## CITY COUNCIL.

(Continued from Fourth Page.)

to strike out the promise of an increased salary on December 31st.

Ald. Farrell pointed out that there were four sections of the report exactly alike. There was no way the council could tell who the men were who were appointed on the dates mentioned. The commission had dropped two good men from the force without cause, and had gone to Bear Island and Sunbury County for men to replace them. He would not care to vote for the dismissal of the two members of the force who had served the city for many years. He (Farrell) wanted it understood that he was voting on the question before the board under protest, as he did not believe that the council had any right to deal with the matter in view of the action previously taken.

Ald. Hooper discussed the question at some length. He said that of Commissioner Johnston had asked for the appointment of policeman at a salary of \$1,000 a year each, some members of the board would have voted for it. He did not believe that the two new men appointed to the force would compare favorably in the matter of physique with ex-policemen King and Chapman. A few nights ago there was a new policeman standing on the corner of Regent Street when his attention was called to a disturbance going on a short distance away. "go and get Winters," he said, "he will stop that." Ald. Hooper went on to say that two years ago when the policemen had petitioned for an increase of salary, Sergt. Phillips had refused to sign it on the ground that he did not want an increase. He (Hooper) was opposed to increasing the salary of any policeman.

Ald. Winslow moved that the salary of the policeman referred to in section 2 be \$41.66 per month instead of \$45. This was adopted by a vote of 6 to 2.

Ald. Farrell sharply criticised one of the police appointed by the commission, claiming that he had a bad record in Houlton.

Ald. Winslow made a motion fixing the salary of policeman No. 3 at \$41.66 instead of \$45.

Ald. Mitchell said that one of the old policemen received \$45 a month and the citizens did not want to change it.

### ALD. CROWE'S AMENDMENT.

Ald. Crowe said that he favored a chief of police, as he believed that the force wanted a head, otherwise the city would have the same old state of affairs that had existed, for twenty years. They certainly wanted one officer with more authority than the others, and he should receive extra remuneration. He thought that \$50 per month was fair remuneration. He closed by moving an amendment that the salary of the one of the policemen be \$55 per month. Ald. Clark seconded the motion.

Ald. Farrell pointed out that the third section had reference to Officer Wright. The sections dealing with the chief and sergeant had been dealt with, and now it is a question as to whether or not the council wants to fix Policeman Wright's salary at \$55.

Ald. Mitchell said that in view of Ald. Crowe's motion he would, with the consent of the seconder withdraw his amendment, that the salary be \$45.

Ald. Hooper found fault with Ald. Crowe for not moving his amendment when the first section was under consideration. He must have known that the first section referred to the big chief.

Ald. Walker was surprised that Ald. Crowe had not voted for his (Walker's) amendment.

Ald. Crowe's amendment was lost on the following division:

Yeas—Weddall, Mitchell, Crowe, Clark—1

Nays—Kitchen, Hooper, Walker, Winslow, Farrell—5.

### NEW MEN BOWLED OUT.

The amendment fixing the salary at \$41.66 was put and declared carried. Ald. Farrell moved that sections 4 and 5 be struck out. He thought that ex-policemen Chapman and King should be given a chance to show what they can do under the new management. They were citizens of Fredericton, and were certainly deserving of consideration at the hands of the council.

Ald. Walker said that he had always been of the opinion that the old policemen should have been given a chance and had he been a member of the commission he would have voted that way. He moved that the salary of the policeman referred to in section 4 be fixed at \$41.66.

Ald. Crowe said that he did not think that Policemen King and Chapman had been fairly treated. He was in favor of giving them a trial.

Ald. Walker's amendment was not seconded, and Ald. Farrell's motion was carried without division.

On motion of Ald. Farrell the council also voted to strike out section 5 of the report.

### POLICEMEN'S UNIFORMS.

In regard to section 6, relating to the purchase of accoutrements Ald. Hooper wanted to know who was going to act as purchasing agent. The chairman, he said, had rather extravagant ideas, and if given his own way, he might fit the men out in gold lace. He moved in amendment that all uniforms, etc., be purchased by the police committee in the usual way.

Ald. Mitchell said that he understood that new uniforms had already been purchased for the policemen this year. If the purchase was made, the committee had acted without consulting the council. If the committee could buy uniforms a commission certainly could.

Ald. Farrell pointed out that the bill for the new uniforms had been submitted to the council at the last meeting, and Ald. Mitchell was then present.

Ald. Winslow said that as chairman of the committee he had followed the usual procedure in calling for tenders. The committee had afterwards awarded the contract to Mr. Howie.

Ald. Hooper's motion was carried on the following division:

Nays—Mitchell, Weddall, Clark—3.

Yeas—Hooper, Kitchen, Jewett, Crowe, Winslow, Walker, Farrell—7

(Ald. Jewett arrived while the discussion was going on, and took his seat.)

A motion to adopt section 7 of the report was lost on the following division:

Yeas—Ald. Mitchell, Weddall, Crowe, Clark—4.

Nays—Ald. Hooper, Kitchen, Farrell, Walker, Jewett, Winslow—6.

### REPORT TURNED DOWN.

Ald. Farrell moved that the council do not approve of this report as amended. Ald. Hooper seconded the motion, and it was carried without division.

This put an end to the discussion, and the majority of the spectators withdrew.

### STILL AT WORK.

Messrs. George E. Fisher and W. W. Hubbard, of the Agricultural commission, accompanied by stenographer J. A. McPeake left this morning for Burton where they are holding a meeting of farmers this afternoon. Dr. Landry, the chairman of the commission, has been called home by the serious illness of his daughter.
