LABOR VS. LIQUOR

SLUG ONE

To the Editor of The Herald:

Sir,—The correspondent for the liquor license law in a recent communication attempted to show that firms in Owen Sound employing large numbers of men were in favour of licensing the liquor business in that town. No argument is needed to help intelligent people to decide as to whether or not a tavern of any kind helps either the laborer or the employer of laborers.

The C. P. Railway company employs more men than any other corporation in Canada; 74000 men being on its pay roll. We submit a clipping from the "Witness" which presents the attitude of the president of this great railway company on the relation of the licensed tavern to the workingman. It is as follows:

"An interesting story in connection with Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's recent visit to Western Canada has just reached Montreal. According to this story, the C.P.R. has for years operated a hotel at Moosejaw, and in the arrangement of the building the ticket office and baggage room were on one side of a hall, and on the other side was the bar. This bar was very conveniently placed close to the front door, and easy access could be had to it both by the travelling public and by the trainmen.

Sir Thomas alighted from his car, the "Killarney," on his arrival at Moosejaw, and walked up and down the platform in his usual brisk and energetic manner. He stopped at the front door of the hotel and looked critically at the bar. "Close that place up!" he said abruptly. The official to whom the order was given intimated that the license for the bar would expire within a few months and he supposed that what Sir Thomas desired was that when it expired it should not be renewed.

"No," said the president, "I do not want it closed at the end of the year, nor at the end of the month. I want it closed now. Lock that door and pay off those men. We have too many trainmen running into Moosejaw to allow a bar to be operated in that room."

Before the president left the door of the bar it was locked. When it was re-opened the liquor had disappeared, and the room is now devoted to more useful purposes.

The Baltimore & Ohio is a large railway corporation of the U. S. Note the following from a daily paper: "It is officially announced today that hereafter employees of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, having anything to do with the running of trains, will not be permitted to use intoxicants at any time, either when on or off duty, and no person using such beverage will be employed. This action has been taken by the officials of the railroad in an effort to reduce the number of accidents."

The views of the management of these two great railway corporations we think are a sufficient answer to the vapourings of the herring correspondent A. B. on this question.

NINETY-SIX CONTESTS.

Local Option Campaign in Ontario Municipalities.

TORONTO, Dec. 23.—There are local option campaigns on in ninety-six municipalities throughout the province, and repeat contests in six. In these municipalities there are 273 licenses.

A feature of the campaign is that thirty-seven of those municipalities now trying local option are incorporated towns and villages. In those places the liquor traffic is particularly strong. However, organization work is in fairly good condition, as reported to the sub-executive of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance at its last meeting.

Great quantities of literature are being circulated, and the special campaign number of The Pioneer are being freely used. The aggregate circulation of these special campaign editions to date is nearly 200,000.

Another feature of this year's campaign is the small number of places where repeat contests are on. There are fifty-four municipalities in the province where local option has been in force three years or more, yet it only six of these is there an attempt being made to repeal the law. In those few, however, the liquor forces are entering their efforts. Notwithstanding this, the temperance forces are confident of victory in all the places.

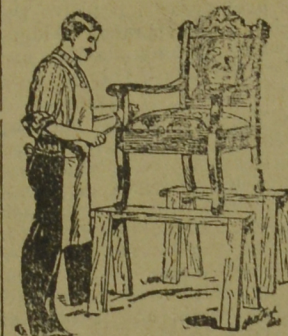
