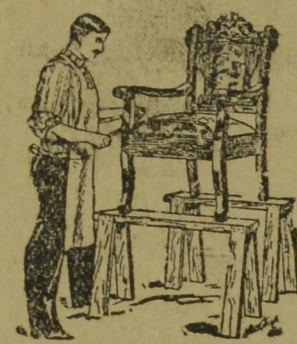

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D. 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1903, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$ 35 00
The same for each successive evening performance, 30 00

The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery 30 00

The same as above without scenery 25 00

The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night 27 00

The same without scenery per night 23 00

For one week stand with scenery 135 00

For the same without scenery 120 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for

light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery 15 00

For the same without scenery 10 00

For each matinee, local talent only 7 50

For each political meeting on the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting 10 00

For two meetings same person, same day 15 00

For rehearsals for afternoon 3 00

For rehearsals for evening 5 00

For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night 20 00

The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night 18 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 10 00

A SHORT TERM OFFICIAL.

Mr. John M. Reid no Longer Road Superintendent for the City.

Mr. John M. Reid, of this city, who has been a road superintendent for the long period of two weeks, with jurisdiction over the lower part of the city, is once more a common, every day citizen. It seems he was willing to serve his king and country to the best of his ability, and since his appointment has neglected his work on the farm in order to improve the highways and bye ways between the Victoria mill and the adjoining parish of Lincoln in the historic county of Sunbury. From early morning until the shades of night began to fall he labored with pick and shovel day after day, earning not only the small commission allowed by law but the gratitude of many of his fellow citizens. Mr. Reid naturally felt that he was making quite a sacrifice on the altar of his country. Imagine his surprise therefore, last evening when he received a notice from the Chief Commissioner informing him that his services were no longer required. To-day he is back on his farm a wiser and sadder man, and his duties as superintendent, it is understood, will be taken over by Mr. William McKay, who holds the position of roadmaster for the city.

It now transpires that Mr. Reid received his appointment on the recommendation of Mr. Parker Glasier, M. P. P. for Sunbury, who it is said did not even take the members for York into his confidence. Naturally they resented what they termed his unwarranted interference with York County affairs, and had Mr. Reid dismissed, not because they did not consider him competent to do the work, but merely to assert their rights as exponents of the principle of responsible, self government, and because he is a Liberal.

Mr. R. A. Estey held the position of superintendent under the old government, and although he has not taken an active part in politics for years his services were dispensed with.

RESULTED FATALLY

Herman Nason, Kicked by a Horse, Dies at the Hospital.

Mr. Herman Nason, a well known resident of Rustagoorish, who was kicked in the abdomen by a horse at his home on Thursday and was brought to the Victoria Hospital for treatment, died at that institution at an early hour this morning after much suffering. The attending physician, realizing the serious nature of the injury, yesterday performed an operation with the hope of saving the life of the unfortunate man, but it failed to have the desired effect.

The deceased was forty-seven years of age and a widower. He leaves a family of four young children to mourn his death. He was highly esteemed in the community in which he lived and his death under such sad circumstances will be very much regretted.

The body has been prepared by Undertaker John G. Adams and will be taken to Rustagoorish by the 5.50 train this evening. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon with services by Rev. A. A. McLeod.

SHORT WEIGHT BUTTER

The Police Discovered Some in the Market Today.

Farmers who have been in the habit of palming off short weight butter on an unsuspecting public in the country market, if they would avoid trouble had better brace up and try to be honest in the future. The game has been successfully worked here for a long time but at last the authorities have woken up and are determined to put a stop to it. This morning Police Sergeant Phillips and City Marshal Roberts, visited the market and weighed nearly one hundred prints of butter being offered for sale by various country people. While the bulk of it was up to the standard weight, some prints were found which only contained fourteen ounces, and the officers saw to it that they were not sold as pound prints. The vendors were warned that in future the law would be rigidly enforced, and any body caught selling butter short weight would be prosecuted. The grocers of the city and others who deal in butter have also been notified that they must weigh the prints in future and sell them by the pound.

The action of the authorities in taking steps to put a stop to the butter fraud is most commendable and will be heartily approved of by patrons of the market. A man who will knowingly sell thirteen or fourteen ounces of butter for a pound has as good a right to the penitentiary as the man who works the pickpocket game or cracks a safe. The penalty for selling short weight butter is twenty dollars and if a few stingy grangers are compelled to cough up the amount of a fine in the near future they will only have themselves to blame.

A BAD SET BACK.

A gentleman who holds the position in the Tory party here, filled for some years by our old friend Mr. William Black, came in for quite a setback in the market a few days ago. He saw a farmer drive into the market and saluted him something after this fashion: "I guess the roads are pretty bad out your way ain't they?" "Yes," was the farmer's reply, "they're not so bad as they will be, and I see we've got to pay double the price for them." Mr. Black's successor closed up like an oyster and got out of sight as quickly as he could.

Wonderful Monastery.

At Solovetsk, in the Russian government of Archangel, is the most remarkable monastery in the world. The monastery of Solovetsk is inclosed on every side by a wall of granite boulders which measures nearly a mile in circumference. The monastery itself is very strongly fortified, being supported by round and square towers about thirty feet in height, with walls twenty feet in thickness. The monastery consists in reality of six churches, which are completely filled with statues of all kinds and precious stones. Upon the walls and the towers surrounding these churches are mounted huge guns, which in the time of the Crimean war were directed against the British White sea squadron.

Palace As a Club.

The old royal palace at Enfield, which was once the abode of Edward VI, and was given by him to Queen Elizabeth, has been opened as a Conservative club. The Tudor rose, the royal monogram and the ancient coat-of-arms are still conspicuous in the mural decorations.
