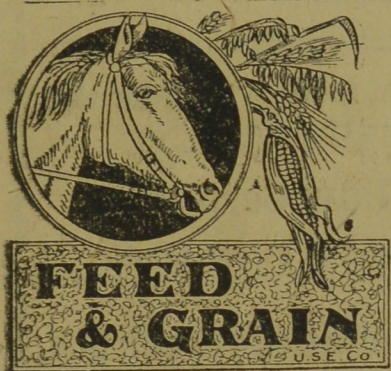

OLD TIMES RECALLED.

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, JUNE 1, 1882.)

Mr. D. E. Dunham's plans for the new Baptist church here have been adopted. The building will be of stone, and tenders will be asked for its erection immediately.

Messrs. N. Henry Crafts and A. W. Forbes, of Boston, hydraulic engineers, arrived here on Tuesday, and are making an inspection of the city previous to commencing their survey for the proposed water works system.

A horse attached to the American Express Company's wagon, ran down York street, from the railway station, Tuesday morning, and in turning opposite the city hall, it fell, and was almost instantly killed.

The University athletic sports last Friday were very successfully carried out, and were witnessed by nearly 2,000 people. A very pleasing program was rendered during the afternoon by the Fredericton Brass Band.

The Metropolitan purposes holding an ordination at the Cathedral next Sunday, (Trinity Sunday), when Mr. Charles H. Hatheway, B.A., and Mr. John Smith will be ordained deacons, and the Rev. Henry Montgomery and the Rev. F. W. Vroom will be ordained priests.

Mr. H. St. George Perley, who has filled the position of city editor of the Herald since its first issue, has severed his connection with that paper, and accepted a position on the Daily Sun staff.

Some ignorant knave has written a letter to Mrs. Vandine, wife of the police sergeant, threatening her husband's life.

Mr. A. G. Christison, who has filled the position of cashier and accountant in the B. N. A. Bank here since last October, has been transferred to the St. John branch, and is succeeded by Mr. John Miller, late of St. John.

We regret to record the very sudden death of Mr. Geo. W. Dickie, agent of the American Express company, in this city, which occurred at his residence, Westmorland street, at 2 p.m., on Tuesday. He attended to his business on May 24th, but during that afternoon he was taken ill, and never afterwards left his room. Mr. Dickie was a native of Long Island, Queen's Co., where his body was taken by boat this morning for interment. HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Go over the zinc under the stove once a day with a cloth dampened with kerosene, and it will always be bright.

Sandpaper will clean suede leather, undressed or "ooze" calfskin bags. Rubbing the sandpaper lightly over these leathers makes the article equal to new.

If dust cloths have to be bought cheesecloth is the best material for the purpose. Three-quarters of a yard is ample for each cloth, and they should be hemmed.

When cleaning brass add a little methylated spirit to whatever polish you may be using. It not only helps to remove stains, but also prevents the brass from tarnishing again so quickly.

A roomy bag, its mouth kept open by a ring of wire, is a convenience to hang on the frame of the sewing machine. Into this receptacle all snips and scraps may be dropped while at work and much picking up of litter thereby saved.
