REBUILDING FERNIE

Feeling of Hopefulness Among People and Town Will soon Rise from its Ashes

NELSON, B. C., Aug. 8.—(Special)—A special to the Daily News from Fernie says: "Under a scorching sun the ceaseless work of rebuilding the city went on rapidly yesterday and the result has been marvellous. Last night for the first time since the disaster many slept under a roof again. Particular attention has been devoted to the sanitary arrangements and large bath houses will be completed tomorrow when all will be compelled to perform a scientific ablution whether they appreciate the process or not.

Lumber and supplies kept coming in all day yesterday and very little work has been delayed by lack of material.

The Bank of Hamilton opened up, and the Bank of Commerce hope to do so today. The fires are still burning fiercely on the mountain sides and eating into the good timber. There is no hope of extinguishing it unless there is heavy rain soon but from present indications there is none in sight.

All the offices in connection with the relief work have been removed to the school premises and are conveniently suited. No further casualties have been reported yet. The G. N. started immediately.

FERNIE, B. C., Aug. 8.—(Special)—The most important step to repairing the damage done by the awful fire at Fernie was taken yesterday, when the directors of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company met and gave Mr. Lindsey, the president of the Company who is at present at Fernie, power to go ahead with rebuilding the parts of the plant that were damaged. Although no fixed appropriation was made it is estimated that the cost to the company for the rebuilding and repairing will be in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

The fire destroyed the hospital and did considerable damage to the coke oven plant and other equipment, the total loss being placed at about \$200,000. There was about \$150,000 insurance on the plant.

The work of rebuilding will be started immediately.

THE HORSE RACES

Simassie had Her Colors Lowered by Terrace Queen—El Galo and Brownette Captured Other Events

One of the most successful two days race meetings in the history of the city of Fredericton Park Association was brought to a close last evening. The attendance yesterday was upwards of one thousand and it is unnecessary to say that all enjoyed first class sport.

There were three events and all were hotly contested. The free-for-all had to be cancelled because it did not have five to enter and four to start, but in its stead was substituted a named race in which Simassie, Terrace Queen, the fastest pacer in the maritime provinces and Aintree of Fox's Stables competed.

Gloria did not come to the scratch much to the disappointment of the spectators. The contest between Terrace Queen and Simassie was the crowning feature of the day.

In the contest between these flyers last year Simassie won out, but yesterday she had to take a back seat. Simassie holds the track record of 2.14 but the fastest time made yesterday was 2.16 1/2.

Mr. Fox drove Aintree in the first two heats and then gave way to Jimmy Boutillier. The latter sent the gelding off at a good pace in the fourth heat and succeeded in going the first half in the remarkably fast time of 1.05 1/2 but in rounding the first turn in the second half he collided with Terrace Queen's sulky and got his own badly broken up. He was put out of the race but walked over the course and the judges allowed him third money. Simassie made a bad break soon after the beginning of the heat and was some distance behind when the collision occurred.

Simassie had the pole in the first heat and won by less than a neck. The Halifax mare was the favorite in the betting and her defeat rather took the wind out of the sails of the local sporting element. In the second and third heats Terrace Queen downed her quite easily.

Brownette of the Pine Tree Stables had a fairly easy win of it in the 2.18 class.

Peacherina, who drew the pole, was the favorite in the betting but made a wretched showing finishing 8th, 7th, and 6th in the three heats. It was thought at first that Carroll was holding back the mare, but such was not the case. She was not in her usual form and found the company too fast. Miss Edith driven by Grover McCoy proved a formidable opponent for the winner.

Laura Merrill also showed up well at times, but a bad break in the third heat set her back to the tail end of the procession.

Estell Boy and Bard Allerton travelled well at times and managed to add interest to the contest.

Brownette travelled to her record in two out of the three heats.

The winner and Estell Boy were the only trotters in a bunch of eight starters.

In the 2.21 class E. Galo of the Pine Tree Stables won easily in three straight heats, without once being headed. He was the favorite in the betting from the start, so for once the sporting fraternity did not go astray in their calculations. The best time of the race was 2.18 1/2 made in the second heat, but it was quite easily to be seen that El Galo did not go the limit—he simply didn't care to. In this race there were nine entries, and nine horses came to the scratch. Sandy Stewart drew the pole for Meadowvale, but failed to profit much by the advantage, as she was the last to reach the wire at the close of the heat. The other local horses, Cecil Mack and Daisy Wilkes, kept pretty close to the tail end of the procession. These horses do not seem to know how to play to the galleries in their home town. Prince Altonley of the Brison stables, and Buchanan, made the race with El Galo, and won second and third places respectively.

There were two mishaps during the afternoon, but nothing more serious resulted than a broken sulky. While preparing for the start in the 2.18 class, Guy F. reared and threw himself. Driver Miller, by an acrobatic feat, managed to save himself from injury, and the horse was quickly secured.

Starter Dorothy kept a firm grip on things, and allowed no unnecessary delays between heats. The other officials were the same as on the previous day.

The 71st regiment band rendered a capital program of music during the afternoon, which was much enjoyed. The rainstorm of Thursday left the track heavy in places, and accounted for the slow time in the named races.

JOHN E. MCCARTHY DEAD

A Well Known And Esteemed Citizen Succumbs After Brief Illness.

The death took place at his home King Street at an early hour this morning of Mr. John E. McCarthy one of Fredericton's best known and most highly respected citizens, after an illness from heart trouble extending over some weeks.

Mr. McCarthy was born in Fredericton 68 years ago and resided here all his life. When quite young he engaged in the meat and provision business and after the lapse of some years he admitted Mr. Nathaniel Cameron to partnership. The firm continued for over twenty years and built up a large and profitable trade. The firm was dissolved by Mr. Cameron's retirement and Mr. McCarthy about eight years ago sold out to Mr. Isaac Kilburn and has since lived in retirement.

In his younger years Mr. McCarthy took an active interest in musical matters and he was one of the original members of Bryson's Band, a organization that flourished in the old days. He was also a director of the old York County Agricultural Society, of which Mr. John H. Rei was the moving spirit.

Mr. McCarthy was an honorable, upright citizen, whose word was as good as his bond, and during his business career he formed a large circle of friends both in the city and county, who will learn of his death with sincere regret.

The deceased gentleman is survived by a widow and five sons, Mr. John E. McCarthy of Tusket, N. S., and Messrs. Charles N., George M., Joseph and Justin at home, and by one daughter, Miss May McCarthy, stenographer for J. F. VanBuskirk. He is also survived by one brother, Mr.

Dennis McCarthy of Boston, and two sisters, Mrs. James E. Barlow of Portland, Me., and Miss Ellen McCarthy of Merrimack, Mass.

The funeral will take place on Monday morning. The remains will leave the house at 8.45 o'clock and services will be held at St. Dunstan's church at nine o'clock.

Mr. James A. McAdam has charge of the funeral arrangements. Friends are requested to omit sending flowers.
