KISS BROUGHT BACK LIFE.

Woman In Trance, About to Be Buried, Restored by Husband's Kiss.

A woman named Mrs. Carton, of Tonbridge, England, has been through one of the most terrible ordeals ever known.

She fell into a trance after a short illness, and was placed in a coffin, in the belief that she was dead.

She lay silent, unable to move or speak, while preparations for her funeral were going on all around her. She watched her husband bend over her body to kiss her for the last time. The warmth of her cheek as his lips touched her face saved her from being buried alive.

Mrs. Carton's husband, who is an engine cleaner, was distracted with grief when, a few days ago, he found her apparently dead after a few days' illness.

All arrangements were made for the funeral; a coffin was brought, and the woman was laid in it.

Then, just as the coffin was about to be screwed down, Mr. Carton asked to be left alone with the body for a moment. He bent over his wife to kiss her for the last time. The cheek on which his lips rested was warm. His wife was alive.

The man, dazed with joy and wonder, sent at once for a doctor, who confirmed his hopes. The doctor ordered her to be removed at once to the hospital. Her condition rapidly improved, and she is now well on the way to recovery.

The woman's story of her experiences during the trance is extraordinary.

"I knew everything which was going on around me," she said, "but I could not move. I could not even speak when I saw that they thought I was dead."

Even when she was put in her coffin and it seemed almost certain that she would be buried alive, she was unable to utter a word to save herself. She could not even speak to her husband as he bent over her.

Only the touch of his lips on her cheek saved her.

Between Two Icebergs.

A captain of an Atlantic liner told me that once when he was crossing the banks of Newfoundland he slowed down for fog and presently suspected that he was not far from ice. He was blowing his whistle at regular intervals. The nearest land was hundreds of miles away. He could not see as far as the bow of his own ship.
