CRUSHED BY ICE-FLOES.

Sealing Steamer Grand Lake Sent To The Bottom.

St. John's Nfld., April 15.—Bringing tidings of the sinking of the steamer Grand Lake of the sealing fleet and the serious injury of several others by ice floes, the steam sealer Newfoundland limped into port today, leaking badly. The Newfoundland's bows and stern were crushed by ice, and her crew of two hundred men were forced to stand by for many hours, pumping and bailing.

The Grand Lake met with disaster last Sunday. She was shut up between two great ice floes until her sides caved in and even her engines crushed. She floated only three hours, but her crew of 214 escaped to the steamer Vanguard, which was close by.

A catch of 20,000 seals went down with the Grand Lake. This cargo was valued at \$130,000 and was insured.

THE PLAIN PLAITED SKIRT.

WHEN selecting designs for tub materials it is quite necessary to avoid fussy, fixy things. They are difficult to launder and do not look well when finished. Plaited designs in skirts are as popular this season as last, and it is not to be wondered at when we consider how universally becoming they are to both stout and slender figures. Take, for instance, the design shown in the accompanying illustration. The gores are fitted snugly in over the hips, and a pretty flare is given the lower edge by inverted plaits. It is not difficult to make a skirt such as this if it is gone about in the proper way.

Before the pieces of the skirt are joined the pieces intended for plaited panels are basted and stitched to the gores according to the notches. The plaits are held in position, basted and pressed. The gores are then joined and the skirt tried on before the back seam is stitched up. Any alteration over the hips is made at this time. The skirt is finished in the center back with an inverted box plait, and the placket should be faced before the seam is sewed up.

Any alteration in length is made at the lower edge. Materials such as voiles, silk or thin cotton goods can be finished by turning up a hem. The extra fullness which is bound to come in at the top edge of the part turned up can be disposed of by laying small plaits, or a gathering thread may be run along the top and the fullness distributed evenly. This, however, is not practical when working with heavier materials, and the most satisfactory way to finish these is to cut a shaped facing that exactly corresponds with the bottom of the skirt.

This seven gore skirt is finished in round length. The pattern is cut in six sizes—from 22 to 32 inches waist measure. To make this garment for the average person it requires 9½ yards of material 27 inches wide or 5½ yards of material 44 inches wide.
