THE LAST SAD TRIBUTE

Remains of late fireman Doucett followed to Grave by Hundreds of People.

The funeral of the late Mr. Stephen Doucett took place at 3.30 o'clock Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the fire department, and was one of the largest seen here for some time. The firemen in uniform walked in a body in the procession, and hundreds of others paid their last tribute of respect to the departed.

Rev. A. A. Rideout was the officiating clergyman, and conducted an impressive service at the late home of the deceased over the Central hose station. The George Street Baptist church choir was in attendance and rendered appropriate hymns. At the conclusion of the service the casket containing the remains was placed on the hose cart, which was appropriately draped for the occasion, and the procession being formed with the Fredericton Brass Band in the lead, proceeded to the Rural cemetery by way of King street. The service at the grave was also conducted by Rev. Mr. Rideout.

The pall bearers were Messrs Johnstone McKenzie, George Edney, Robert Coombes and Herbert Stevenson, all members of the fire department.

There were a number of beautiful floral offerings, including a ladder from the firemen, three links from the Oddfellows' lodge, Manchester Unity, a wreath from Mrs. J. G. Bolter, basket of flowers from Mr. and Mrs. William Spiers, and a bouquet from Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Colter.

The funeral arrangements were in charge of Undertaker John G. Adams.
