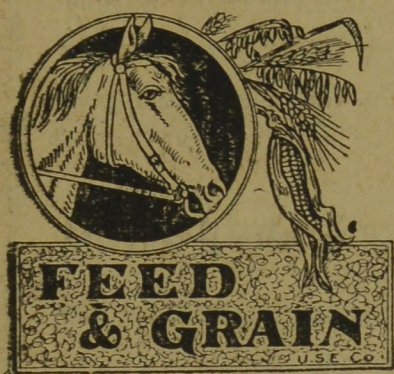

THE BALANCE SHEET.

Not as an answer to its critics, or with the hope of satisfying the constant persistent demand for lower rates, but just as a matter of news, the interesting fact has been given out that the Grand Trunk has with in the last few years expended \$15,000,000 in double tracking the main line from Montreal to Chicago, that they have now over a thousand miles of double line—the longest continuous double track under one management in the world.

At the same time they have been laying down 80 pound steel where in former days there was 65 and 72 pound rails. And now, having set a new and heavier standard, they are replacing the 80 pound steel with new rails weighing one hundred pounds to the yard. In other ways they are bringing the system up to the standard which will make it in all respects a first-class railway. Every new bridge put in is made to carry the heaviest load.

All this money, or the most of it, finds its way back to the pockets of the people, for the work is done largely in Canada, and the materials entering into the work are largely the products of Canadian mills and Canadian hands.

And all over the past system from Niagara on the south, North Bay at the North—from Portland to Chicago they are building new shops, round houses, stations and other buildings. In the double track alone the company have provided additional safety that no mere block system could secure. No doubt as business justifies other lines will be double tracked especially the lines leading down from the Great Lakes, the outlet for the wheat of the Northwest.

CIVIC DEADLOCK

Council Again Threw Out Police Commission's Recommendations

The Situation More Complicated Than Ever

The police situation is more complicated than ever, as a result of the special meeting of the city council last evening. A second report from the commission was under consideration for over two hours, and after important amendments were adopted, the whole report was thrown out body and breeches, thus annulling the work of the evening.

It does not look as if the police commission as at present constituted will be able to do business with the city council this year. Five members of the council are determined to have no truck with the commission whatever, two members are willing to meet them halfway, and the remaining three are apparently willing to seriously consider the commission's recommendations. As a matter of fact the council and commission are nearly as far apart as the north and south poles, and the chances are they will not get much closer together this year.

At last night's meeting the anti-commission men, led by Ald. Farrell, beat their opponents to a standstill, and outgeneralled them at every point. There were only nine aldermen present during the early part of the evening, and Ald. Clark, who seemed to be the leader of the defending forces, had the whole thing right in his hands at one time, but failed to score. Had the commission men accepted an amendment offered by Ald. Walker, they would have pulled out fairly well, but they let the opportunity go by, and paid the penalty. There was a lot of discussion during the evening, and it was quite acrimonious at times. Several of the speakers gave evidence of considerable feeling, and it looks as if a breach has occurred among the aldermen that cannot be healed.

Mayor Chestnut presided at the meeting, and the aldermen were all present, although it was nearly eleven o'clock when Ald. Jewett put in an appearance. The anti-commission men did considerable sparring for wind before his arrival.

The city clerk read the notice of meeting, which stated that it had been called to take action upon the report of the police commission, and a communication from the board of assessors.

The mayor in reply to Ald. Clark, said that the meeting had been called by Aids. Walker, Mitchell and Weddall.

POLICE COMMISSION'S REPORT.

The city clerk read the following report from the police commission: To His Worship The Mayor, and Aldermen of the City of Fredericton.

The Commissioners of Police would again report as follows:

1. The appointment July 2nd, 1908 of one Police Constable at a salary of Sixty Dollars (\$60.00) per month until December 31st, 1908, and thereafter, if retained, at Sixty-six Dollars and sixty-six cents (\$66.66) per month.

2. The appointment of a Police Constable on July 2nd, 1908, at a monthly salary of Forty-five Dollars and eighty-three cents (\$45.83) until December 31st, 1908, and thereafter, if retained, at Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month.

3. The appointment of a Police Constable July 2nd, 1908, at a salary of Forty-five Dollars (\$45.00) per month to December 31st, 1908, and thereafter, if retained, at Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month.

4. The appointment of a Police Constable July 6th, 1908, at a monthly salary of Forty-five Dollars (\$45.00) per month until December 31st, 1908, and Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month thereafter, if retained.

5. The appointment of a Police Constable July 6th, 1908, at a monthly salary of Forty-five Dollars (\$45.00) per month until December 31st, 1908, and Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per month thereafter, if retained.

6. Uniforms and accoutrements for all Police Constables to be supplied by the city, and the city to pay the cost of a telephone in the home of the first one mentioned.

7. We respectfully ask that you approve of the above and if objection be made to the appointment of the number of men above stated, we would be pleased to meet the Council in Committee, and state our reasons for the appointment of five instead of four officers.

Fredericton, N. B., July 13, 1908. Ald. Mitchell moved, seconded by Ald. Clark that the report be received and taken up section by section.

SAME OLD STORY.

Ald. Farrell stated that the report was precisely the same as that con-

sidered by the council at the meeting on Tuesday. They all remembered what had then taken place and also the ruling of the chair, therefore he held that what was done on Tuesday evening, would have to be reconsidered before any further action be taken. He moved that the minutes of Tuesday evening be read by the city clerk.

The motion was seconded by Ald. Hooper and carried on the following division:

Yeas—Farrell, Hooper, Crowe, Winslow, Kitchen—5.

Nays—Clark, Mitchell, Walker, Weddall—4.

The mayor declared the motion carried whereupon the city clerk read the minutes.

The Mayor in reply to Ald. Farrell said that as the city now had a police commission and a police force being a necessity to the city, it was the duty of the council to grapple with the question and arrive at some conclusion. A report having been submitted by the commission it could be considered by the council, and they could amend it if they saw fit.

Ald. Farrell contended that the report was identical with the one previously submitted, which had been rejected by the council. He wanted to know what position the council would be in should they now adopt the report and he did not want to be understood as being opposed to the council considering the report and would accept the ruling of the chair.

Ald. Hooper agreed with Ald. Farrell that the report was identical with the one previously considered. He observed that the report called for the appointment of five policemen instead of four, and the council had already declared against the increase.

The mayor told Ald. Hooper that he was free to move an amendment to Ald. Mitchell's motion.

Ald. Hooper—As matters stand we might as well let it go now.

As the mayor was about to put the motion Ald. Farrell announced his intention of moving an amendment if the council would allow him time to prepare one and after about ten minutes delay he moved an amendment to the effect that the board having declared for the strictest economy and public opinion being absolutely against the proposal of the police commission to increase the cost of the police force the proposition to increase the number of policemen be not entertained.

Ald. Kitchen seconded the motion.

Ald. Winslow expressed himself as being in hearty accord with the amendment. The citizens were opposed, he said, to having more than four policemen, and were opposed to increasing their salaries. He thought the report was practically the same as the one considered by the council on Tuesday evening. The amendment would have his hearty support.

Ald. Walker moved an amendment to the amendment, the substance of which was that the number of the policemen be four instead of five, that the salary of the first named policeman be \$55 per month, and that the three other policemen be paid \$41.75 per month, or \$500 per year; also that the words "December 31st" be struck out of sections 1, 2, 3, and 4.

Ald. Crowe asked that Ald. Hooper make a few remarks on the dog nuisance.

Ald. Hooper assured the council that he was not done with the dog nuisance. He promised to bring it up again when the police commission got settled down to business.
