TORY CORRUPTION.

Colchester Man Swears He was Given Money
and Rum to Vote for Stanfield

TRURO, N. S., Aug. 28—The trial of A. R. Bayne for bribery in connection with the Stanfield election a lavish hand of rum and money by last November opened here yesterday.

The entire morning was spent in the examination of Alexander McDonald, Five Islands. The guest of his evidence was that following a long conversation in which both indulged in praises of Stanfield, he was given six or more bottles of whiskey and \$15 by Bayne.

He also swore that the prisoner had approached him and other witnesses that night, and treated them and endeavored to ascertain what their evidence was likely to be. Among those present when the treating was done was Frank Stanfield, brother of Stanfield, Tory M. P.

Mr. Bayne suggested to the witness that he try to forget he had received money and rum from Bayne.

He also said Bayne asked him to come before the stipendiary and say he had received no money or rum.

Four other witnesses told of getting rum and money on nomination day and also on election day, two brothers getting two grips full of rum to aid the Tory cause.

HALIFAX, Aug. 21—The lifting of the lid in the bribery trial of Alonzo R. Bayne, the Yankee mining man who seems to have been the chief operator in the "purity" election of John Stanfield, M. P. for Colchester, yesterday continued to furnish startling revelations of corruption practiced on behalf of the Opposition candidate in the famous by-election.

THE KIRK PICNIC

A Pleasant Affair at Which Rev. Mr. Layton was made Recipient of
Handsome Purse

The grounds of the Fredericton Boom Company at Douglas, furnish an ideal place for a picnic and the members of St. Paul's Sunday School and their friends greatly enjoyed their outing at that beautiful spot yesterday afternoon.

Children and adults were conveyed to the grounds by specially chartered busses, while many others who attended went up in private conveyances.

There was a program of sports for the children, and the supper tables were bountifully supplied with the most toothsome viands. It is estimated that fully 500 persons enjoyed the hospitality of the Kirk ladies, whose hospitality is proverbial.

When the supper had been disposed of, Mr. Joseph Howe Dickson, a member of St. Paul's board of trustees, requested the presence of Rev. R. B. Layton, the popular young clergyman, who for the past four months has been supplying St. Paul's pulpit and doing the pastoral work of the congregation so acceptably.

Mr. Layton blushed like a bridegroom as he came to the front, and

his embarrassment was not lessened when Mr. Dickson in eloquent language referred to the young clergyman's successful ministrations in St. Paul's, and produced a bulky and attractive looking parcel, which he said contained \$100 in shining gold, which he presented to Mr. Layton as a token of the congregation's appreciation of his services.

Mr. Dickson before concluding referred to Mr. Layton's approaching marriage to an estimable young lady in Nova Scotia, and extended in felicitous language his own and the congregation's best wishes for the happiness of the prospective bridegroom and bride.

Three cheers for Mr. Layton were then heartily given and in reply he made a pleasant address in which he heartily thanked the congregation for their great kindness to him during his pleasant residence in Fredericton and for the generous gift which was a great surprise to him. He said he had made a great many friends in Fredericton, whom he would cherish to the end of his life, and he hoped that St. Paul's would soon have a settled pastor.

The picnicers returned to the city at dusk all pleased with the afternoon's enjoyment.

OLD GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

Chief Commissioner Morrissey, who has been in the city for several days on departmental business, made a visit to old government house this afternoon and looked over the property. It is scarcely likely that the chief will recommend that it be rehabilitated as an official residence for the Lieutenant Governor.

CENTRAL R.Y. ENQUIRY

Dr. Pugsley Refuted Fiction Which Mr. Powell Tried to Establish as Facts.

Senator King and Governor Tweedie Among Those Giving Evidence.

At Thursday's sessions on the Central Railway inquiry at St. John, Hon. William Pugsley was present and although not on the stand as the witness, he gave the commission a lot of valuable information and succeeded in clearing up a number of points under dispute, in several cases showing Mr. Powell to be in error.

The morning session opened with the evidence of S. Leonard Shannon who, on behalf of the Department of Railways and Canals, in 1904 investigated the cost of the N. B. C. & R. Co.'s line. He made the total cost of the road \$328,139.38, without including payments which he thought did not come under this head.

Senator King told of the history of the road, both before he was connected with it and while he was acting as commissioner. He said the part of the road between Chipman and Minto would be, with better ballasting considered a first class piece of railroad.

During the morning Mr. Powell asserted that \$13,000 had been paid by the government on account of work done on the Minto extension, and that the same amount had afterwards been paid as subsidy. He gave as his authority an order in council which Mr. Pugsley turned up and showed that the order stated that as the amount had been paid it would have to be deducted from the subsidy.

In the afternoon Mr. Pugsley pursued the matter further and showed by copies of orders in council that an arrangement had been made with the railway company to deduct more than this amount from their subsidy by reducing the allowance from \$3,000 to \$2,500 per mile.

AFTERNOON SESSION
At the afternoon session Contract- or John A. Wheaton told of his con-

nection with the road and also of resigning his contract for the construction of the Minto branch to the Barnes Construction Company for the consideration of \$5,000.

Lieutenant Governor Tweedie was on the stand for the rest of the afternoon. His evidence was in connection with the road and the payment of subsidies to the company. In examining him, Mr. Powell stated that \$77,000 had been paid in subsidies on the Minto branch, while the court could only find authority for \$65,000.

Mr. Pugsley explained this by turning up orders in council already in evidence showing that the road included two miles of branches more than Mr. Powell had been figuring on. This accounted for \$5,000 more at the rate of \$2,500 per mile. The additional \$7,000 was paid as a subsidy on work done on the road between Minto and Fredericton.

At another time when the court endeavored to question the governor regarding their action in issuing a charter to the N. B. C. & R. Co., Mr. Pugsley brought them up sharply. He reminded the court that under his oath Mr. Tweedie could not divulge the proceedings in council. He furthermore showed that this was entirely outside of the scope of the inquiry and there was no excuse for attempting to elude on the action of the government in this matter.

Mr. Pugsley took a large part in the discussion and having a thorough knowledge of the various transactions he was able to clear up many questions that would otherwise have been left unanswered to leave the impression that a satisfactory answer was not forthcoming.

Several times during the day he was forced to rebuke Mr. Powell for the narrow party spirit he displayed and accused him of making groundless insinuations. This he was able to prove by showing Mr. Powell in error on more than one occasion.

THE FORESTRY SCHOOL

Outlook Bright for a Goodly Number of Students

Prof. R. B. Miller of the Yale Forestry School, who is to have charge of the new department of forestry at the U. N. B., is expected to arrive here about the middle of September to take up his duties. Chancellor Jones has already received applications from some five candidates who are anxious to take the forestry course and he expects a number of others. Hon. Chas. E. Oak has offered to give the students a chance to have some practical training at his camps in the Miramichi woods. He will give employment to the lot for a period of three months at \$1 per day. The matriculation course for those taking forestry will be the same as in the engineering course.

A GOOD DROWING.

The discount period for city taxes expired last night, but figures will not be available until tomorrow. City Treasurer Golding has had a busy time of the last few days and has handled considerable cash. It is expected that the total amount of which the discount has been allowed is greater than last year, when about \$10,800 was paid in. The assessment this year is \$73,000 or \$3,000 greater than last year.
