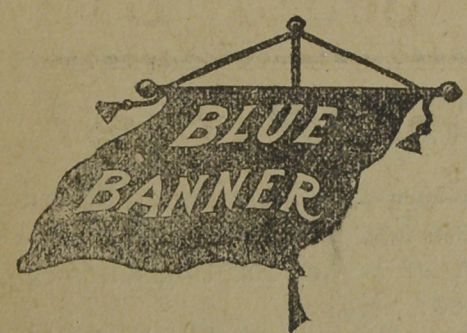

DELEGATES GATHER

Notable Women From Many Countries Are Welcomed.

GOLDEN RULE THEIR MOTTO

The Uplifting of Mankind is the Object of the International Congress of Women, Says Lady Aberdeen at Inaugural Meeting—Dr. Anna H. Shaw Speaks on Woman Suffrage in the Dominion.

Toronto, June 17.—The University Convocation Hall was a riot of color last night at the inaugural meeting of the biennial International Congress of Women. The flags of all nations grouped and massed in themselves conveyed a great meaning. They represented the combination and unity of the international gathering which they graced. From the panels of gold and purple and crimson looked down the royal arms of the British Empire, the white cross on its crimson field of Switzerland, the straggling stars of the southern cross which form the emblem of Canada's sister dominion, the eagle of Austria, the double-headed eagle of the empire of the Czar, the rampant lion of Scotland, the arms of Sweden, Norway, Italy, Argentina, Denmark, Belgium, Germany, Canada, Bulgaria, Greece, and over all the Golden Rule.

It was the Golden Rule which formed the basis of the speeches of all the delegates of these varied lands, a message conveyed in English in each instance—but an English bearing the stamp of the country of the messenger.

Lady Aberdeen on her arrival was accorded a very warm welcome. By the Canadians it was the welcome of a home-coming, and by the other delegates the welcome conveyed appreciation of a great work. She delivered the opening address in which she said, in part:

"Ladies: I must say to you I feel very much to-night like an old mother coming back to see again a young daughter."

"By the very fact that it is the occasion of our coming of age, and that we have arrived at years of discretion, the world has a right to enquire of what stuff we are made and what is our contribution to the world's life. I think we are here to answer for the faith that is in us."

She spoke of those who had watched over the cradle of the council in 1888 at Washington, now no longer in the flesh, and paid tribute to the memory of Frances Willard, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony. She was honored to be able to wear the brooch that Miss Anthony was presented with at Geneva.

"What do we stand for and what do we offer?" she asked. The answer would come clear and strong. The work of the council "induces them to stand together for common action, and even more, to adopt the difficult attitude of refraining from action."

"Just because we are wedded to no one propaganda, just because we impose no restriction and no shibboleth, we welcome all women, of all sects and nations and classes, who are willing to join us in carrying out the principle of doing unto others as we would have them do unto us, that golden rule which is our sole test has brought us into a union so strong we can help the great movements of our generation."

"The keynote of our success and influence must always lie in being rather than doing, in the spirit of our work rather than in the work itself, in the motive underlying our union, rather than in our actual federation. 'As long as we cling' she concluded, 'to that sheet anchor, the spiritual forces behind our work and behind our international comradeship, we will surely work miracles of which we do not yet dream.'"

Addresses were delivered by the national chiefs or their proxies in introducing the delegates and speeches of welcome were made by the provincial, civic and university authorities.

The delegates lost no time in getting into committee work at 'varsity. Of the committees which convened in the afternoon the most notable was that on suffrage and rights of citizenship. Rev. Anna H. Shaw, who was appointed convener of this committee at Berlin five years ago, presided. Representatives from 15 different nations were present.

When the ovation which was tendered the distinguished convener subsided, Dr. Anna Shaw said this was the most enthusiastic and representative international suffragist meeting she had ever attended. The cause had made wonderful progress since it was endorsed by the international council at Berlin and made a fundamental department of the council's work. It was making marvelous progress everywhere. Not only was it one of the most popular of movements, but it had become one of the most fashionable.

"I have just come from New York City, where Mrs. Ople Belmont and other leaders of fashion are devoting themselves to its interests," she said. "Mrs. Ivins, whose husband is regarded as the greatest constitutional lawyer in New York, is another of our leaders."

"It is not necessary for us on this continent to adopt the militant methods of some of the British societies, but if I considered it wise to do so, I should not hesitate. We are making magnificent progress by means of public meetings, literature and organization."

CROWD AT WEDDING

Sightseers Fight Police at Brown-Melvin-Jones Nuptials.

LAURIER AMONG GUESTS

Cordon of Police Is Necessary to Prevent Huge Gathering of Curious Women From Invading Toronto Church While Fashionable Wedding Is In Progress—Sir Wilfrid Laurier Was Present.

Toronto, June 17.—St. Andrew's Church, West King street, was filled by a fashionable congregation yesterday afternoon on the occasion of the marriage of Rev. T. Crawford Brown, pastor of the church, and Miss Eallien Melvin-Jones, only child of Hon. Senator Lyman and Mrs. Melvin-Jones.

Long before the hour appointed crowds began to assemble outside the church, and the police had difficulty in making way for the carriages, private automobiles and taxicabs.

Various places were made to the ushers by women of all classes to gain admission to the church. Old and young jostled each other to secure points of vantage. Every window in the buildings in the neighborhood was filled with interested spectators. At different times the crowd of women became unruly, and on the arrival of the bride with her father, broke through the cordon of police and threatened to overthrow the canopy leading to the church. It was an awful moment. The police were powerless to hold the surging thousands in check. Like a mad rush at a bargain counter women pushed, fought and screamed, and only the prompt action of able-bodied men averted a disastrous scene.

Another rush was made when the bride drove away. Looking through the crowd one could see elderly females and young girls with tense, drawn faces showing a determination to get near at all costs, and they were only restrained by a cordon of police.

As Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who drove up in a taxicab, arrived, a sudden hush came over the great congregation. With all the grace of a French courtier Sir Wilfrid passed down the aisle, his distinguished bearing and immaculate dress making him a conspicuous object.

After the ceremony in the church there was a big reception to 800 guests at Llavraden, Senator Melvin-Jones' home.

Mr. and Mrs. Crawford Brown left by the 10 o'clock train for Montreal and will sail by the Empress of Britain for England and the continent.

Four Russian Dreadnoughts.

St. Petersburg, June 17.—The keels of four battleships of the greater Dreadnought type were laid yesterday morning. They will be of 23,000 tons each, length 608 feet and beam 52 feet. They will have a speed of 20 knots and the main batteries will consist of ten 12-inch guns of a special nickel steel.

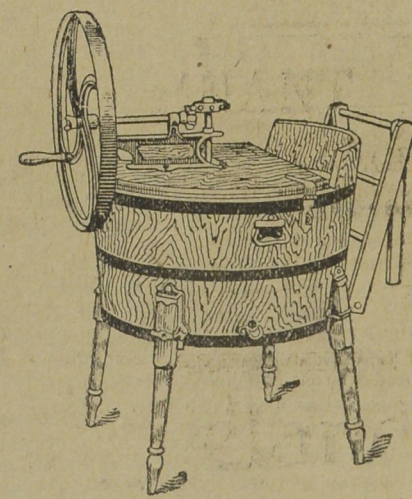
