



VOLUNTEER BOUNTY ACT 1908 WARNING TO PURCHASERS

EVERY assignment of the right of a South African Volunteer entitled to a land grant must be by way of appointment of a substitute and must be in the form provided by the Act. Special attention is called to Sub-section 3. Section 5 of the Volunteer Bounty Act, 1908, which provides that no assignment of the right of a substitute shall be accepted or recognized by the Department of the Interior which is not executed and dated after the date of the warrant for the land grant issued by the Minister of Militia and Defence in favor of the volunteer.

BROWN THE MAN FOR YORK

Liberals have Put Up the Greatest Campaign in the History of the County and have the Tories on the Run.

BROWN IS THE MAN FOR YORK. He is out in this campaign to win the party, and they are going to give the Tories of New Brunswick the biggest surprise of the campaign.

When Mr. Brown was placed in nomination by the Liberals four weeks ago, the outlook for success was anything but bright. The Tories went about scoffing at his candidature, and the newspaper organs of the party announced gleefully that as Mr. Crockett had nothing to do at home he would be able to go to adjoining counties to assist his friends.

On the day following his nomination Mr. Brown got busy and he has been busy ever since and so has Mr. Crockett. Friends and opponents admit that Mr. Brown has put up the liveliest and most aggressive campaign ever carried on by a candidate for parliament, in the county of York. He has given evidence of a wonderful capacity for work and from the start he has set the pace for his followers. He has traversed the county from end to end, and has worked eight hours a day. He has conducted a systematic house to house canvass, and has addressed a public meeting each evening.

Mr. Brown's meetings have been well attended, and his stirring addresses have been listened to with great interest. He has rallied all the old time Liberals to his support and in addition has made many converts from the ranks of his opponents. He has also won the admiration of men who do not take an active part in politics but who are believers in fair play and respect a man who hustles and tries to get along in the world. The great silent vote will be thrown for Mr. Brown.

THE BUSINESS MEN OF FREDERICTON are going to support the Liberal candidate on the ground that there is work to be done at Ottawa for the County of York, and Mr. Brown is the man to do it. They know that the Government will be sustained, and they are not anxious for York to spend another four years in the cool shades of Opposition. The FARMERS are going to support Mr. Brown because he is one of their own number, has the ability to present their claims and will do his whole duty by them. The WORKINGMEN of the county are going to vote for Mr. Brown, because they know he is familiar with their needs, that he is a man who has himself toiled, and that he will stand up manfully for their interests. York is a great county with resources to be developed, and it can be made still greater. The people are becoming heartily sick of the self-seekers and rascals who boast they own York County, and they are going to administer to them a well deserved slap in the face on the 26th.

AT WILLIAMSBURG.

On one of the finest meetings of the campaign was held at Williamsburg in the parish of Stanley last evening. This has been a great Tory stronghold in the past, but there are signs of an awakening, and it is freely predicted that Mr. Brown will take more votes out of that district than were ever polled for a Liberal candidate before. The meeting last evening was presided over by Mr. David Peacock, a former Conservative who will on this occasion throw in his lot with the Liberals. The speakers were Mr. Alex. Gibson, Jr., ex-M. P., and Mr. N. W. Brown. They went fully into the issues of the campaign and were listened to with great interest. A few heelers sent out from Stanley for the purpose, tried to break up the meeting by creating a disturbance outside, but the only result was to win votes for the Liberal candidate.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Brown drove to this city arriving here at five o'clock this morning. He rested two hours and took his departure by the Gibson train for Millville. This afternoon he drove through to

Temperance Vale where he will deliver an address this evening. Tomorrow he will drive through to Canterbury Station where in the evening he will speak at a joint meeting along with Solicitor General McLeod. With this meeting he will conclude one of the most strenuous and spectacular political campaigns ever put up in York County by a candidate on either side.

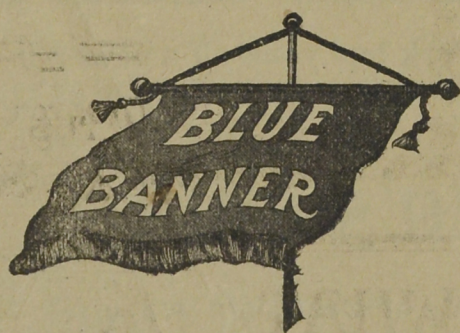
