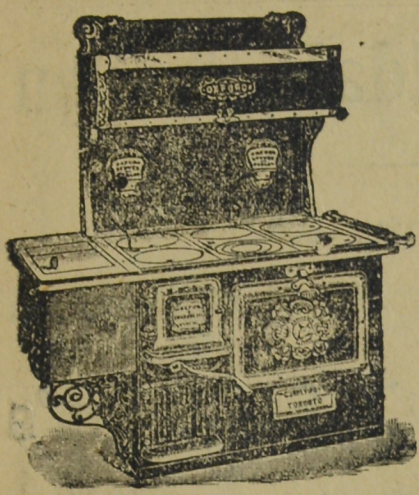

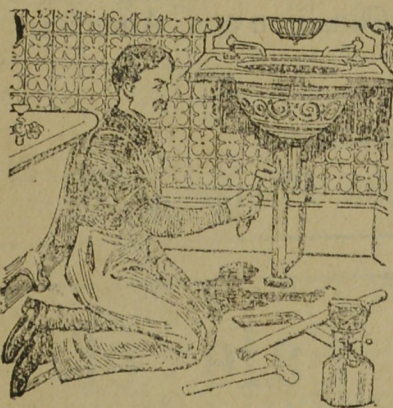

KING OFF TO BRIGHTON.

Will Spend Another Week at Seaside.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—King Edward left here for Brighton yesterday, his appearance indicating that he had practically recovered from his recent attack of influenza. He will remain at the seaside resort until about Dec. 21, when he goes to Sandringham for the holidays. By that time he expects to have fully recovered his health.

As he boarded the train here yesterday His Majesty chatted pleasantly with the railroad officials on the platform and cordially acknowledged the salutations of his fellow-passengers. His eye was bright, his step brisk, and he gave every indication of rapid convalescence.

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—A cable despatch to The American from London says: The King's condition is not encouraging; his Majesty is much sicker than the English newspapers will permit their readers to know. Indeed, his condition is no better than it was when he sought Brighton for the cure of his alleged influenza.

He insisted on attending the levee at Buckingham Palace on Monday, where several notables were invested with the insignia of the honors conferred on them for the King's birthday, but afterwards it was announced that the King could not go to Rangmore, where Lord Burton had invited a distinguished party to meet him for several days' shooting.

The fact is the King's physicians would not permit him to go to Rangmore, and they protested against his coming to London, but the King insisted.

His Majesty looked not only ill, but greatly distressed when he arrived at the station after his short trip from Brighton. His neck was muffled up and the familiar cigar was missing. He looked the sick man he is, despite the loyal, roseate London reports to the contrary. His

Majesty is peevish and impatient, and broods over his condition.

He manifests a desire to be left alone, and at Brighton often sat for hours moodily gazing seaward.

Lord Burton had made extravagant plans for the King's entertainment. A special railway station has been constructed, fitted up with electric light and a heated interior littered with costly rugs and smothered with rare flowers. The extravagance of the great brewing Peer is wasted, for the King is unable to see it.

PRETTY CLOSE VOTING.

Local Option Contests in the West had varied Results.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 16.—The petitions for local option were voted on yesterday at the towns of Emerson, Morris, Selkirk, Carberry, Russell, the municipalities of Louise, Roblin, Westbourne, Bifrost, Franklin, Winchester, Hamiota, Albert and Minitonas. The petitions for repeal of local option were voted on in the municipalities of Kildonan, South Norfolk, North Norfolk, Argyle, Riverdale, Edward, Pipestone, Odanah, Rossburn, and Swan River Village.

The results are: Local option gains Emerson, majority 1; Roblin, majority 11; Winchester, majority, 60; Hamiota, majority, 123; Minitonas, majority, 30.

Local option sustained—North Norfolk, majority 6; Edward, large majority; Pipestone, majority, 250; Odanah, majority, 19; Swan River, majority, 18.

Local option repealed—Kildonan, majority, 68; Argyle, majority not known.

License sustained—Morris, majority, 27; Selkirk, majority, 95; Carberry, majority, 35; Russell majority, 3; municipality of Louise, 32; Westbourne, majority, 28; Franklin, majority, 55. The vote in South Norfolk is tied.

The Grandview injunction prevented a poll and there are five places not heard from yet. The results are not yet available from Prince, Belfrest, Napinka and Saskatchewan.
