INSPECTION TOUR.

DEFEATED.

Hon. Geo. A. Murchie, of Calais, well known in Fredericton, was a candidate for the Republican nomination in the fourth district of Maine for representative at Washington, to succeed the late Hon. Llewellyn Powers, at the party convention held Thursday at Bangor but was defeated, the nomination going to Hon. F. A. Guernsey, of Dover. Mr. Murchie served several terms as State Senator from his district.

BAPTIST PICNIC

The Sunday School picnic of the Brunswick Street Baptist church will be held on Thursday, August 13th, at Upper Sheffield, going by steamer Elaine, which leaves her wharf at 6 o'clock. The return will be made by the steamer Victoria. AROUND THE MARKET.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather, there was a good size market this morning, and country produce brought good prices. A few salmon, caught at Springhill, sold at 15 cents per pound. New potatoes brought 25 cents a peck, cucumbers, 15 cents a dozen, carrots 5 cents a bunch, butter 24 cents, eggs, 24 cts., lamb, 75 cents and \$1 per quarter, raspberries, 30 cents a half peck, blueberries, 10 cents a box, chickens, 75 cents a pair, hocks, 5 cents a bunch, apples, 20 cents a peck, onions, 5 cents a bunch.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Mr. Alfred Grant, who is employed on the highway bridge, assisting to the removal of the old wooden piers, met with an accident yesterday afternoon, which resulted in the loss of his left eye. A charge of dynamite had been exploded on the pier, and a flying stone struck Grant in the eye. He was at once removed to the city hall, where Dr. McGrath was soon in attendance, and had the unfortunate man taken to the Victoria Hospital. Here it was found that the sight of the optic had been destroyed. The unfortunate man was also badly cut about the face. The accident will cause him to lay up for some weeks. Grant is a married man and resides on Regent street.

DEATH AT DOUGLAS.

The death occurred at Douglas last evening of Mrs. Sarah Hallet, widow of the late Mr. Josiah Hallet of that place. She had reached the advanced age of eighty-nine years, and enjoyed good health up to a short time ago. She passed away at the home of Mr. Charles Parent. She leaves no children, her nearest relative being one brother, Mr. James Huestis of Chicago. The funeral will take place at two o'clock on Sunday afternoon with services by Rev. J. H. MacDonald. Interment will be made at the Dayton burying ground. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

ILLEGAL MOOSE KILLING.

Mr. W. A. Lindsay, who was sent to the Portabella stream to investigate reports of illegal moose killing which lately emanated from that section, returned home last evening. In company with an Indian he made the trip down the stream as far as French Lake, and came upon the carcasses of two moose. One was that of a cow that might possibly have died a natural death, as he saw no marks upon the body, and the other was that of a bull which had been shot some time within the last few weeks. A portion of the hindquarters had been removed, and the remainder of the carcass left to rot. The perpetrator of the outrage was not discovered. Mr. Lindsay saw during the trip seven moose and three deer.

D. G. SMITH DEAD

A gentleman from Newcastle, who came over on the train today, is authority for the statement that a telegram reached there yesterday, announcing the sudden death in New York, of Mr. D. G. Smith, formerly fishery commissioner for New Brunswick. Mr. Smith was widely known as a journalist, and for some years was connected with the St. John press. Subsequently he published the Chatham Advance, and was for a time official reporter of the legislature. He removed to New York about two years ago. He is survived by a widow.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK.

This city experienced a distinct shock of earthquake at seven o'clock this morning. It only lasted a few seconds, but rattled dishes and window-panes, and was noticed by a number of people. The city experienced a similar shock from an earthquake about ten years ago.
