Moncton Lady Doctor Whose Child was Abducted Threatens to Make Disclosures Involving Lawyer and Two Ladies

MONCTON, July 13.—(Special)—Sensational disclosures involving the name of a prominent Moncton lawyer and two ladies well known in society circles of this city are promised by Dr. Elia Oberg unless her little son, Holger, kidnapped by her divorced husband from the home of friends at Matapan, Mass., on Dec. 21 is forthcoming.

Dr. Oberg, who practices osteopathy here, claims that Monctonians furnished Oberg with information of her own movements and which materially aided him in carrying off her four year old Holger of whom Dr. Oberg had legal guardianship through a decision of a United States Court.

Dr. Oberg believes they know where her child is at present and unless she is given information through which she can secure her little one the names are to be disclosed.

Since the day on which her boy was torn away from the arms of its nurse at home by Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Gill in Mattapan a suburb of Boston Dr. Oberg has never had a trace of

Oberg or her child although she has never relinquished her efforts to trace them through the employment of detectives and of every other means possible.

"If I could only get my boy," says Dr. Oberg, "I would be willing to forgive every one who helped in the abduction but if I don't get him I intend that the world shall know who helped get him away from me."

Dr. Oberg claims that one of the women came to her on pretense of desiring osteopathic treatment, and managed to establish herself on friendly footing with the Doctor.

The other woman, Dr. Oberg says, was introduced to her socially, and in the course of conversation with women managed to secure considerable information of the address and of Dr. Oberg's friends and was particularly anxious about learning the exact train on which Dr. Oberg was to leave the city for Mattapan, where she intended spending the Christmas holidays with her little boy.

The lawyer in the case, Dr. Oberg says, was introduced to her, and had spoken of taking treatment from her for a sore throat.

THE CRAZY "DREAMERS"

Sharp and His Fellow Missionaries Want to Reclaim the Doukhobors.

ELKHORN, Man., July 13.—(Special)—With rifles over their shoulders and pistols at their belts the little army of Adamites marched through here yesterday afternoon, singing as they walked.

By the time they passed through the town quite a crowd had gathered and the dreamers took advantage of this opportunity to do a little missionary work.

The band lined up and sang a hymn. Then the leader handed his rifle to the boy who stood beside him while he addressed the crowd. He said that all should be allowed freedom of

religion, but he did not expect that they would fully realize that he (Sharpe) was a true prophet.

He admitted that the carrying of firearms detracted from his glory but he could not give them up until God had told him to do so. Christ had come to earth as a dove. Now through him he came as the lion of the tribe of Judah. The Doukhobors were the lost tribes of Judah and he was going to redeem them from their wickedness. He realized the greatness of the task before him but he was sincere and intended to carry it out.

OLYMPIC GAMES

Opened by King Today--Canadian Third in 1st Heat of 1500 Metres Race

LONDON, July 13.—(Special)—With the very worst form of English weather, followed by drizzle, the Olympic games were opened at Shepherd's Bush with a very large attendance. King Edward was present, and the program as arranged was carried through without a hitch.

The first event was the first heat of the fifteen hundred metres race, and this was won by Sullivan of New York; J. D. Lightbody, Chicago Athletic Association, was second, and Meadows, of Canada, third.

Sullivan's time was 4.07 1/2. Lightbody ran this event in the Olympic games bout at St. Louis in 1904 in 4.05 2-5.

A NARROW ESCAPE

Chief of Police Clark, of St. John, warns offenders against the discharge of firearms near the city.

A case which came to the attention of the police Sunday was told to a reporter for The Sun last evening. A rifle ball passed through the shutters and windows of B. G. Dowling's house on Douglas avenue and narrowly escaped doing serious injury to one of the inmates. One of these bullets, supposed to be the same that entered Mr. Dowling's residence, came near hitting a man on the Spar Cove road. The police are working on the case, but have not succeeded in landing the guilty party.

MANAGER ARRESTED

HALIFAX, July 13.—There was no performance given by the Sadie Calhoun Dramatic Company at the Academy of music Saturday night though the show had been advertised. The reason for this was that one of the company had had Sam Allen, manager, and Mr. Hunter, also connected with the management, arrested on a capias or wages alleged to be due. Allen gave bonds and was released but Hunter remained in jail. The local manager then called the performance off despite the strong remonstrance of Miss Calhoun.

FOUR LIVES LOST

MARION, Mass., July 13.—Four prominent summer residents of this town and Falmouth were lost in the explosion on board a 40-foot launch off here Saturday night, and two others were picked up Sunday after having been in the water for twelve hours. The dead: Roland Worthington, Boston; John T. Trull, Woburn; Joseph Beal, Milton; George Harvey MacLehead. The saved, A. P. T. Bell, MacLehead; Edward Parker, Boston.

ORANGEMEN AT CHURCH.

Heard an Appropriate Sermon From Rev. A. A. Rideout--An Extensive Parade

The Orangemen of Fredericton and vicinity including the lodges of Fredericton, Marysville, Gibson, Nashua, and Douglas and the 'Pren-tice Boys of Marysville and Gibson attended divine service at the George Street Baptist Church on Sunday morning and heard an eloquent and appropriate sermon from Rev. Allen Rideout.

The procession which included nearly three hundred men left the Orange Hall at 10.45 o'clock and was headed by the Fredericton Brass Band. Major Gray acted as marshal.

THE SERMON.

The church was crowded with the brethren and after a hymn by the choir and prayer by Rev. Dr. McLeod Rev. A. A. Rideout preached the sermon for the occasion.

He took as his text I Tim. 6: 12. "Fight the good fight of faith" and said in part: We all have our battles to fight during life. There are some we must fight alone, while some must be fought by the nation. The conflicts for liberty, religious freedom and temperance must be fought by the nation. The conflict against sin and evil must be fought alone. Christianity has its progress marked by conflict. The Roman Empire sought to exterminate it. In this conflict thousands sealed their testimony with their blood. Others had trial moreover of bonds and imprisonment they were stoned, they were sawn asunder, they were tempted, they were slain with the sword. But as a result of all this Christianity triumphed. It is interesting to trace the conflict for religious freedom in England. The speaker then related the events which led up to the invitation to William, Prince of Orange to come and become king. He described the course of events in Ireland, making mention of Enniskillen and the siege of Derry and the Battle of the Boyne. These men, he added,

ed, fought for the faith, but we each must fight in our own lives against sin and wrong. To be a victor we must be none other than a good soldier of Jesus Christ.

Some of the qualities of the soldier that should be in our lives are obedience, discipline and readiness for service.

Obedience to orders won the battle of the Boyne. At the charge of Balaklava we see a magnificent example of this soldierly quality. Our order has nothing to fear from without. This founded on principles of eternal truth. The only fear is lest we fail to be obedient to its teaching and thereby weaken its influence. In military discipline we notice the daily training and this should be our aim, to live every day a true Orangeman.

We note also respect for superiors, and the attention to keeping the uniform clean. From this we may learn one is our master, even Christ and to be concerned with keeping the soul unstained by sin. The soldier is ready for service so should all be. We often think of being ready for death, but the true readiness is to do the work of life well. Then we shall meet the messenger as calmly as the morning star meets the dawn.

'Tis ours to go forth and jointly speed the time by good men prayed for long when Christain states grown just and wise shall spur revenge and wrong when earth's oppressed and savage tribes shall cease to pine or wail all taught to praise the English words, Faith, Freedom, Heaven and Home. Ours to be the life of service and helpfulness, and remember they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever.

At the conclusion of the service the procession reformed, after traversing George St. to Regent and up Queen, disbanded at the Orange hall, not separating however, until they had passed a very hearty vote of thanks to Rev. Mr. Rideout in his able and scholarly sermon. It was probably the largest church parade of Orangemen ever seen in Fredericton, and was very creditable to the order and the lodges represented.
