THE NEW GOVERNMENT

HON. J. D. HAZEN, K. C. (Sunbury) Premier and Attorney General.
HON. J. K. FLEMING, (Carleton) Provincial Secretary.
HON. JOHN MORRISSEY, (Northumberland) Commissioner of Public Works.
HON. W. C. H. GRIMMER, (Charlotte) Surveyor General.
HON. DR. D. V. LANDRY, (Kent) Commissioner of Agriculture.
HON. H. F. McLEOD, (York) Solicitor General.
HON. ROBERT MAXWELL, (St. John City) without portfolio.

As announced in Friday's Herald, Premier Robinson and his colleagues in the local government, tendered their resignations to Lieut. Governor Tweedie at St. John that afternoon, and His Honor immediately despatched his private secretary, Mr. R. S. Barker, for Mr. J. D. Hazen, M. P., who, on attending His Honor, was invited to form a new administration, and accepted.

Later Mr. Hazen submitted as above the personnel of his cabinet to

His Honor, before whom the members will be sworn in at the executive council chamber in this city next Tuesday afternoon.

PERSONAL SKETCHES.

Leading Points in the Careers of the New Ministers.

PREMIER AND ATT'Y. GENERAL
Hon. John Douglas Hazen, K. C.,

M. P. P., born at Oromocto, Sunbury county, June 6, 1860, son of the late James K. Hazen, and his wife, Elizabeth Marion Hazen, daughter of the late Hon. John A. Beckwith. Educated in the Fredericton common and Collegiate schools, and at the University of New Brunswick, from which he graduated a B. A., 1879, B. C. L. 1890. Studied law with Fraser, Wetmore and Winslow in this city, admitted to the bar in 1883, and practised here until his removal to St. John in 1890, the last few years in partnership with John Black. Elected alderman of King's ward, Fredericton, in 1886, holding that position for three years, elected Mayor of Fredericton 1889, and re-elected in 1890, retiring the same year on his removal to St. John. An unsuccessful candidate for the legislature in York in the bye-election of 1885, elected to the House of Commons for St. John in 1891, and defeated for same seat in 1896. Elected to the legislature for Sunbury in 1899, and re-elected in 1903 and 1908. Selected as leader of the opposition in 1899, and called to the premiership March 20, 1908. Created a Q. C. in 1894, and was registrar of the University for some years. Married in this city Sept. 22, 1884, Miss Ada, daughter of the late Mr. James Tibbits, and they have a family of five children, the eldest son, Mr. D. King Hazen, being a graduate of the U. N. B. and student at law in St. John. A Conservative and an Episcopalian.

THE PROVINCIAL SECRETARY.

Hon. James Kidd Fleming—Native of Lower Woodstock, Carleton county, and will be forty years old April 27, son of the late Thomas Fleming. Educated at the common schools, and at the Normal school. Taught school in Carleton county, and at Canterbury, where he subsequently conducted a grocery store. Commercial traveler for two years, afterwards conducted general store at Woodstock, removing to Pacl, Carleton Co., in 1896, engaging in commercial business, and is now in the lumber and milling business at Hartland and Debec. Unsuccessful candidate for the legislature in Carleton in 1895, elected at bye election 1900, re-elected in 1903 and 1908. Married in 1890 to Miss S. Helena Fleming. A Conservative and a Presbyterian.

CHIEF COMMISSIONER.

Hon. John Morrissey—A native of Northumberland and 55 years of age. In the agricultural implement business at Newcastle. Unsuccessful candidate for the legislature in 1895, and

for the House of Commons in 1900. Elected to the legislature in 1903, and re-elected in 1908. Married with family. A Liberal and Roman Catholic.

SURVEYOR GENERAL.

Hon. Ward Chipman Hazen Grimmer, K. C., son of the late Geo. S. Grimmer of St. Andrew's. Born at St. Stephen Oct. 31st, 1858. Educated at St. Stephen and at the University of New Brunswick, graduating B. A. 1877, M. A., 1879. Admitted to the bar in 1882, practises at St. Stephen. Has been Mayor of St. Stephen, first elected to the legislature in 1903, re-elected in 1908. Married Nov. 24, 1884, to Miss Bessie Gove, daughter of the late Collector of Customs Gove of St. Andrew's. A Conservative and Episcopalian.

COMMISSIONER FOR AGRICULTURE.

Hon. Dr. Landry—A native of Westmorland county, and forty years old. Attended Normal school, and taught for a short time. Is a practising physician at Buctouche. First elected to the legislature in 1908. A Conservative and a Roman Catholic.

SOLICITOR GENERAL.

Hon. Harry Fulton McLeod—A native of Fredericton, son of Rev. Dr. McLeod, 37 years old. Educated at the common and Collegiate schools of Fredericton, and at the University of New Brunswick, graduating B. A. 1891. Admitted to the bar in 1894, and practises in Fredericton. An unsuccessful candidate for the legislature in 1903, elected in 1908. Elected Mayor of Fredericton 1907. Grand Master of L. O. Association 1905-1908. Major of the 71st regiment. Unmarried. A Conservative and Baptist.

WITHOUT PORTFOLIO.

Hon. Robert Maxwell—Native of Fredericton, and 49 years of age, son of John Maxwell, ex-Ald. of this city. Educated here and removed to St. John. A contractor and builder. Was seven years a St. John alderman. First elected to the legislature at bye-election of 1904, re-elected in 1908. Married Miss McConnell of St. John in 1878. A Conservative and Methodist.

CRAFTY LAWYERS.

Shrewd Move to Obtain Affidavits From Hindus at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 20—(Special)—A curious incident, illustrating the eagerness of Canadian Pacific Railway lawyers to get evidence which would justify the company's refusal to deport 155 Hindus now in the detention shed, has come to light.

The legal men visited the shed intending to consult the Hindus but it being against the rule to allow anyone inside except immigration officers, admittance was refused them.

Not to be beaten, the lawyers thereupon read an affidavit to the interpreter who showed it to the Hindus through a window. In this way they administered the oath as well.

The Hindus here are dissatisfied with the treatment accorded them and are planning a general exodus to Panama. A thousand Hindus are said to be engaged in construction work on the Panama canal.

STARR TROPHY WILL STAY.

Charlottetown Players Lost Second Game to Capitals by Score of 10 to 3.

The Charlottetown hockey players met with another defeat at the hands of the Capitals at the Arctic rink last evening, and in consequence returned home this morning without the much coveted Starr trophy. The score at the close of the game stood 10 to 3 in favor of the home team.

The ice was in good condition, considering the lateness of the season, and the game although not exactly of the whirlwind variety, was quite fast at times, and seemed to satisfy the four hundred odd spectators who witnessed it. The Capitals were in better form than on the previous evening, and at no time was there any serious doubt of their winning the game by a safe margin. They ran in

six goals during the first half, and four in the second, while the Victorias found the net twice in the first half and once in the second.

The players on both sides seemed to be very friendly disposed towards one another, and the play, while on the strenuous side at times, was not characterized by roughness. Six penalties, most of which were for tripping, were imposed during the evening, four being handed out to the Capitals and two to the Victorias. Musick received a blow in the face from the puck during the first half, which made him see stars, but he pluckily stuck to his post. In the second half Cornfoot received a tap from a hockey stick, but resumed

work after a delay of a few minutes.

The game started at eight-thirty o'clock, and in accordance with the regulations for Starr trophy contests, two thirty minute halves were played. The crowd in attendance while small, was very orderly, and cheered good plays made by both teams. MacDonald, Musick, Stuart and Dunphy played in their usual form for the Capitals, and their work told on the result of the game. For the Victorias Goal Keeper Campbell put up a brilliant game, his many fine stops coming in for much well-deserved praise from the spectators. He is undoubtedly one of the most efficient goal keepers ever seen on Fredericton ice. Prouse, Maher and Reddin also did very effective work for the visitors.

"Shorty" Trites of Moncton, refereed the game, and his decisions as usual were characterized by fairness. At the close of the game the teams heartily cheered each other, and the band played "Auld Lang Syne," followed by the National Anthem.

DIED SUDDENLY.

I. C. R. Baggage Master Called Away Without Much Warning.

MONCTON, March 21—(Special)—Frank Cormier, I. C. R. baggage master, who for years has been running on the Maritime express between Moncton and Halifax, died suddenly last night. He had been in good health until yesterday afternoon, when he complained of feeling unwell.

At 8.30 last night, while conversing with his family, he was suddenly stricken and died before help came. Heart failure was the cause. Deceased was 59 years old, and had been in the I. C. R. employ thirty years. He is survived by a widow and three daughters and three sons.

Montreal Boy Tried to Hang Himself.
