WEIRD TALE OF THE SEA

Mount Royal Driven at the Mercy of the Waves for many Days--Passengers never expected to Survive

LONDON, Eng., January 8.—The Lake Manitoba arrived at Queenstown yesterday to take the Mount Royal's passengers to St. John. One baby passenger died during the voyage. All the rest are well.

QUEBEC, January 8.—Battered by a terrific hurricane that raged unceasingly for days the C. P. R. steamer Mount Royal limped into port yesterday with her machinery disabled.

The Mount Royal's officers described the weather after leaving the Lizard as the worst experienced in Atlantic waters for many years.

One awful hurricane raged unceasingly for days, making the conditions fearful for all on board.

Fortunately the steamship had a huge store of extra provisions. No one could be allowed on deck, but all were assured that the vessel was in a perfectly seaworthy condition. There was much disappointment when it became known that the vessel was put back to Queenstown. Despite the terrible experiences there was only one case of serious illness, that of a baby which died on reaching Queenstown.

Even after Christmas eve the gale continued with unabated force for another five days, but with her back to the hurricane, the Mount Royal rode easier, although only able to make about sixty knots daily. One passenger describing the voyage, said: "We thought we were lost; we saw nothing for fifteen days but a wall of green sea water at both sides of us, and nothing but darkness for days together. We should not have dared to go on deck, as the ship looked as if she was standing on end at times. We spent a most unhappy Christmas, many of us being sick. When at last we came safely to port, we could only thank Heaven for our escape."

Arriving at Queenstown, the passengers assembled and voted their grateful thanks to the captain and officers of the Mount Royal.

ARRIVED AT QUEENSTOWN.

QUEENSTOWN, January 8.—The long overdue steamer Mount Royal steamed slowly into Queenstown yesterday and the news of her safety was received with gladness in shipping circles. She had not been heard from in many days, having been last reported off the Lizard, December 10, and watch was being kept for her on both sides of the Atlantic and as far south as Bermuda. The Mount Royal belongs to the C. P. R. Atlantic service. She left Antwerp December 7 for St. John, N. B., with 300 Hungarian emigrants and a crew of about 100 men. She was first definitely sighted off Old Head Kinsale, 16 miles west of this port early yesterday.

INDIAN CHIEF DEAD.

Ex-Chief Andrew Paul of the Kings clear Indians, died at that place yesterday, after an illness of several months from paralysis. He was over eighty years of age, and quite a noted Indian in his day. He was well posted on the doings of the country around, and could tell many a quaint yarn of old time dwellers by his native stream. "Andy" is survived by eight sons and three daughters.

NATIVE OF STANLEY.

Wm. Pringle, a prominent citizen and principal of the Peterboro, Ont., business college, and a member of the board of education, who died in that town Monday night, of pneumonia, at the age of 46 years, was a native of Stanley, York county, and for a time was associated with Mr. W. J. Osborne of this city, in the Brockville business college. Deceased leaves a wife and three children.

THE HOCKEY MATCH.

The provincial hockey league match at the Arctic rink tomorrow evening between the Capitals and Crescents is being looked forward to with the keenest interest. The Fredericton Brass Band have donated their services for the evening as a benefit to the Capitals.

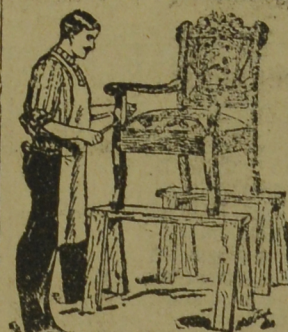
