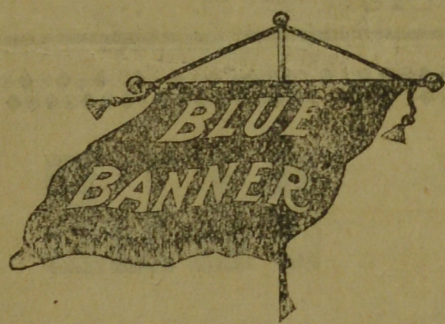

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir: In his desperate efforts to earn his pay, the doughty Liquor License Champion seems to depend mainly upon just two principles, senseless repetition of a false statement, and the telling of a half truth to deceive the public. A most striking example of his tactics was given when he stated that almost every constituency in Ontario had repealed the Scott Act, seeking to convey the impression that Local Option had been a failure in Ontario. The truth is that the Scott Act was repealed in nearly all these constituencies only that a more stringent local option law might be enacted in its stead.

For the whole truth let me refer you to the following extract from a recent speech by Mr. B. H. Spence, secretary of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance:

"We are delighted with and thankful for the results. It is a great victory. We tried this year in hard places than ever before. We had to contend with more strenuous opposition than we ever met before. But the results on the whole show a definite, decided, and I believe, permanent gain. Three-fifths handicap has been a great retarding influence, and by it we have been deprived of the fruits of victory in far more places than we have been beaten in by the strength of our opponents. Out of fifty-three municipalities of re-

gaining the licenses by a bare majority, the liquor traffic attempted the fight in only six places. They chose their own fighting ground and were beaten in five out of six, and not only beaten, but in five cases Local Option was sustained by a largely increased majority. We have more than one half of the rural municipalities in the Province of Ontario without license, and quite a respectable showing of incorporated towns and villages. We carried more towns and villages this year than last, or than we have ever done in any one year."

The Toronto Globe comments as follows: "The liquor interest is strong and well-entrenched and it fights desperately for its existence. It knows that if local option carries under the two-thirds vote a state of prohibition in the municipality is practically permanent. The liquor men spend their time and money freely in their efforts to keep away the reforming influence. The temperance enthusiasts, on the other hand, have very little money, and they are not inspired by the selfishness which prompts the rum traffic to fight for its life. The moral behind Local Option is the uplifting of the moral tone and general improvement of the people's condition. If ninety-five licenses are knocked off every year the movement for the suppression of the bar will soon have gained a practical triumph."

## GIRL TOLD OF HER DEATH.

Remarkable Story of an Experiment at Versailles.

PARIS, March 12.—Comte Leonce De Larmandite, director of the important Societe Des de Lettres, told last night of the effort made recently by three French savants to "raise the dead."

"It was out at Versailles," said the Comte. "A young girl apparently died from natural causes, and the physicians, with the consent of the family, secured the body a few hours after the death. The body was immersed in warm water, and subjected to rhythmic electrification. From time to time one of the physicians applied sulphuric acid, while his colleagues made hypnotic passes. After three hours' treatment the girl opened her eyes. Further stimulated she was able to speak."

"When I fell asleep at the hospital," said she, "there was an indefinite period of complete prostration, and then I became conscious of a growing sensation of cold. All my life seemed slowly to concentrate about my heart, and all my thought seemed to retire to a distant corner of the

brain. Then my thought left my body altogether. I could see myself lying there, while I still heard the sound of distant music, but through it all I had a bodily sensation of bitter cold. Suddenly there was a delicate shock. The last tie uniting me and my body was broken. I witnessed a terrible spectacle. My body was the theatre of a terrific struggle, nameless monsters fighting for its possession."

"At this juncture the girl became hysterical, and savagely attacked the physicians. To quiet her they gave her an injection of morphine. The dose was overstrong, and her heart action ceased. Efforts to recall her again to life were ineffectual."

"I was not present during the experiment," said the Comte, "but the story was told me by a man in whom I have absolute confidence. The three physicians are also personally known to me. They are men of undoubted integrity. The only rational explanation is that the girl was not dead, but in a trance. The facts are as related."

#### SUPREMACY OF THE SEA.

Must be Maintained by Britain. Says Mr. Asquith.

London, March 11.—The comparative strength of the navies of Great Britain and Germany, which already has occupied so much time during the present session of Parliament, was again brought to the front this afternoon in the House of Commons by the debate on the naval estimates and it drew from Herbert H. Asquith, the acting Premier a reassertion of the intention of the Government to maintain Great Britain's unassailable supremacy at sea.

Mr. Asquith admitted that if Germany's present programme of naval construction was carried out, she would have thirteen Dreadnoughts and Invincibles to Great Britain's twelve by November, 1911, assuming that Great Britain failed to lay down ships in 1909 to be completed prior to 1911. Without forecasting the naval programme for next year, Mr. Asquith said he could promise without the slightest hesitation that if the Government found a reasonable probability of the German probability of the German programme being carried out in the way the paper

figures suggested, it would feel it its duty to provide not only for an additional number of ships, but for their construction by such a date as to make sure the suggested superiority of Germany would not become a fact.
