A GRANDNIECE OF GENERAL GORDON.

Born in London, Ontario descendant from the Enderley family, Miss Marjorie Adams, who will be seen at the local opera house during the present week, is a lineal descendant of the most heroic and knightly figure that all English history can boast of, Charles George Gordon—"Chinese Gordon"—who perished at Khartoum. All the world knows the story of this strongest and tenderest of men, this soldier, who whenever he fought, covered himself with the glory born of unselfish consecration to duty. Gordon was born at Woolwich, England, in 1833. He saw active service in the Crimea, and in 1863 he went from Crimea to China where, leading an effective army, he effectually quelled the terrible "Taiping Rebellion." In 1873 the Khedive of Egypt made him governor of the Soudan, where, with all the ardour of the old Crusader, he strove for the suppression of the slave trade, and in 1877 he was again invested with the same honor with gratifying results. By 1880, he had brought order out of chaos, and that remote region realized that there were such things as justice and humanity. He was removed and chaos came again, and once more in 1884 he was asked by the English government to go to the Soudan and straighten things out.

Who does not know the result of that expedition, how, after accomplishing all that man could be expected to do at Khartoum, not to any deficiency of his own plans, but to the delay of his own government.

GLoucester Mines.

Mr. John J. Drummond, of Montreal, Ont., president of the Drummond Mining Company, and Mr. W. F. C. Parsons, of London, N. S., the company's engineer, arrived in the city Saturday and were guests at the Queen. Speaking of the iron deposits in Gloucester, which the company has under lease, Mr. Drummond says that the work of exploration is progressing satisfactorily, and thus far the property has come quite up to their expectations. He thinks they will be ready to ship ore in about another year. Messrs. Drummond and Parsons were here on business with the Crown Land office.

COL. BUCHAN'S POST.

London, Aug. 22.—Col. Lawrence Buchan, who had been detained in London owing to a slight accident to his left knee, leaves in the morning for Salisbury Plain, where
