

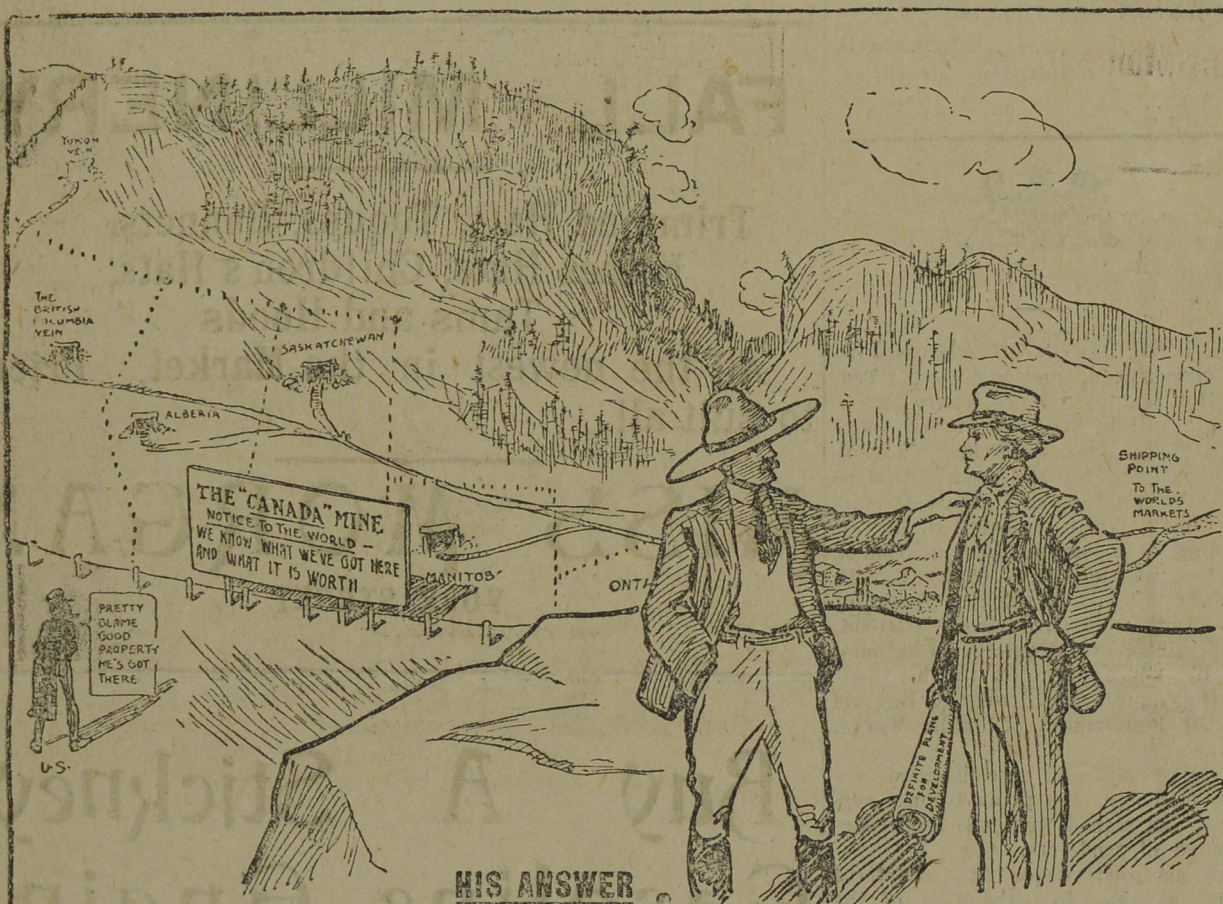
"LET LAURIER FINISH HIS WORK"

Development of Canada's Transportation Facilities one of the Great Questions of the Day.

Laurier's work includes the unprecedented development of transportation facilities. The completion of the St. Lawrence canal system with a uniform depth of fourteen feet; the equipment of harbors on Lake Superior, where grain is shipped; of harbors on Georgian Bay, Lake Huron and Lake Erie for trans-shipment; the improvement of Montreal, Quebec, St. John and Halifax Harbors; the deepening of the ship channel from Montreal to the Gulf; the extension of telegraph services down to the coast; the abolition of canal tolls; the making of the St. Lawrence a safe route for large ships by day or by night; an expenditure of twenty-six millions on canals, thirty-one millions on Government railways, seven millions on Montreal harbor, two millions on the chief lake harbors, twenty millions on bonuses for the building and extension of railways, twenty-seven millions, so far, on the National Transcontinental and the opening of the great coal and metaliferous areas of the Crow's Nest Pass District by the construction of a railway; the Railway Commission, continuously arbitrating between railroads and customers, so successful as to be the envy of other countries.

Laurier's work covers an increase of total trade from 2,626 millions in the last twelve years of Foster to 5,152 millions in the twelve years of Laurier, or almost double; an increase in total exports from 1,223 millions in the twelve last years of Foster to 2,445 millions in the twelve years of Laurier, or just double; a growth in the exports of farm produce from 531 millions in the last twelve years of Foster to 1,106 millions in the twelve years of Laurier; an increase in the export of manufactures from 69 millions in the last twelve years of Foster to 214 and nearly 200,000 farms. As the next move towards placing the road in a position to compete for the grain carrying trade of the west the company proposes to construct a line through Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta. The route as projected will start from the present main line north of Brandon and thence run west across Saskatchewan into the coal dis-

tricts of Southern Alberta. This will give the G. T. P. access to the vast area of the southern half of the "granary of the Empire," and will have an incalculable effect on the agricultural interests of the territory served.

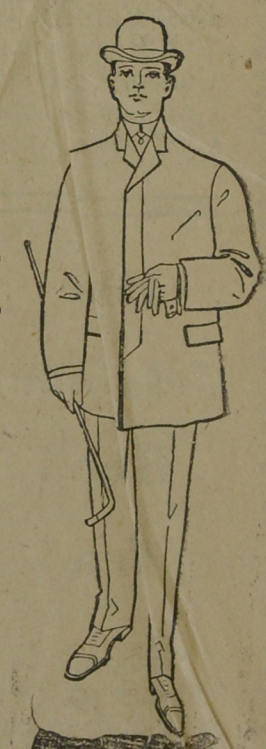

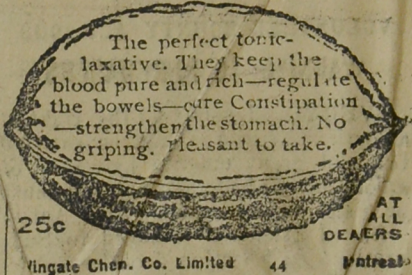
