LAURIER WILL WIN

The Tories are doing a lot of boasting to keep up their courage to the fighting point, but no reasonable man expects other than a glorious victory for Laurier at the polls on Monday next.

Those in close touch with the situation believe that the Liberal majority in the next parliament will not be less than 50, and may run up to 60.

Laurier will have a majority in every province with the exception of Ontario, and possibly P. E. I.

His lead in Quebec will much more than offset the Tory majority in Ontario, and he will have all the rest to the good.

The foolishness of Tory predictions can be seen in the claim that Borden will get 30 seats in Quebec. As a matter of fact the Tory campaign managers there claim less than twenty, and are not likely to get more than twelve.

Laurier will be returned to power by a sweeping majority, in spite of the dastardly campaign of slander to which he and his friends have been submitted, and York county should make haste to get into the victorious Liberal procession by electing Brown.

There is no mistaking the temper of York electors this time.

THEY HAVE HAD ENOUGH OF THE CROCKETS.

No candidate who ever sought election in York has been more warmly welcomed than Mr. Brown.

His speeches throughout the constituency, and his strenuous personal canvass have aroused the electors to a sense of duty, and it will find expression at the polls on Monday.

Brown is the man who understands the people's wants.

Brown is the man who can stand up before any audience and intelligently and eloquently discuss public questions.

Brown represents the farmers, and he is the only farmer candidate on either side in the whole province.

The farmers of York are rallying to Brown's support.

ELECTORS OF YORK RESENT THIS

Here is the kind of drivelling nonsense Mr. S. D. Scott imported from Ottawa to do the Tories' dirty work in this campaign is writing in that abandoned sheet, the St. John Standard, which will promptly suspend publication after the elections:

"Mr. Crocket's victory over Mr. Brown has resolved itself into the question whether the latter will save his deposit. Mr. Brown is a rather clamorous and tumultuous martyr. He has showed clearly enough that he must have been a wretched school inspector. He is repatriated like that he failed to qualify by passing any test requiring knowledge."

When Mr. Scott writes that Mr. Brown will lose his deposit he writes what he knows to be a false-

hood. When Mr. Scott says that Mr. Brown was "a wretched school inspector," he writes another absolute falsehood.

Mr. Scott has not been living in the province since Mr. Brown was an inspector. He is separated like "Uncle Harry," and is paid to write campaign falsehoods about his opponents. That has been his employment at Ottawa for the past three years.

The electors of York will show this Mr. Scott, hiring and slandering that he is, that Mr. Brown is a man, not a sneak, that he holds the respect and esteem of his fellow citizens, and that they consider him a competent man to represent them in parliament.

JUMPED ON BRAITHWAITE.

That was a dirty treatment the Tories gave Henry Braithwaite. His lawyer, Solicitor General McLeod, wrote him that the enquiry into the charges against Millionaire Robinson, would not be held until after the elections, but this week the Tory Surveyor General Grimmer held court at Newcastle in Braithwaite's absence, and announced that the old guide and hunter would be arrested, and his official head cut off, although he holds no office under any government.

Mr. Braithwaite has a lot of friends all up through the Nashua, Stanley and Miramichi country, as well as in this city, of which he is a citizen, who will resent the unfair and unmanly way in which he has been treated.

Mr. Braithwaite, like many another person, has learned not to put his trust in the Solicitor General.

CURRENT COMMENT.

The gentleman declined to make a bet on even 300 majority when confronted by a prominent merchant, and finally withdrew altogether with the remark to a friend that "it wasn't safe to bet on elections anyway."

Poor Hazen. He was always somewhat green in making election forecasts. In his first election in this county, away back in 1885, he was absolutely certain he would win but the present Judge Wilson beat him by 1,000 majority. Mr. Hazen knows he is talking nonsense when he predicts nine Tories elected in New Brunswick. Let him name his men if he dare.

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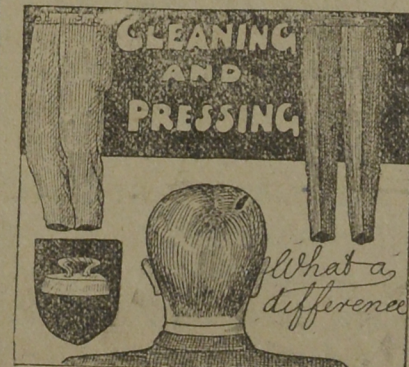
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
