YACHTSMAN DROWNED

Sad Event in the Cruise of St. John Yacht Club.

A sad drowning accident occurred at Fox's wharf at Lower Gagetown, Sunday afternoon, when George Cooke, a bright young man of twenty years of age, son of Mrs. Esther Cooke, of St. John, went to a watery grave. He was knocked into the water from the yacht Myrtle, and never rose, though a brave attempt was made by a companion to rescue him.

In company with T. Herbert Edwards, a fellow clerk in Brock & Paterson's, and George Vaughan, of Vassie & Co's, the young man left the city on Saturday evening on the yacht Myrtle. The boys were going on a two week's vacation and thoroughly enjoyed the delightful sail up the river. Nothing occurred to mar the pleasure until the Myrtle was off Fox's wharf at Lower Gagetown. She was slipping along quietly when suddenly the boom swung around and Mr. Cooke was knocked into the river.

It seems he was unable to swim, and Mr. Edwards quickly plunged in to save his friend. Cooke grasped him frantically and both went to the bottom. Edwards sought to free himself and at the same time to help his friend, but, becoming exhausted, was obliged to break away and strike out for the yacht.

Cooke did not come up again and all effort to save him seemed useless. The yacht drifted ashore and the young men their pleasure jaunt suddenly transferred into a tragic journey, the memory of which will always be with them, sought means of finding the body.

The yacht of the R. K. Y. C. fleet, including the Scionda, had already gone past and it was thought best to overtake them and secure tackle for the recovering of the body.

The accident had been seen by people on the wharf, and the young men were supplied with a team. They reached Gagetown only to find the yachts across the river and they at last overtook them at Jemseg.

The deceased was the youngest son of Esther and the late William Cooke. He was a bright young man of much promise, and is highly spoken of by his employers. He leaves, besides his mother, two brothers, Archibald, of St. Catherine's, (Ont.), and Roy at home.

EXCITING INCIDENT

Moose Jumped into Surveyor General's Canoe

Premier Hazen, Surveyor General Grimmer and party returned home Saturday from their holiday trip on the Tobique, and report a very pleasant outing. Besides the premier and surveyor-general, the party consisted of Miss Kate Hazen, Miss Lois Grimmer, D. K. Hazen and Arthur P. Hazen, manager of the Bank of B. N. A., St. John, and guides, Adam Moore and Chas. Cremin, and their assistants.

Asked if anything unusual happened on the trip, Mr. Hazen said that while at Nictau lake an incident occurred which the guides said was without parallel in their experience. One evening the surveyor general, accompanied by Miss Hazen and Miss Grimmer, with Messrs. Moore and Cremin as canoe men, went out after dark with a jack lantern to look for moose. With a light in the canoe, the canoe is invisible to the moose, and it is possible to get very close as the animal's stand in the water. Quite a number were seen and finally the canoe passed quite close to a large bull, and in doing so the light from the lantern was turned full on him. This happened in a narrow stream or bog at the head of the lake, and

the shadows of the trees cast by the light alarmed the moose so that in rushing for the opposite bank, he bounded with his fore feet right into the canoe, which was invisible to him, and went right over it, sinking it with his weight.

The animal struck the surveyor-general and bruised him considerably. Fortunately there were only a few feet of water where the adventure occurred, and the party escaped with nothing worse than a ducking. The guides, in referring to the incident, said the moose was not attacking the canoe or its occupants but was alarmed by the shadows cast by the lantern.
