into police methods Ald. Cox charged that the mover was using information secured by him in the practice of his profession as a barrister. Ald. Manning retorted that he did not believe the work of the police commission was such as would stand investigation. Mr. Manning's motion carried, and there will be an investigation.

Mayor Ashdown refused to answer questions by Ald. Eggerton regarding the finances of the city, and the Mayor's refusal was greeted with hisses from the spectators. The meeting closed without any of the friendly addresses such as are customary at the final meeting of the council, and there was a decided tension throughout, which evidently presages a very contentious time during the coming year.

HALIFAX, N. S., January 10.—(Special.)—William S. Sheehan, was around town Wednesday night with friends and yesterday morning his dead body was found floating in the harbor. He was a cooper by trade, aged forty-two years, unmarried. He no doubt wandered down to the wharf and fell overboard.
